PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE...

What will God do?

The Apostle Paul talks at length about variety of gifts and the diversity of callings that make up the church. He emphasizes that people of diverse backgrounds, nationalities, languages and experiences are poured into the same "gospel basket." He praises the fact that, when the church is doing the will of God as planned, all of their individual gifts are employed for God's use and again, their dedicated activities stir that "basket" resulting in surprises and miracles. God's work is accomplished through mere people which sometimes seem randomly tossed together, yet scripture assures us, God has a plan.



When it comes to the working of the church, I am a big believer that the diversity and individual giftedness of God's people is God's greatest delight. I really do think of a church as God's basket, which on occasion God shakes, just to stir things up, and the combination of gifts and experiences form and reform into amazing acts of grace and mercy. It can be uncomfortable for us, the church, to feel things shifting—people scatter to fill in the blank spaces and hold the community together—but this is never bad. It's something like the way that the pieces of a kaleidoscope can never land badly, just differently—but each movement only changes the beauty of the image, but never destroys it.

In less than a month, God is adding me to the First Presbyterian Bismarck "gospel basket." And, as the shuffling of gifts and diversity of experiences happens, the amazing Ashley is making an exit. That's actually a lot for one community to absorb in a short period of time. My experiences of First Presbyterian Bismarck tell me that you are up to the task ahead.

But, let us remember this: God never shakes up the basket without planning a surprise of grace that serves God's mission and advances the gospel. As I contemplate the upcoming years with you I cannot help but wonder:

What will God do?

I always think that the key is openness to wonder, to surprise and to discovery—the kind of willingness to go alone on God's ride that can only come in faith. For this we know—God has a plan and continues to show it to us in every change. Let us watch, wait, work and maintain our openness to wonder as we discover together what God will do.


\$150.00 to help send our kids to Clearwater this Summer!

NURSE'S NOTES

Greetings to everyone! Can you believe May 2018 has arrived? There is a special day this month for all you Mom's out there. I thought I would share a story about a mother I read in The Reader's Digest:

My mother, a master of guilt trips, showed me a photo of herself waiting by a phone that never rings. "Mom, I call all the time," I said. "If you had an answering machine, you would know." Soon after, my mother agreed to have one installed. After my brother installed her answer machine I called and I did get the answer machine. This was her recording: "If you are a salesperson, press one. If you're a friend, press two. If you're my daughter who

never calls, press 911 because the shock will probably give me a heart attack." ~ Susan Starace Balducci

May 4th is National Prayer Day. I do have a story for you about prayer. My oldest sister, Pat, wanted a baby sister since her only sibling was a big brother. Pat's brother Gary did not want to hang around with his little baby sister. So she really wanted a little sister to play with. Our mother finally told her that they were expecting a new baby. She told mom and dad that she would really love a baby sister. Our mother told Pat that she should ask God for a healthy baby sister. So Pat prayed and prayed and prayed and prayed. The time came for the new arrival. Pat was so excited for this new baby. "Did God answer her prayers for a new baby sister?" Our dad came home to tell Pat and Gary that they had *three* baby sisters. Pat looked shocked, saying "God did answer my prayers." Gary, our brother, lost all the color in his face and stared at Pat in disbelief. Then he said, "Pat, your prayed too much. Now look what you did, and couldn't we get one boy?!" Pat was one busy sister from that day on. I believe Pat never ever prayed again for another little sister. *Three* was enough! She was the best big sister ever.

HAPPY MOTHER'S DAY!

The month of may is High Blood Pressure Education Month.

First, let's define high blood pressure:

According to the American Heart Association, High Blood Pressure (HBP or hypertension) is when your blood pressure, the force of your blood pushing against the walls of your blood vessels, is consistently too high.

How your blood pressure and circulatory system work:

In order to survive and function properly, your tissues and organs need the oxygenated blood that your circulatory system carries throughout the body. When the heart beats, it creates pressure that pushes blood through a network of tube-shaped blood vessels, which include arteries, veins and capillaries. The pressure—blood pressure—is the result of two forces: the first force (systolic pressure) occurs as blood pumps out of the heart and into the arteries that are part of the circulatory system. The second force (diastolic pressure) is created as the heart rests between heart beats. (These two forces are each represented by numbers in a blood pressure reading.) There's a reason it's called the "silent killer".

Most of the time, high blood pressure has no obvious symptoms to indicate that something's wrong. The best way to protect yourself is being aware of the risks and making changes that matter.

High blood pressure often has no signs or symptoms:

- Many people with high blood pressure don't even know they have it.
- High blood pressure develops slowly over time and can be related to many causes.
- High blood pressure can not be cured. However, it can be managed very effectively through lifestyle changes and, when needed, medication.

Know your numbers:

The best way to protect yourself is to learn where you stand by measuring your high blood pressure.

HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE (HYPERTENSION) STAGE 2	140 OR HIGHER	or	90 OR HIGHER
HYPERTENSIVE CRISIS (consult your doctor immediately)	HIGHER THAN 180	and/or	HIGHER THAN 120

Note: A diagnosis of high blood pressure must be confirmed with a medical professional. A doctor should also evaluate any unusually <u>low blood</u> pressure readings.

Recognize your risks

Being aware of your risk factors—the physical and lifestyle attributes that can make you more likely to develop high blood pressure—can help you identify changes you can make to avoid the threats to your health that can result from your blood pressure being too high for too long.

First Presbyterian Church offers free B.P. Clinics once a month in the Conference Room on a Sunday from 9-10 am and 11 am—Noon. Please check the weekly schedule of events and the bulletin for the dates. You may also call the church at 701-223-6091 for times and dates. In May the B.P. Clinic will be on Sunday, May 20th, 2018.

We will be having a presentation from Nikki Wegner from the Alzheimer's Association May 1st at Noon, called "Understanding and Responding to Behaviors of Alzheimer's". Please come join us in the Parlor at First Presbyterian Church.

Come join us every Monday and Thursday at 10:00 am in the Parlor for strengthening exercises. Join the fun, music and socialization. We plan to incorporate "Stepping On," in our exercise classes to help with strengthening and balance to help with prevention of falls. We **WILL NOT** be having classes in the months of June, July and August. They will resume in September.

COMMITTEE REPORTS (from meeting and minutes)

Administrative and Personnel—Dale Hoerauf and Linda Tonolli met with Kris Ronningen and Alice Nix from Christian Education Committee to discuss the position of a new Christian Education Director. This included a conference call with in-coming Pastor Leanne Simmons to examine the job description and determine qualities desired in a CE Director. It was decided to advertise the position in May and hold interviews in June after Pastor Leanne arrives and can participate in the hiring process.

Christian Education—Graduating seniors will be recognized on May 20. Several youth attended the Crystal Springs Retreat April 27-29. Harmon Lake event will be July 14. Dates for Clearwater Forest Camp are July 22-28. VBS will be led by counselors by Camp of the Cross July 30-August 2. The congregation may need to provide housing and meals for the counselors.

Outreach—One of the speakers for the first Higher Power Lunch will be Judith Roberts. Rebuilding Together event is May 5. Jelly for backpacks will be collected in May.

Membership—The outdoor service is July 15 at Sertoma Park Shelter # 11. Glencoe, Wilton and Mandan Presbyterian Churches may be participating. There will be an ice cream social after worship service on May 13.

Property and Equipment—Projects this summer will be mostly handled "in-house". Dirt around trees in front will likely be covered with mulch. There is a recycling bin in the parlor. The committee has responded to questions from Boy Scout Troop #6 to expand their display case, move their Eagle display and have their flags on permanent display in Room 205.

Stewardship—Session approved 40% of Pentecost Offering be used for the outdoor playground equipment for the Child Care Center.

Session Highlights

Worship and Music—The organ has been repaired and tuned. A sub-committee is exploring new choir robes. Communion servers are asked to find their own substitutes.

Fine Arts Festival—The committee will not be hosting a festival in 2018.

PRESBYTERY REPORT

Jim Skaret and Shari Orser attended the Presbytery meeting April 13 in Casselton. This one day meeting was the first under the new Pod structure (replaced committees). There is a search committee for an Executive Presbyter; the new staffing model will reduce staff by two. PCUSA in Minot has a closing commission to deal with financial assets. The next meeting of Presbytery will be at Mandan FPC on October 8


