#### PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE: "Marking Time"

When I was a little girl, the lead-up to Christmas morning was pure joy. The Advent family traditions that we repeated every year became markers of time passing and a countdown to myself and my siblings. First there was the tree decorating day, then there was candy-cane-hanging day; there was cookie making day, there was making decorations day and gift shopping day. One of our favorite activities was "drive-around-and-look-at-lights' evening." Whatever we ate the year before, we had to eat again, because having done it once, we considered it a tradition.

When I was older, my activities changed, but I still experienced the same sense of marking time. When I was in my 30s and 40s, and unmarried, I remember hoping that, when the next year came around, I would be coupled up with someone wonderful. After Audrey came into my life, the Advent seasons offered abundant opportunities to marvel at her growth and be grateful to God for her life and evolution. And now that she is 18 and in college, I find myself contemplating old Elmo and Disney Princess Christmas ornaments and wondering what her future will be like. Time passes, using old traditions as vehicles by which to mark change.

I think that is one of the functions of Christmas and Advent worship. Familiar songs, favorite stories with intimately loved characters like Mary, Joseph, Angels and Jesus, decorations that we recall from the years passed - they act as reminders of that which is unchangeable, and serve as markers by which we measure change. New babies, lost loved-ones, children grown and living away, teenagers who would rather be with friends than spend time around the tree with us, these experiences mark each year, and like Mary, who "treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart," (Luke 2:19), we too cherish change against the backdrop of the unchangeable.

And, when it is all said and done, it is the unchangeable the remains as an anchor while time drifts on. Stopping to celebrate the day in which God interrupted time and, motivated by rich and amazing love, Christ entered into history - the celebration of this act is a promise that in every change, God remains constant. The Apostle Paul reminded us that "NOTHING can separate us from the love of God which is in Christ our Lord" and this year as we celebrate together, let us rejoice in the reminder of the God who took great action in order to secure an eternal relationship with us. See the baby in the manger and say with me, "Thanks be to God for this wonderful gift!"

#### FINANCIAL REPORT

A donation of \$10,000 was made to the Parish Nurse Fund. Any year-end deficit will be covered by the General Fund.

#### **MODERATOR'S REPORT**

Session will consider a marketing plan to increase visibility/publicity in our community. Leaders in creating a plan will be Elders Rusty Bender and Becky Mahlum. An I-pad on a tripod may be an alternative for streaming services when Josh Stokka is not available. Bookcases with some of Grael Gannon's theological texts are in the gathering room. Pastor Leanne thanked the following Elders who will complete their terms the end of December: Shari Orser, Cindy Cross, Paul Ronningen, and Kim Wassim.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

Administrative and Personnel—The following were named Committee Chairs for the coming year:

Administrative and Personnel-Dale Hoerauf Resource Management—Jim Skaret Proclamation-Christian Education-Becky Rosenkranz Proclamation-Worship and Music-Rusty Bender and Signe Snortland Property and Equipment—Matt Engel Hospitality-Diann Johnson Child Care Center Board—Juanita Hocking Other Elders will serve as follows: Chris Henriksen-Administrative/Personnel; Bill Jensen-Christian Education; Becky Mahlum-Hospitality.

Hospitality—Red/green potluck is December 11. Donations to Youthworks and the Homeless Coalition were made. Canned foods were collected for the Emergency Food Pantry.

Proclamation-CE—Children's Program will be December 11. They will be helping with Breakfast with Santa on December 3.

Proclamation—Worship/Music—Advent music program by choir and bell choir will be December 18.

**Property and Equipment**—New lighting for the playground and east side of the church was installed.

Resource Management—Session approved using about \$20,000 of the HVAC Fund to repair duct defusers to improve airflow system in the Child Care Center. The work will be done by Northern Plains. Session approved a few adjustments to the 2023 Budget: added \$10,000 to General Fund Interest and adjusted per capita which will be \$50.00 per member. Total income is \$525,651 and total expense is \$590,921, with Net Income a deficit \$65.270.

**Board of Deacons**—Poinsettias will be delivered in December.

Child Care Center Board—Breakfast with Santa will be December 3, 9:30-11:30 with Scout Troop serving pancakes and other crafts and activities provided by Christian Education Committee and Pastor Leanne. The Tree of Love benefits CCC families. Session approved the 2023 CCC Budget: \$418,300 income, \$423,149 expense with net income deficit \$4,849.

**Nominating**—Session approved Alice Nix to serve as Deacon for one year in place of Allen Hoberg.

Anniversary—Plans for high tea, children's activities, a tent and food vendors continue.


