C.C.A. Offers Pre-Boarding Meetings for **Information on Open Board Positions**

On Tuesday, November 2, 2021, Iowans across the state will head to the polls to vote for the men and women who will govern the education of more than 483,000 students. Local communities elect school board members every other year for fouryear terms.

At Clear Creek Amana Community School District (CCA CSD), four school board positions are open for election. The Iowa Association of School Boards urges the public to make education a priority by paying attention to local campaigns and voting on Nov. 2.

Whether you are planning to run for a seat on the Clear Creek Amana Community School Board this November or considering doing so at some point in the future, becoming informed about the work of the board is important to best serve the students, staff and entire community.

That is why the School Board and District are hosting "Pre-Boarding" Meetings. These events are opportunities to share information on the work and responsibilities of a School Board, review major issues that come before the board, and answer questions about the work.

- Tuesday, August 24th, Oak Hill Elementary from 6-7:30 PM
- Saturday, August 28, Clear Creek Elementary 10-11:30 AM
- Sunday, August 29, North Bend Elementary 4-5:30 PM

While there is no "ideal" board member profile, the Iowa Association of School Boards suggests voters look for these basic characteristics in candidates in order to elect effective board members.

- They must have a laser-like focus on improving achievement for all students.
- They act with professionalism and integrity when monitoring district finances.
- · They understand the board's roles and responsibilities.
- They work well as a member of a team.
- They can commit the time and energy required to be effective.

School board members are elected to serve four-year terms, with elections taking place in oddnumbered years. Those elected receive no pay. Experienced school board members say the rewards of service lie in meeting the needs of children and communities.
