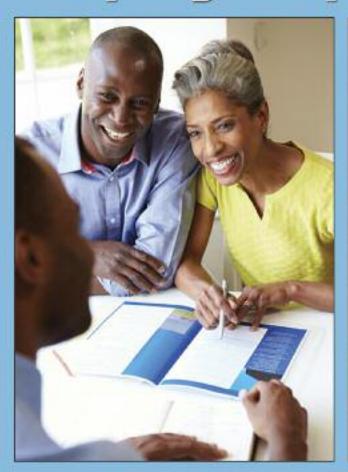


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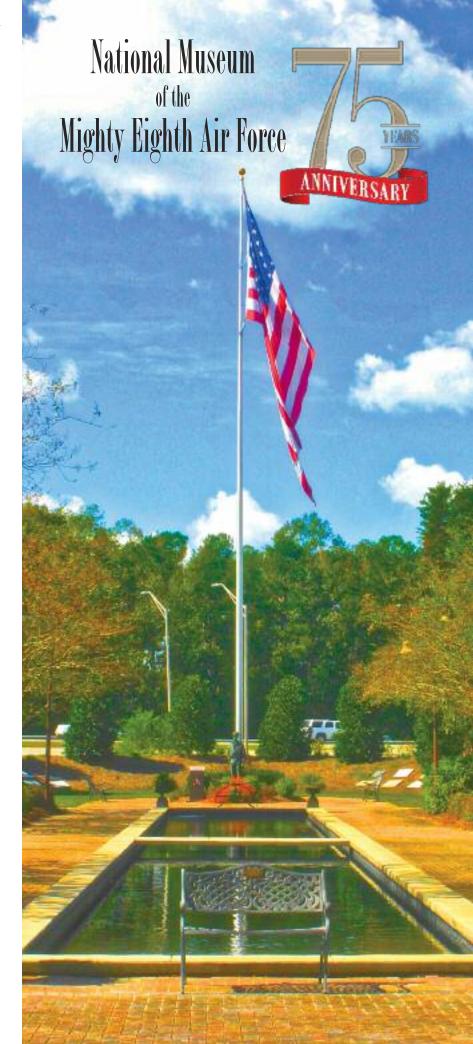


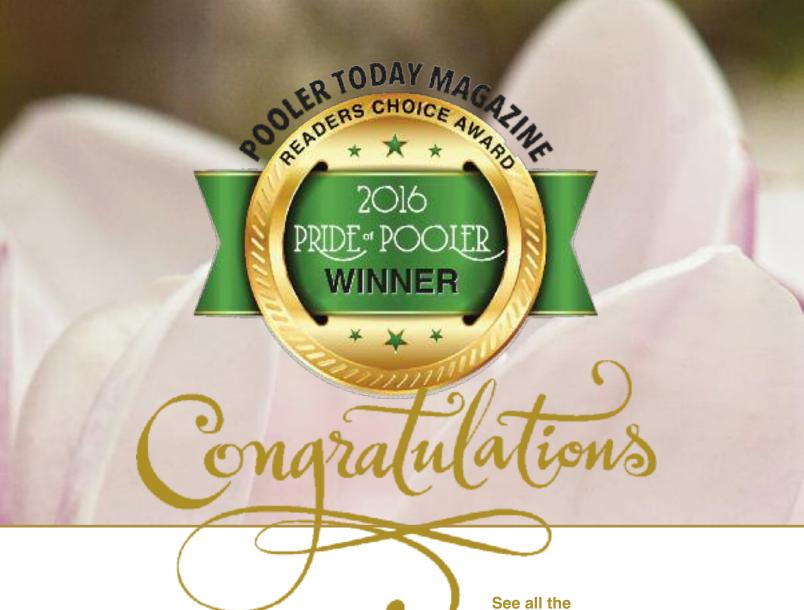

Whether by phone, email, letter or at a public forum, be clear, concise and honest. Speak or write with conviction, but be mindful in your judgements. Back up your opinions with facts and other evidence. Whether you agree or disagree, do so with kindness and respect. Public officials represent many thousands of constituents who are petitioning then with their concerns. Keep your mind open to alternative ideas and solutions. Remember that sometimes you have to lose the battle to win the war. Always thank them for fighting for you. As we begin the four-year term of the 45th President of the United States, let's give him and his administration a chance to govern before we pass judgement

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#### Kimberly's Inspiring Story Racing For The Cure

Kimberly Smith, 31, participated in her first Susan G. Komen Coastal Georgia Race for the Cure in 2016, and she was missing her boyfriend, Darrin. A one-year cancer survivor, Kimberly had hoped to have Darrin by her side as she raced around Ellis Square in Savannah. He said he had to work that day, but encouraged her to still go and celebrate being a survivor in her bright pink Susan G. Komen t-shirt.

At the finish line, in addition to crowds cheering her and her fellow survivors on, Kimberly noticed one young man awaiting the runners, and she thought she recognized him. Drawing closer, she realized that Darrin was the young man, and he was waiting for her. As she approached, he knelt down before her and opened a small box. This was a proposal, and it was a surprise. Kimberly covered her face, opened her hands to see Darrin clearly, smiled from ear to ear, and said yes. The crowd cheered the happy couple who were later introduced and congratulated on stage. It was a touching moment during a day of powerful emotions for everyone in attendance.

Race for the Cure Savannah is a special event, unlike many others. The primary fundraiser for Susan G. Komen Coastal Georgia is coming up to its 9th year on Saturday, April 22, 2017. 'In addition to being a vital fundraiser for our lifesaving mission, it is an incredible support network of survivors, families of survivors, and even families of loved ones lost,' shared Executive Director Aileen Gabbey. 'It is a beautiful celebration that brings joy to thousands of women, and is a highlight of the year.' Funds raised from the organization's Race stay locally. 'We share with our community that what is raised here, stays here,' added Gabbey. 'Seventy-five percent of donations raised go to local programs in Coastal Georgia, and the remaining twenty-five percent support cutting-edge research.'

Susan G. Komen Coastal Georgia serves nine counties in our state: Bryan, Bulloch, Camden, Chatham, Effingham, Glynn, Liberty, Long, and McIntosh. In this region, 12 women a month are diagnosed with late-stage breast cancer, and African-American women die at higher rates. "This is what motivates us to continue this lifesaving work. Detecting breast cancer early saves lives,' said Gabbey.

Programs funded by Susan G. Komen focus on early detection including, not only education and outreach but critical services such as mammograms. In the past five years, the Coastal Georgia Affiliate has provided funds for over 7,000 screenings, all with the goal to save lives.

Kimberly is still a strong survivor. She is feeling good and planning her wedding for the summer of 2017. Her day at the 2016 Race will be unforgettable. She'll always remember her special surprise proposal. And, she'll also have the memories of being among fellow survivors, all holding each other up on a day of joy and celebration.

## Safe Shelter Making A Difference For Domestic Violence Victims

In the world of non-profits, Safe Shelter Center for Domestic Violence Services could be considered one of Chatham County's best-kept secrets.

For over 35 years SAFE has provided a haven for those fleeing the violence in their own homes. Savannah's only family violence shelter is open 24-hours a day, seven days a week. No fees are charged for any shelter services.

Last year, the shelter provided services to over 800 women and children (along with about half a dozen male victims). Throughout its history, no one who was actively involved in any SAFE Shelter service or program has been killed by her or his abusive partner.

SAFE Shelter was born out of the compassion and concerns of four local women in the late 1970's who recognized the need for services for battered women and their children. Thanks to the untiring work of Norma Brewin, Lucy Brannen, Harris Lentini, and Caroline Armstrong, the shelter became a reality.

To fill that need, they visited every social service agency in Savannah asking if that agency would undertake or add a battered women's project

to its services. While the agencies acknowledged the need and said they would support such an effort, no one could undertake the project.

After the decision to create an independent agency was made, the following two years were spent gathering support for the project. These years were filled with enlisting influential community leaders, increasing public awareness of domestic violence, researching established shelters and rais-

ing money. A house was purchased with matching grants from the city and county. Work was then contracted to turn the house into an emergency shelter for fifteen residents. The staff was hired, and the shelter officially opened its doors on September 15, 1980.

Several years later, a second house adjacent to the shelter, was purchased to accommodate the shelter's expanding needs. In 2001, following a successful capital campaign, a new 48-bed shelter was constructed.

Over the years, the shelter's services evolved to meet the many complex needs of the clients it served. In 1996, the SAFE Shelter Outreach Pro-

gram was created to address the needs of those victims who needed services but not a shelter. Currently located at 7395 Hodgson Memorial Drive, Suite 203, the program is staffed with two legal advocates (one of whom is bilingual) and a coordinator, the senior legal advocate. The advocates are all certified through Georgia Legal Services to assist victims with Temporary Protective Orders. They not only prepare and file the orders but obtain attorneys who provide their services Pro Bono for the TPO hearings.

Along with the Outreach Program, the Follow-up/After Care Program was added to provide those families/individuals exiting the shelter with support for up to two years. The Follow-up Case Manager and Child Advocate assist with helping these families set up their new homes with

Furniture, household items that have been donated to the shelter. They are also able to provide limited financial assistance for rent/utilities. This invaluable program has helped those starting all over again by taking the services started in the shelter and continuing them for up to two years. Currently, 98% of those in the program have not returned to their abusive partner.

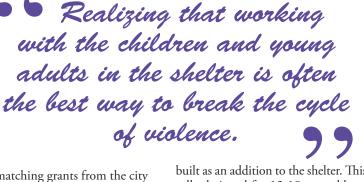

Realizing that working with the children and young adults in the shelter is often the best way to break the cycle of violence, the shelter offers these young victims comprehensive age-appropriate services. The Child

Advocate facilitates twice weekly support groups and serves as a liaison between the mothers and school social workers/teachers. The older youth coming into the shelter with their mothers posed very specialized, difficult issues that needed to be addressed. To address these problems, two years ago, thanks to successful fundraising, the Youth Enrichment Services (YES) Center was

ment Services (YES) Center was built as an addition to the shelter. This 1,500 square foot room is specifically designed for 12-18-year-old age group, with two flat-screen televisions for gaming or movies and bright, cheerful furniture and wall hangings. The room is designed to provide both recreational and educational activities for the youth. A computer lab is necessary for homework assignments, term papers and other school assignments. For those who are musically inclined, there is a baby grand piano (donated to the shelter last year) and a wide variety of other musical instruments includ-

ing drums, a guitar, tambourines', and even a ukulele!

The YES Center is also home to the shelter's annual Camp ROCK. Now in its seventh year, this summer camp provides the children and youth both in the shelter and in the Follow-up Program an opportunity to experience a real childhood. Funded through SOUPER Bowl Parties by a group of dedicated shelter supporters, the children have taken field trips to Tybee Island, museums downtown, the aquarium in Charleston, SC and the Jacksonville Zoo.

Notre Dame University, through a partnership with the shelter, provides two college interns to assist the Child Advocate in facilitating the camp. The Board of Education provides a teacher who comes several times a week to provide individual and group tutorials. Every child that enters the doors of SAFE Shelter has experienced some degree of trauma. For the majority, they have never had the opportunity just to run, plan and

have fun. And like all the other services provided by the shelter, there are no fees charged for the camp.

Last but certainly not least is the organic garden started by a SAFE Shelter Auxiliary Board Member Lorraine Boice. With the help of a friend who is a Master Gardner, Lorraine has created a beautiful garden space on the side of the shelter. The children have been given lessons regarding "good bugs versus bad bugs", and have had the chance to not only tend to the garden but to pick lettuce, broccoli, and carrots for salads! The children have affectionately named it, The Garden of Dreams.

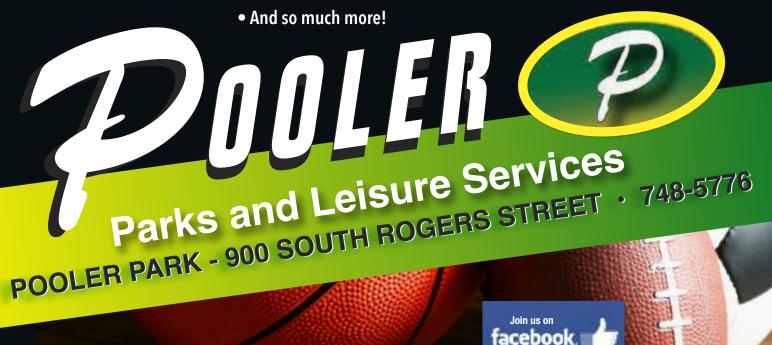
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#### Chicken with Wine Sauce

I found this recipe in a diet cookbook about 20 years ago when the low fat diets were becoming the new health trend. I loved it so much that I've kept it all these years, serving it at elegant dinner parties and for a weeknight dinners for my family. It's quick, delicious and you probably have all you need to make it in the refrigerator now. I hope you'll enjoy and keep it around for another 20 years!

#### Ingredients

2 pounds meaty chicken pieces (breasts, thighs and drumsticks) skinned

1 cup fresh mushrooms, sliced

1 small onion, chopped

1 teaspoon dried basil, crushed

1 clove garlic, minced

1/3 cup chicken broth

1/3 cup dry white wine

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

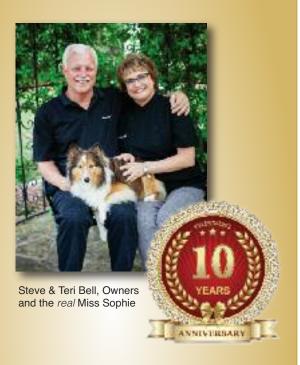
1 tablespoon cornstarch

#### **Directions**

Spray a large skillet with nonstick spray. Add mushrooms, onion, basil and garlic. Cook on medium heat until onion is tender. Stir in chicken broth, wine, salt and pepper. Add chicken to skillet and bring to a boil. Reduce heat. Cover and cook over low heat for 30 minutes or until the chicken is tender and no longer pink. Remove chicken and vegetables to a platter. Combine cornstarch and 1 tablespoon of water. Stir into liquid in skillet. Cook and stir until thickened. Spoon over chicken.

## Why Dow 20k Doesn't Matter

What is it about big, round numbers that excites us? As of this writing, folks are once again obsessed with the new milestone of the Dow Jones Industrial Average: 20,000!

Although I am forced to report on it on a daily basis, I think the Dow is perhaps the least meaningful U.S. stock index available. Sure, it's got history on its side - it was created by Charles Dow in 1896, in order to provide investors with a snapshot of how the overall stock market was doing. But for an index that is supposed to provide investors with a big picture view, it includes just 30 large companies. And considering that Amazon, Google and Facebook are not part of the Dow, it is hard to make the case that it reflects the broader market.

Besides its limited size and scope, there's another big problem with the Dow: The way the average is calculated makes no sense. The index is "price-weighted," which means that the company with the highest price per share carries the most weight in calculating the daily index value, while the company with the lowest price per share carries the least weight. Because of this method, the daily performance of an expensive Dow stock, like Goldman Sachs, can have an outsized impact on the whole index. That's why professional investors do not look at the Dow to determine what's going on in the U.S. stock market; instead they use the S&P 500 or the Wilshire 5000, both of which use a different methodology based on market capitalization (number of shares outstanding multiplied by the price) of a company, to determine the index's value.

Despite the inadequacy of the index itself, focusing on any index does not change anything in your financial life. I recently asked you to consider a concrete and achievable financial resolution: not to muck around with your portfolio, to avoid timing the market and to instead get back to the more important financial issues at hand.

A number of you wrote in and asked to expand on the list of potential financial resolutions to consider. These ideas are not new, but like recommendations about diet and exercise, the tried and true advice hold ups over time. Here is a baker's dozen list of potential financial resolutions:

- ✓ Track where you money goes.
- ✓ Automate bill paying.
- ✓ Go to **AnnualCreditReport.com** and review and or correct your credit report.
- ✓ Focus on identity theft protection. Change passwords; install firewalls and virus-detection software; shred unwanted financial documents; and store personal information in a safe, secure place.
- ✓ Pay down consumer debt (credit card, auto loans).
- ✓ Create an adequate emergency reserve fund (six to 12 months' worth of expenses; 12 to 24 months' worth for retirees).
- ✓ Maximize retirement contributions. You may contribute up to \$18,000 for 401(k), 403(b) and 457 plans, with an additional \$6,000 catch up contribution available if you are over the age of 50, and \$5,500 for IRAs, with an additional \$1,000 catch-up contribution. Enroll in auto rebalancing and auto escalation, if possible.
- ✓ Diversify your portfolio with an asset allocation that is consistent with your time horizon and risk tolerance level.
- ✓ Draft or update your will, power of attorney, health care proxy and other estate documents.
- ✓ Review insurance coverage (life, disability, long-term care and property and casualty).
- ✓ Consider refinancing your mortgage. In December, the Fed raised rates by a quarter of a point and is on track to continue doing so this year. Mortgage rates have already started to rise, but they are still at historically low levels.
- ✓ Consider funding a 529 plan for college expenses.
- ✓ Have the "money talk" with spouse/kids/parents.

#### **Keeping Up With Pooler Progress United States Post Office Update**

The Pooler Main Post Office, currently located at 502 US Highway 80, will relocate within the next few weeks. It will move to a temporary modular building at first, but then in March, to a permanent location, the former Goodwill Industries space - both in the Bl-LO Shopping Center, located at 1030 US Highway 80.

The mail delivery operation will remain at the current post office station until the permanent location is ready to accommodate the city's full staff of letter carriers.

Pooler residents have long criticized the cramped conditions and lack of available parking at the existing site, which has been the city's sole post office for more than 40 years. The new location will help relieve some of the facility's congestion and keep up with the growth in Pooler.

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## My Pet World How To Introduce A New Dog To Established Pet Cats

Q: I have two cats and I am about to bring a new puppy into our home. The larger cat does not seem frightened of dogs but my little female's hair 'stands up' just at the sight of them. What is the best way to socialize everyone and minimize the stress on my younger cat?

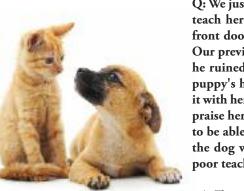
A: It is a lot easier to socialize a full grown cat to a puppy than it is a full grown dog to a kitten. However, it's really not that hard when you think of it as every farm in almost every culture. Dogs and cats have been living together harmoniously and there is obviously many different ways to have them get acquainted.

The only universal rule here is to remember that animals never accept our word that a situation they feel unsure about is harmless to them. Only the animal itself can come to that conclusion and it can only happen if the animal is exposed to the situation for themselves.

First of all the cat needs a safe zone that it can choose to be in that the puppy cannot enter. This is pretty simple as most puppies are contained in their new homes via gated doorways or training crates. The cat needs to be in the proximity of puppy so it can see and smell the dog, yet the dog cannot be in the cat's flight zone. Every animal has a flight zone - a distance they feel is needed to be safe from a perceived threat - when the flight zone has been breached then the drama occurs.

It's best to keep the puppy on a leash when it is in the same room with the cat. That way everyone can feel safe about the situation. The puppy also gets to learn about the cat and when the cat no longer feels defensive, then you can allow them to interact.

However, do not do this until the cat is calm while being in the same room as the puppy. When you do allow them to interact, then I would suggest you trim the cat's claws just as a precaution.



Q: We just got a Labrador puppy and we want to teach her to ring a bell tied to the wall by our front door so we know when she has to go out. Our previous dog would scratch at the door and he ruined the wood work. We have guided our puppy's head toward the bells by leading her to it with her collar and then when the bells ring we praise her and let her out, but she does not seem to be able to put them together. We wondered if the dog was at fault as a student or if we were poor teachers?

**A:** There does seem to be a lack of communication between student and teacher.

First the bells should be hanging on the door rather than the wall next to the door. They should also be at nose height to the dog. Then when the puppy is standing in front of the door you should not touch her or lead her to the bells, just wait until she touches the bell on her own. She will be inclined to touch them because all lab puppies want to play.

As soon as she touches a bell then praise her and open the door and let her out. Since she touched the bell on her own and the door opened, then she will figure the whole thing out on her own.

Once the dog gets the idea that touching the sash of bells gets us to open the door, then you can gradually move the sash away from the door and hang it on the wall so there is no jingling as you open and close the door. Since the dog learned what the bells mean on her own, she will seek them out when she needs to go outside.

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## What's Smarter – Paying Off Debts Or Investing?

If you're just starting out in your career, you will need to be prepared to face some financial challenges along the way but here's one that's not unpleasant: choosing what to do with some extra disposable income. When this happens, what should you do with the money? Your decisions could make a real difference in your ability to achieve your important financial goals.

Under what circumstances might you receive some "found" money? You could get a year-end bonus from your employer, or a sizable tax refund, or even an inheritance.

However the money comes to you, don't let it "slip through your fingers." Instead, consider these two moves: investing the money or using it to pay off debts.

Which of these choices should you pick? There's no one "right" answer, as everyone's situation is different. But here are a few general considerations:

• *Distinguish between "good" and "bad" debt.* Not all types of debt are created equal. Your mortgage, for example, is probably a "good" form of debt. You're using the loan for a valid purpose – i.e., living in your house – and you likely get a hefty tax deduction for the interest you pay. On the other hand, nondeductible consumer debt that carries a high interest rate might be considered "bad" debt – and this is the debt you might want to reduce or eliminate when you receive some extra money. By doing so, you can free up money to save and invest for retirement or

other goals.

• Compare making extra mortgage payments vs. investing. Many of us get some psychological benefits by making extra house payments. Yet, when you do have some extra money, putting it toward your house may not be the best move.

For one thing, as mentioned above, your mortgage can be considered a "good" type of debt, so you may not need to rush to pay it off. And from an investment standpoint, your home is somewhat "illiquid" – it's not always easy to get money out of it. If you put your extra money into traditional investments, such as stocks and bonds, you may increase your growth potential, and you may gain an income stream through interest payments and dividends.

• Consider tax advantages of investing. Apart from your mortgage, your other debts likely won't provide you with any tax benefits. But you can get tax advantages by putting money into certain types of investment vehicles, such as a traditional or Roth IRA. When you invest in a traditional IRA, your contributions may be deductible, depending on your income, and your money grows on a tax-deferred basis. (Keep in mind that taxes will be due upon withdrawals, and any withdrawals you make before you reach 59½ may be subject to a 10% IRS penalty.) Roth IRA contributions are not deductible, but your earnings are distributed tax-free, provided you don't take withdrawals until you reach 59½ and you've had your account at least five years.

Clearly, you've got some things to ponder when choosing whether to use "extra" money to pay off debts or invest. Of course, it's not always an "either-or" situation; you may be able to tackle some debts and still invest for the future. In any case, use this money wisely – you weren't necessarily counting on it, but you can make it count for you.

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#### Tummy Time Gives Babies Much Needed Workout

You probably know that putting your baby to sleep on his back is the safest sleep position. It has significantly reduced the risk Sudden Infant Death Syndrome, or SIDS. What you may not know is that alternative positions – side-lying and tummy – during his awake times are vital for his healthy development.

Babies who spend too much time lying on their backs can suffer plagiocephaly (asymmetrical head shape), brachiocephaly (flattened back of the head) and general developmental delays. Putting babies down on their backs is for sleep, not awake times.

Tummy time is a baby workout that is necessary to develop strength, body awareness and development. Every hour your baby is awake, expose him to some tummy time. You can lay him across your chest, over your lap or on the furniture beside you, or you may roll him gently on a yoga ball. Be sure to never leave your baby unattended.

With your baby supported in your arms, lean her forward so she can practice lifting her head. Encourage weight-bearing on her arms while she is seated in your lap. Simply lean her to one side or forward and place her hands on your thigh with the elbow extended.

Seating options such as the Bumbo, swings and ExerSaucers are good alternatives to keeping your baby on his back while he is awake. However, they do not replace the value of tummy time.

During the day, limit your baby's time in a car seat. Leaving him in the seat at home, on a shopping cart, in restaurants or on stroller bases can create problems with head shape and cause developmental delays. Restrict his time in the car seat to transportation times only.

Even at night your baby can exercise his developing muscles. In addition to a crib, try using a rocker/sleeper at bedtime. It can be set up in your room and allows your baby to sleep in a tilt position on his back. This position helps strengthen neck muscles.

Be sure to alternate your baby's nighttime sleep options. Using a rocker/sleeper for extended periods of time can result in tight neck muscles and negatively impact head shape.

For sleep, your baby is safest on her back. But when she is awake and ready to play and interact, give her a "workout" with tummy time.

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#### Increased Heart Disease Risk For People With Rheumatoid Arthritis

DEAR MAYO CLINIC: Is it true that people with rheumatoid arthritis have a higher risk of heart disease? How are the two conditions related? Is there a way to lower the risk?

ANSWER: Studies have shown that if you have rheumatoid arthritis, your risk of developing heart disease is two to three times higher than people who don't have the disorder. Although the exact connection between the two conditions is unclear, a number of factors seem to play into the increased heart disease risk. Regular check-ups, tests to check for heart problems, lifestyle changes and being able to recognize symptoms of heart disease can all help manage the risk.

Rheumatoid arthritis is an inflammatory disease that causes swelling. It often affects the small joints in the hands and feet and causes joint tenderness, pain and stiffness. But the disorder can go beyond the joints, too, and that's part of the connection to heart disease.

The inflammation of rheumatoid arthritis may cause changes within the walls of your arteries. That can make the arteries narrow, lowering blood flow and raising blood pressure. Also, plaque can build up in the arteries - a condition called atherosclerosis.

Atherosclerosis is related to the typical risk factors for heart disease: high blood pressure, high cholesterol, diabetes and smoking. However, in people with rheumatoid arthritis, inflammation may also trigger plaque formation. Rheumatoid arthritis can affect the heart muscle, too, making it stiff and reducing its ability to effectively pump blood. That makes the heart more prone to heart failure.

Drugs used to treat rheumatoid arthritis can raise your risk of heart disease. For example, steroid medications are very effective at decreasing inflammation. However, in high doses over a long period of time, these medications can raise blood pressure, contribute to weight gain and raise cholesterol levels. All of these side effects can increase the likelihood of heart problems. Non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs) often used to ease joint pain have been shown to have negative effects on blood pressure and overall heart disease, as well.

Because people with rheumatoid arthritis are at high risk for heart problems, ongoing monitoring is key. Imaging exams and blood tests can help identify stiffness in the heart muscle and arteries, as well as early signs of artery blockages. If tests reveal these or other signs of heart disease, your health care provider can be proactive about treating them promptly.

It's also important to keep an eye on traditional heart disease risk factors, such as blood pressure and cholesterol levels. If they rise, then you may need treatment to help keep them under control, making it less likely that they'll lead to heart problems.

Managing the inflammation of rheumatoid arthritis carefully can make a difference, too. For example, if steroids are part of your treatment plan, they should be used for the shortest amount of time possible, at the lowest dose possible.

Make sure you understand the symptoms that may signal heart problems. In some people with rheumatoid arthritis, symptoms of heart disease may not show up in the same way as they do in other people. Ask your doctor about symptoms to watch for.

Finally, work to maintain overall heart health. Follow a heart-healthy diet, get to and stay at a healthy weight, reduce stress, get enough sleep and exercise regularly. Exercise can be challenging if your joints hurt from rheumatoid arthritis. If so, consider working with a physical therapist or an exercise physiologist to find the best exercise program for you.

If you have rheumatoid arthritis, ask your doctor about your risk for heart disease. Taking that risk into consideration, set up an ongoing care plan to monitor both your arthritis symptoms and your heart health. If possible, include a cardiologist and a rheumatologist on your care team. Together, they can help you lower your heart disease risk while managing rheumatoid arthritis.

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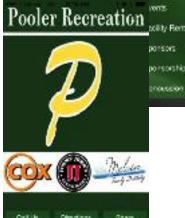
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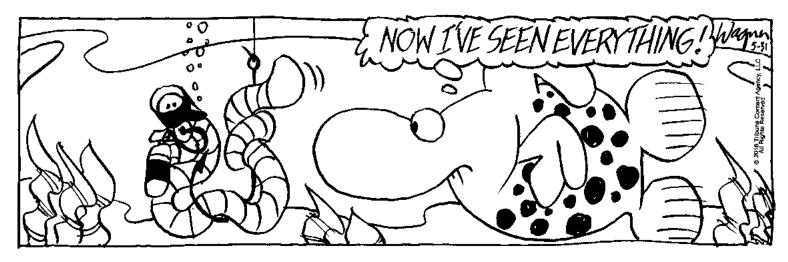

## The Back Streets of Bohemian Montmartre By Rick Steves

Montmartre, the hilltop neighborhood hovering on the northern fringes of your Paris city map, is in many ways the perfect French cliche: red-and-white checkered tablecloths, artist's easels filling petite squares, and bohemian cabarets offering up high-kicking cancans. The literal high point is the bone-white Sacre-Coeur Basilica, from where the City of Light fans out at your feet.

Just over a century ago, Montmartre hosted a perfect storm of artistic creativity and avant-garde thinking. Back then, life on the hill was a working-class commotion of cafes, bistros and dance halls. Its low rents lured struggling artists whose canvases now sell for millions (Renoir, Degas, Picasso, Toulouse-Lautrec, Utrillo).

These days, the hill is equal parts charm and kitsch - still vaguely small-town rustic but mobbed with tourists and pickpockets on sunny weekends. But if all you do is eat an overpriced crepe and marvel at the views, you will have missed out on Montmartre's charm and history. To get away from the crowds, take a walk on the back streets, where a bit of village Montmartre survives.

A stroll takes you amid the traces of the many people who've lived here over the years: monks stomping grapes (1200s), farmers grinding grain in windmills (1600s), dust-coated gypsum miners (1700s), Parisian liberals (1800s), Modernist painters (1900s), and all the struggling artists, poets, dreamers and drunkards who called Montmartre home.

Start at the Montmartre Museum, tucked away on the side of the hill. This 17th-century manor house (the oldest building in Montmartre) offers the best look at the history of the neighborhood and the amazing period from 1870 to 1910, when so much artistic action percolated here. In its day, the house was the meeting place for a who's who of artists, including Auguste Renoir, Raoul Dufy, and Maurice Utrillo (whose gorgeously lit attic studio is a highlight).

Montmartre was the perfect escape from grimy Paris. Rents went down as the hill went up, so younger, more avant-garde artists lived on the "butte," the top of the hill. In 1904, a poor, unknown Spaniard named Pablo Picasso moved into an artists' abode - Le Bateau-Lavoir - that he shared with 10 others. In his studio he painted his radically modern "Les Demoiselles d'Avignon" - and revolutionized 20th-century art.

Long ago a wall separated Paris from Montmartre, and to enter the city you passed through tollbooths that taxed anything for sale. Budget-minded drinkers took to the hill to drink tax-free beverages. In those days, Montmartre was blanketed with grape vines, reverentially tended by the monks and nuns of a large abbey. Today, just one Montmartre vineyard is still under cultivation - the pocket-sized Clos Montmartre, which produces about 800 bottles a year (off-limits to tourists except for an annual grape-harvest fest in October).

A favorite local hotspot was the ivy-covered cabaret called Au Lapin Agile. A poster above the door gave the place its name: a rabbit ("lapin" in French) makes an agile leap out of a pot while balancing the bottle of wine that he can now drink - rather than be cooked in.

This is where artists and writers gathered to perform serious poetry, recite dirty limericks, or deliver anarchist manifestos. Once, in a practical joke on the establishment art community, patrons tied a paintbrush to the tail of the owner's donkey and entered the resulting "abstract painting" in an art show (it won critical acclaim and sold for a nice price). Even today, the old personality of Au Lapin Agile survives, with jazz or blues jam sessions taking over the basement most nights.

Montmartre was once dotted with 30 windmills, used to press the monks' grapes and mill farmers' grain. Two of these functional windmills still stand, but nowadays, the most famous is the "Red Windmill" - the Moulin Rouge dance hall.

When it opened in 1889, the lively nightclub seemed to sum up the pleasure-seeking belle epoque. Most nights, Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec was among the customers, busily sketching as pretty cancan girls kicked their legs. He'd been hired to create the cabaret's advertising, and the colorful posters he made of cabaret singers, dancers, and club owners are now among the most recognizable works hanging in museums anywhere (including Paris' Musee d'Orsay).

By the way, at the foot of Montmartre is Paris's red light district, the infamous Pigalle (or "Pig Alley," as American soldiers nicknamed it during WWII). Ooh la la! If you venture here, stick to the bigger streets, hang on to your wallet, and exercise good judgment. Avoid the bars, where a 150 euro bottle of what would otherwise be cheap champagne comes with a friend.

Montmartre today retains some of the untamed appeal that drew finde-siecle bohemians and nonconformists to its winding lanes. As you wander, you may catch an echo of the free spirits who once partied, painted, and cancanned here.

If you visit here are some tips:

*Sleeping:* Le Relais Montmartre has 26 cozy rooms with plenty of amenities (splurge, www.relaismontmartre.fr). Hotel Basss offers snappy modern rooms with splashes of color (moderate, www.hotel-basss.com).

*Eating:* The raucous La Fourmi cafe/bar has affordable lunches and generous cheese plates (74 Rue des Martyrs, tel. 01 42 64 70 35). Autour de Midi et Minuit is a classic French bistro sitting on top of a jazz cellar (11 Rue Lepic, tel. 01 55 79 16 48).

**Getting Around:** Montmartre is a hill. To get to the top without having to climb, take the funicular that rides up to Sacre-Coeur Basilica, or catch the Montmartrobus city bus that runs from the Pigalle Metro stop. **Tourist Information:** www.parisinfo.com.
