

PER CAPITA This is a reminder that if you have not yet made your per capita payment, your per capita fee of \$48/member can be paid at any time during the year. The Per Capita fee is the assessment the church pays for

each member which goes to the larger Presbyterian Church of PCUSA to provide funds for the operation of the Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly offices, as well as some of the mission programs of the denomination (PCUSA).

Our church is assessed \$48 per member and pays this fee out of the budgeted funds of the General Fund. If paying by check make the check out to the church and note on the memo line "Per Capita".

"A Word with Wanona"

I would like to introduce Carol McCullough who will be sharing her life journey for the October tag game. Carol was born on August 31, 1928 in a Fargo, ND hospital. She was raised on a farm near Chaffee, ND with an older sister. They were raised on a farm, but never learned how to milk a cow or ride a horse! Carol graduated from Chaffee High School, and went to the Bismarck Hospital School of Nursing, a 3 year course back then. Carol's first job (as a child) was dusting furniture, which she still hates to this day! As an adult she was a Registered Nurse in Fargo, ND (St Luke's Hospital) and Eugene, Oregon. She said "I was working at St Luke's in Fargo when the polio virus landed. We wore masks, white gowns, and gloves in an isolated unit! There was no air conditioning at that time, and it was Hot! We put hot wet packs on their arms and legs when needed, and we had 2 patients on iron-lungs. One of the patients on an iron-lung was pregnant, and I helped deliver her baby!"

She met her husband, Bill one night after her shift at St Luke's. She was waiting at the front door for the rain to stop, and a young Intern came up and asked her if she wanted a ride home? She said "yes!"

Three years later they were married.

Three goals Carol wanted to accomplish:

*Get married

*Have children

*Learn how to "water ski"

She doesn't have just one memorable event in her life, she says "I really don't know, there were so many!" There was the summer that she finally was able to water ski. They had a place at Lake Metigoshe, but their boat was too powerful and she couldn't get up on the skis. A neighbor offered to

take her out, with their less powerful boat and she was able to get up and ski around the whole lake! Check that off her list, all goals achieved!

Her husband, Bill is her hero! Bill served in WWII for 2 years, was a General Physician in Bottineau, ND; then went back to school for Radiology. When asked



about the funniest thing that has happened to her she shrugs and says "I really don't remember,

but my 3 children, and 6 grand children say I'm 'funny' all the time!"

Carol became a member of the church in 1964, all 3 of their children were baptized at First Presbyterian Church (Kristy, Marshall "Marsh", and Cameron "Cam") it was still the old church building. She was a deacon twice, volunteered as an usher/greeter, and helped cook for the

PresbyTeens. Carol and Eran Severn gave a children's story at an early service one Easter Sunday. They had different size eggs and real live

"bunnies" they almost lost control but the kids loved it! They brought the eggs and bunnies from the zoo. Carol is thankful for good health, and getting to travel to many countries including: Norway, Japan, Guam, Fiji

and camping their way to Alaska with good friends!

October is another busy month with children and families into the full swing of school schedules and activities! Many children automatically associate October with Halloween celebrations or trick or treating. Here are a few suggestions for a safe, happy & healthy Halloween:

- * When preparing for the Ghosts and Goblins coming to your home: Remove any tripping hazards on porches, front yards such as garden hoses, toys, bikes, lawn & porch decorations.
- * Check outdoor lights and replace burned out bulbs.
- * Sweep & remove wet leaves from sidewalks and steps to prevent slipping on them.
- * Restrain pets when answering the door bell and handing out treats.
- * Hand out only individually wrapped treats.
- Consider offering non edible treats such as glow sticks, spider rings, pencils, bubbles, bouncy balls, finger puppets, bookmarks, stickers, stencils and keeping in mind age appropriate items and candy to prevent choking hazards with babies and toddlers.
- * Adults or parents should always accompany young children on their neighborhood rounds and pay close attention to examine all treats for any unwrapped or suspicious items.
- * If dark where you live, its always a good idea to carry a battery flashlight and use reflective tape for costumes and trick or treat bags. Consider going to earlier in the day Halloween activities if offered in your town.
- * Only go to homes with a porch light on.
- * Remain on well lit streets and always use the sidewalks. Never cut across yards or use alleys.
- * Only cross the street as a group and, if possible, in established crosswalks and not between parked cars, as motorists may have trouble seeing trick-or-treaters.
- * Its always a good idea to have your child eat a good meal prior to going to parties or trick-ortreating which will help discourage over eating or filling up on Halloween treats.


