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A Note from the Author

Thank you for your interest in my work! I had so much fun researching and writing my latest mystery for kids, *Daybreak on Raven Island*; I hope that translates as you're reading.

Daybreak on Raven Island started with setting, as most of my books do. I was looking for a new (mysterious) place to spark my imagination, and quickly thought of Alcatraz. Alcatraz Island has a such a scary vibe, and as I was doing my research, I also found that there are a lot of unsolved mysteries surrounding the island. Including a prison break in 1962...

Three inmates escaped Alcatraz, and no one ever knew if they drowned or made it off the island. I decided to take this real-life story and create my own mystery. I gave Tori, Marvin and Noah the task to solve the case of an infamous prison break from Raven Island, I added a present-day murder mystery, and a few ghosts to make things more complicated. Plus, I added a deep secret to Raven Island itself—you'll have to read the book to find out what that is.

As I learned more of the terrible conditions of Alcatraz and how things are still not always fair today, I tried to shed some light on this through Tori's character. I learned that one in 28 kids in America has had an incarcerated parent, which is something kids often keep a secret. And that must be really, really hard. I hope *Daybreak on Raven Island* sparks some thought or conversation, so those kids don't feel alone in carrying this burden.

Tip Sheet

Fleur Bradley considers herself an advocate for reluctant readers and thinks mysteries and scary books are the perfect way to reach kids who may not enjoy reading as much. Here is a sample list of topics Fleur loves to talk about:

- Reaching reluctant readers: after helping her own daughter overcome a reading disability, Fleur became a homeschooling expert on how to bridge this gap. "Once you understand how reluctant readers look at books and why, it becomes a lot easier to connect them to the right books."
- Mysteries: Fleur's love for mysteries began when a kind librarian pointed her to Agatha Christie books. "I was hooked on mysteries ever since I was twelve and picked up my first Agatha Christie book."
- Developing a fictional setting from a real-life one. "For *Daybreak on Raven Island*, I was inspired by the real-life prison escape on Alcatraz. What happened to those escapees? Creating a fictional setting to explore those what-if questions is my favorite thing to do."
- Mental health and kids: "In *Daybreak on Raven Island*, Noah struggles with anxiety. I
 drew from my daughters' struggles, and looked for ways to turn Noah into a hero of his
 own story."
- Connecting popular culture with fiction: "Daybreak on Raven Island is in many ways inspired by the horror/scary shows I watched growing up, like The Twilight Zone and Tales from the Crypt, plus all those atmospheric Alfred Hitchcock movies... There is a treasure-trove of story material that's perfect for kids who might be fans of R.L. Stine or Stranger Things."
