PA Link to Aging and Disability Resources

Pennsylvania's prescription assistance programs for older adults, PACE and PACENET, offer low-cost prescription medication to qualified residents ages 65 and older.

PACE/PACENET is assisting people over 60 with vaccine registration. They do NOT have to be members of the PACE program. For more information, call **1-800-225-7223**.

For PACE members, the number for vaccine appointments is **1-800-753-8827**. Operators will also be working with cardholders to arrange for transportation to vaccination sites; they're also working with PACE's pharmacy network members to vaccinate at a cardholder's residence, if necessary.

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Information for Veterans

Veterans of ANY AGE who meet all other eligibility criteria can now contact their VA Pittsburgh provider to schedule an appointment for the COVID-19 vaccine. They also provide the vaccine to eligible Veterans on a walk-in basis from 7 AM to 5:30 PM Monday through Friday (except federal holidays) at their University Drive campus.

Eligible Veterans:

- Are any age, AND
- Are eligible and registered for VHA care, AND
- Receive their VHA care at VAPHS or any of our outpatient clinics in Belmont County, Ohio, and Beaver, Fayette, Washington and Westmoreland counties in Pennsylvania, AND
- Have NOT had any vaccinations in the 14 days prior to receiving the COVID-19 vaccine.

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Transportation Services

2-1-1 United Way

United Way offers free Lyft rides to Allegheny County residents who need to access a medical appointment (vaccine appointments count). Just dial 2-1-1 on your phone and ask for a free Lyft ride to your vaccine appointment.

ACCESS 65 Plus

ACCESS is a door-to-door, advance reservation, shared—ride transportation program provided throughout Allegheny County and to destinations in adjoining counties within 1.5 miles of Allegheny County. ACCESS service is open to the general public at full fare rates, with some discounts for individual riders. Reservations for ACCESS trips can be made in advance. 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Frequently Asked Questions

How do I schedule my second dose?

Nearly all vaccination providers will schedule your second dose at the time of your first dose or provide instructions on how your second dose will be scheduled.

Which vaccine will I receive? Are all vaccines two doses?

Two of the three currently authorized vaccines to prevent COVID-19 in the United States require 2 shots to get the most protection.

Pfizer-BioNTech doses should be given 3 weeks (21 days) apart. **Moderna** doses should be given 1 month (28 days) apart.

Johnson & Johnson EUA is a one-dose vaccine.

Which vaccine you receive is dependent upon the supply given to the provider of your vaccine. Both the Moderna and Pfizer vaccines are very similar and have a nearly 95% efficacy rate when given in the recommended two doses. J&J has a lower efficacy but is considered highly effective at preventing severe disease.

Do I have to pay for the vaccine?

Vaccine doses purchased with U.S. taxpayer dollars will be given to the American people at no cost. However, vaccination providers can charge an administration fee for giving someone the shot. Vaccination providers can be reimbursed for this by the patient's public or private insurance company or, for uninsured patients, by the Health Resources and Services Administration's Provider Relief Fund. No one can be denied a vaccine if they are unable to pay the vaccine administration fee.

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What should I bring to my appointment?

Most locations require you to bring an ID and insurance or Medicare card. If you are given a confirmation number over the phone, also have this written down to bring with you just in case.

What side effects can I expect after the vaccine?

The most common adverse effects reported are arm soreness and fatigue with the first vaccine; both companies report more symptoms with the second vaccine specifically listing fevers, chills, tiredness, headache and arm soreness. Both Moderna and Pfizer's websites have more extensive lists of adverse effects, and all vaccine side effects are to be reported to VAERS (Vaccine adverse event reporting system). Any specific questions that you might have specific to your health history or allergy history should be discussed with your physician.

Is there a risk of an allergic reaction to the vaccine?

Serious problems from vaccination can happen, but they are extremely rare. The CDC is aware that some people have experienced severe allergic reactions — also known as anaphylaxis — after getting a COVID-19 vaccine. Most of these reactions occur within the first 15 minutes of the vaccine administration and thus it is suggested that all patients stay for 15 minutes of observation after the vaccine is administered. As an example, an allergic reaction is considered severe when a person needs to be treated with epinephrine or EpiPen or if they must go to the hospital.

I already had COVID-19 and recovered. Do I still need to get the vaccine?

Yes. Due to the severe health risks associated with COVID-19 and the fact that reinfection with COVID-19 is possible, you should be vaccinated regardless of whether you already had COVID-19 infection. If you were treated for COVID-19 symptoms with monoclonal antibodies or convalescent plasma, you should wait 90 days before getting a COVID-19 vaccine. Talk to your doctor if you are unsure what treatments you received or if you have more questions about getting a COVID-19 vaccine.

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
