Thank you for your time and as always, we appreciate every one of you!







- 1. Never quit learning. So you finished your first champion. Won your first NOHS BIS. Won your first group. Your first regular BIS. Your second, Your third. You're at the top in your breed. Don't think you can't be better, do better. Don't think you know too much to profit from a handling class, or from watching the groups, or asking a pro for advice. You will never know all there is to know. The only difference is how fast you learn as much as you can—and where you stop because you think you know everything.
- 2. Have more than one goal for everything. When you go to a show, your primary goal is probably to win. But if that's your only goal, you've squandered your day. Other goals may be to watch the pros and learn, watch another breed and learn, help out at the show, socialize a puppy, make friends... When you breed a litter, your primary goal is to produce nice puppies. Other goals will be to place them in great homes, to help newcomers get a start, learn about how your line matures, make friends... When you go on social media, your primary goal may be to brag about a win. Other goals might include to inform others about some aspect of your breed, give advice, learn about dogs elsewhere in the world, make friends...When you campaign a dog, your primary goal may be to finish #1, but it can also be to educate judges, to win specialties, to show others what you think your breed should look like, to be the best breeder-owner-handled dog, to have fun!
- 3. Be willing to fail. The hardest part of showing a dog is showing up. Before you send in your entries you can be filled with self-doubt. Is it worth going to your National, or Westminster, where you're unlikely to win? You can't win if you don't go. There's not a single successful handler who hasn't dragged themselves to a show they thought they stood no chance at, only to leave with the ultimate prize. How many times have we stayed home and wondered what would have happened had we gone? In truth, chances are you'd have lost but there's also the very real chance you wouldn't have. Take a chance. Stagnating is the same as losing. In the long run, you'll regret not going more than you'll regret going---win or lose.
- 4. Network with successful people. "If you want to fly with the eagles don't swim with the ducks." I'm not saying ditch your unsuccessful friends; I'm saying don't spend your time with them quacking about how unfair the dog show world is, how the day's judge was a moron, or how crooked everything is. If that's how you really feel, and what you spend your time doing, then why would you go to shows at all? Whining never helped anyone succeed. Sure, it feels good for a bit, but your time is better spent associating with others who aspire to, or have attained, success. You hang around with your own level. Raise it. Whiners will always be perceived as losers. Winners don't whine.

- **5. Choose a good partner.** Sharing your exploits with somebody who shares your goals, vision and attitude is key to keeping you focused on those goals, visions and attitude. Going it alone is a tough haul. But so is partnering with a whiner or somebody who cuts corners. You are influenced and judged by the company you keep.
- **6.** Be confident, but not all-knowing. Successful people are confident. But they are confident enough to realize they don't know everything. They are willing to learn from the rankest novice as well as acknowledged experts. They are not so attached to their own ideas that they can't listen to, and seriously consider, opposing ones.
- 7. Sacrifice for your dreams. You can't have it all. Dog showing takes money, time and work—all of which you have to take away from other pleasures and goals in life. There's nothing wrong with saying you'd rather spend your money on a new car, your time with your family, or your work toward your career. Just acknowledge that others who choose to spend all their assets on dog show success will probably get ahead of you. Be happy with your well-rounded life and don't whine that your half-effort isn't placing you before those with a full-effort.
- 8. Love what you do. Unless you are a well-paid professional, showing dogs is a thankless pastime. We sacrifice and in exchange receive the all-too-occasional thrill of victory and the all-too-common suspicions and gossip of our competitors. Most of us push on because we love our dogs and our breed and the sport. If you are just out for the win or the adulation---then you better quit now.
- 9. Have the best ammunition. Obviously, the best ammunition is a good dog, good handler, and lots of money. But many people have risen to the top missing one of these components. Missing two of them—probably not. Missing all three—no. If you don't have a lot of money, make sure you have a lot of dog. I am not a proponent of rehoming a not-so-good dog; to me, that defeats the joy of sharing the journey with the dog that makes it all worthwhile. That's a sacrifice I won't make. But I am a proponent of looking at your dog objectively, adding a better representative to your family, and having your original take the very important role of stable pony while the new one takes over as show dog! Good dogs, presented well, will win under good judges in the long run.
- 10. Be kind. Winners take the time to help others feel welcome, improve their skills, and share their joy. Losers feel threatened by others to the point they discourage them, refuse to help, and diminish any joy the others may have. Make others a part of your team by helping them and allowing them to help you. Yes, we've all helped newcomers who turned on us, but (hopefully) we've helped even more who went on to better the breed or support our own endeavors in return. Winners are kind.





AKC CODE OF SPORTSMANSHIP

PREFACE: The sport of purebred dog competitive events dates prior to 1884, the year of AKC's birth. Shared values of those involved in the sport include principles of sportsmanship. They are practiced in all sectors of our sport: conformation, performance, and companion. Many believe that these principles of sportsmanship are the prime reason why our sport has thrived for over one hundred years. With the belief that it is useful to periodically articulate the fundamentals of our sport, this code is presented.

- Sportsmen respect the history, traditions, and integrity of the sport of purebred dogs.
- Sportsmen commit themselves to values of fair play, honesty, courtesy, and vigorous competition, as well as winning and losing with grace.
- Sportsmen refuse to compromise their commitment and obligation to the sport of purebred dogs by injecting personal advantage or consideration into their decisions or behavior.
- The sportsman judge judges only on the merits of the dogs and considers no other factors.
- The sportsman judge or exhibitor accepts constructive criticism.
- The sportsman exhibitor declines to enter or exhibit under a judge where it might reasonably appear that the judge's placements could be based on something other than the merits of the dogs.
- The sportsman exhibitor refuses to compromise the impartiality of a judge.
- The sportsman respects the AKC bylaws, rules, regulations and policies governing the sport of purebred dogs.
- Sportsmen find that vigorous competition and civility are not inconsistent and are able to appreciate the merit of their competition and the effort of competitors.
- Sportsmen welcome, encourage and support newcomers to the sport.
- Sportsmen will deal fairly with all those who trade with them.
- Sportsmen are willing to share honest and open appraisals of both the strengths and weaknesses of their breeding stock.
- Sportsmen spurn any opportunity to take personal advantage of positions offered or bestowed upon them.
- Sportsmen always consider as paramount the welfare of their dog.
- Sportsmen refuse to embarrass the sport, the American Kennel Club, or themselves while making part in the sport.




