THE FAITH OF SERVICE

Isaiah 53:10-11; Psalm 33:4-5, 18-22; Heb. 4:14-16; Mark 10:35-45

You probably remember that last Sunday's gospel called for a total renunciation! You may have done everything well - going to Mass - receiving sacraments - keeping <u>most</u> of the commandments. But, possibly, there is a life-style you are maintaining or choices you make that are in conflict with Christian values; the Lord Jesus says, "You are lacking in one thing. Go, sell what you have...and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." Discipleship demands total renunciation if you and I want to have eternal life in God's kingdom. Following Christ demands total commitment - total dependency on God's love - it demands total trust in God. It requires faith! Thus, Jesus reiterated, "For human beings it is impossible, but not for God. All things are possible for God."

When the Holy Father, Pope Benedict XVI, proclaimed the "Year of Faith," he observed that it will give renewed energy to the Church in its mission to lead Catholics "out of the desert they are often in" and will propel them toward a renewed appreciation of their own faith, "a deeper relationship with God and a strengthening of their commitment to joyfully share their faith with others." It is the hope of the Holy Father that every Catholic would willingly and joyfully share his or her faith, a free gift from God, with others. You have received freely, and you must give freely!

Sadly, Christianity has become a "religion of convenience" for many Catholics. Some have grown lazy in the practice of their faith. In an attempt to try to address the philosophy of contingency and laxity toward religion, the Pope challenges us to live out our faith in every circumstance. For him, "Faith grows when it is lived as an experience of love received and when it is communicated as an experience of grace and joy." He further cautioned Catholics not to "grow lazy in faith." Because when we grow lazy in the practice of our faith, we will depend less on God, trust Him less and become more self-centered. When you and I have grown lazy in faith, we might become ambitious like the Disciples, James and John, who approached Jesus with a selfish request, "Grant that in Your glory we may sit one at Your right and the other at Your left." When the victory was won, the battle was over, and the triumph was complete, they were looking forward to being at the top two posts of Jesus' cabinet. Their request tells us they had completely failed to understand Jesus and His mission of selfless service. For them, the essence of following Christ was not for service and self-sacrifice, but for immediate or future rewards. They needed assurances that they will receive remuneration for their services. They wanted places of honor. You and I must learn to be true followers of Christ by being active in our faith - generously donating our time, talent, and treasure without "counting cost." We must give of ourselves until it hurts. We must never cease to be active in faith even when it asks us for "total commitment and renunciation."

Surely, "You know that those who are recognized as rulers over the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones make their authority over them felt. But it shall not be so among you." For you and me the essence of our vocation is not for reward, but it is for service. The heart of Christian sacrifices is not for honor, status or recognition. No matter what the politicians or the secular media might say to the contrary, the Christian vocation demands sacrifice and self-giving. It requires a faith that is active and a conscience that is alive. Christ did not come to be served but to serve and so must you!



THE SACRAMENT OF PENANCE



In his intervention at the Synod, Cardinal Dolan called the Sacrament of Penance, "the Sacrament of Evangelization." How true that is! If we seek an inner peace and a closer relationship with Jesus, how can we avoid recognizing that by sin we are self-sabotaging ourselves, making those goals unattainable. Let us ask ourselves a very basic question: "Do

we have enough joy in our lives? Or for that matter, do we have any joy as we experience daily life?" Another basic question: "Do you remember First Confession?" What a relief it was to tell God how sorry we were for offending Him! We felt like a hundred bucks. (In my day, that was a lot of money). What has changed that we do not participate in the sacrament as frequently as we once did? Did God put a limit on His mercy? Have any sins become unforgivable? Has the Church put up any restrictions? I fear that if we look for any changes we need only look inwardly. Perhaps, we think we are such great sinners that God could never forgive us. (Wasn't that the difference between Peter and Judas?). Perhaps, we don't think we sin at all. Perhaps, we forget that through Baptism, we are bound to our brothers and sisters in the faith community and we try to speak to God in isolation from them. But we know in our deepest recesses where conscience reigns we cannot receive in such thoughts true consolation or the peace that only Christ can bring. Our final reservation might be that the priest who hears confession is not perfect - who is he to judge? It is important that we recognize that Christ knew the imperfections of His Apostles; He knows the imperfections of His priests. He and the Church call upon these sacred ministers not so much to judge as to say: Welcome! Be forgiven! Go, and sin no more.

SAINT MARIANNE COPE

From an early age Barbara Cope wanted to enter religious life. As the oldest of the children living at home, however, she had to wait until the age of twenty-four, spending her years after eighth grade working in a factory to support her invalid father and the rest of the family. After his death, Barbara joined the Sisters of St. Francis in Utica, New York, and was given the religious



name Marianne. Although she taught for a time, her gifts of administration were recognized by the community and she went on to found two of the first hospitals in central New York. In 1877, she was elected mother general of the order. In 1883, Mother Marianne journeyed to Hawaii with six sisters to respond to the call to take charge of hospitals and schools. Mother Marianne worked with St. Damien de Veuster. Her community cared for the women and girls at Bishop Home, and when Father Damien died Mother Marianne was put in charge of the boys' facility, Baldwin Home, as well. On August 9. 1918, at the age of eighty, Mother Marianne died at Bishop Home on Moloka'i, Hawaii. In 2005, she was beatified by Pope Benedict XVI. On February 18, 2012, Pope Benedict XVI officially announced at Saint Peter's Basilica that Blessed Marianne Cope will be canonized on October 21, 2012.
