

2021 Mullet Festival Features Something for Everyone

The biggest day of the year is on the horizon for the Optimist Club of Perdido Bay. The 35th Annual Mullet Festival is on the calendar for Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 6, at the Lillian Community Club. This is the event that raises the majority of the funds to provide special events for area children.

The day begins with the famous Optimist Club breakfast at 7 a.m. featuring eggs, sausage, pancakes, grits, biscuits and gravy, fruit and drinks for only \$5 and kids age 8 and younger eat free.

The 5K race registration is held from 6 to 7 a.m. Runners may also sign up online at runtrimag.com/ race-events/mullet-festival-5k-1mile-fun-run. The 5K race begins at 7:30, followed by the fun run at 8:30. Also in the race category are a 5K walk and a 5K wheelchair race.

The \$25 fee for the 5K run, the wheelchair race and the 5K walk includes a specially designed Mullet Festival t-shirt. The fee for the fun run is \$15 with a t-shirt or FREE without the shirt.

The mullet toss will be held from 10 a.m. to noon. The kids' fun station will be open from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

While all the events are taking place outside, the inside fun from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. includes a silent auction and the ever-popular Déjà Vu Market featuring gently used items such as jewelry, toys and household items. Jake and the Tag-A-Longs will be entertaining with their popular music from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Take a break at 11 a.m. to partake of the fried mullet/catfish lunch that will be served until 2 p.m. This repast consists of the fish, ham hush puppies, beans, grits, slaw, dessert and tea. Cost is \$10 per person and once again, kids under 8 eat free.

Homemade desserts will be available at the bake sale all day long. The 50/50 drawing will be held at 2:15 p.m. Tickets are now available from any Optimist Club member and will be available for purchase at the festival. Participants

Local Church Displaying Flags of Peace Sept. 9-12



It has been 20 years since the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001, and it's time again to rally around the flag.

Flags of Peace will be flying from Sept. 9 - 12 in front of Peace Lutheran Church on the Beach Express in Foley. Set in a grid pattern on 7.5 foot tall poles, the flags are in honor or remembrance of American heroes such as first responders, military past and present, and anyone you would like to honor with Old Glory.

Flags are \$35 each and can be purchased through the church online at www.peacelutheranal.org/ fieldofflags, by calling 251-974 2545 or at the event on Sept. 10 and 11. Flags may be decorated as you like to let others know who the flag is in honor of. Over a hundred flags will be flying and the public is welcome to walk through and read the messages on the flags. After Sunday service, the flags are yours to keep. Saturday's 9/11 memorial service is set with guest speakers and patriotic music. There will be flag-folding ceremonies, first responder demonstrations and a flag retirement ceremony.

Entertainment is slated throughout the weekend as well as food and the church bakery. A portion of the proceeds will go to the church's Helping Kids Thrive program and local first responders.

The program is open from noon to dusk on Friday, Sept. 10. On Saturday, Sept. 11, a ceremony and program begins at 9 a.m. with other events throughout the day. A bake sale and food will be available from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Church service will be held at 10 a.m. Sunday, Sept. 12.



Events, Speakers Planned for 2021 AACW Annual Convention

The Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women (ACCW) will host their annual convention Oct. 31, Nov. 1 and 2 at Perdido Beach Resort in Orange Beach. The Baldwin Escambia Deanery is hosting this year. In addition to the Baldwin Deanery, the ACCW also includes Mobile, Montgomery and Dothan deaneries.

The theme for this 85th annual event is "Hope Anchors the Soul" with emphasis on hope during these troubling times.

Gary Zimak will be the keynote speaker at the Tuesday night banquet. He is recognized as the leading Catholic speaker on the topic of overcoming anxiety, the author of several books and a frequent speaker at parishes and conferences across the country.

Fr. Vincent Ingalls, Archdiocesan Director of Vocations, will speak at the Monday lunch focusing on hope and his work in the archdiocese with seminarians. After lunch Reverend Msgr. William J. Skoneki, V.G. will head a panel discussion "Lifeline to Hope" with emphasis on dealing with troubling times and the loss of hope that could lead to suicide.

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Taking Time to Praise All Our Wonderful Local Volunteers

It was pretty much like any other day for my husband and I. We had been retired for about 10 years and so nothing important was on our schedule, except maybe breakfast. So we piled into our car and headed out to Waffle House on Hwy. 98 and Blue Angel.

As usual, we had the National Public Radio station on, listening to whomever was keeping us up to date. Then someone broke into the mundane stories of the day and announced that a plane had crashed into the World Trade Building in New York.

It's a wonder we didn't crash into the side of the bridge. We couldn't believe our ears. We continued on to breakfast and told the servers what we heard. While we were there, the second plane hit. What a terrible situation for our nation!

I'm sure you all have stories about where you were that day, just as if you are old enough, you remember what you were doing when JFK was shot.

Now, 20 years after 9/11 we are taking a special pause to remember those first responders, those moms, dads, sons and daughters who died or were injured searching for survivors. To commemorate their sacrifices, the Optimist Club of Perdido Bay is dedicating their Sept. 11 meeting with Patriots Day to remember those who gave their lives and those who still have health problems, both physical and mental, from what they experienced that day.

But they are not stopping there. They are also honoring our own first responders, the Lillian Volunteer Fire Department, members of the American Legion and those men and women still serving our nation in the military services.

When I received the OCPB information I was pleased. We need to thank those who serve us. As I was thinking about what to write, I thought of many more volunteers who serve us in many ways, so I decided to bring them into the limelight, too.

First on the list, of course, are Baldwin County and Alabama sheriff's departments who are in the service of keeping our community safe. Lower Alabama Search and Rescue (LASAR) also comes to mind. Perhaps you've not heard of them. Their mission is to assist federal, state and local authorities in searches, recoveries and disaster relief operations. In other words, if your child or elderly relative goes missing, LASAR will be there to help. That's not all they do, but I feel better just knowing they are there.

How about your churches? Think of the volunteers who head up men's, women's and youth groups, collect and distribute food and other necessities to the needy. Have you noticed there is usually someone at the door to greet you as you attend a service?

Local Students Win 10th Place in Robotics Tourney

St. Benedict Catholic School is now known on the world stage thanks to students Lauren Wood and Lauren Baird who placed 10th in their division at the VEX IQ World Tournament.

The VEX IQ Challenge, presented by the Robotics Education & Competition Foundation, provides elementary and middle school students with exciting, open-ended robotics challenges that enhance their science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) skills through hands-on, student-centered learning. During the live remote event, over 1,600 teams from 30 countries and 49 states competed in timed robotics matches with custom-built robots.

Wood and Baird were the only team representing their region of Alabama in the middle school division.

"I am so incredibly proud of these young women for their creativity and perseverance," said SBCS Principal Dr. Kathy McCool.

"They worked hard to design, create, and compete with their robot. And that hard work certainly paid off."

How Grandparents Can Help Provide a Sound Financial Future

If you're a grandparent, you don't need Grandparents Day, observed on Sept. 12, to remind you of the joys of having grandchildren. Yet, you might want to use this day as an opportunity to think about ways to help provide for your grandchildren's future.

The type of gift or support you provide will be different at various stages of your grandchildren's lives. Here are a few suggestions:

When they're born...

• Open a 529 plan. It's never too early to start saving for college or other types of advanced education. To help your grandchildren meet these costs, you could invest in a 529 education savings plan, which offers potential tax advantages if the money is used for qualified education expenses. If the grandchild for whom you've established the account ends up not using it, you can change the beneficiary to a qualified family member of the original beneficiary. (Be aware, though, that a 529 plan could affect your grandchild's financial aid prospects.) If your grandchild doesn't go to a college or university, a 529 plan can also pay for expenses related to apprenticeship programs offered through trade and vocational schools and registered with the U.S. Department of Labor.

When they're children...

• Open a savings account. It's important for your grandchildren to develop good financial habits – and one way you can help is to open a savings account for them and encourage them to contribute to it. You might even offer an incentive, such as matching their contributions, either in whole or in part. Consider shopping around for a high-yield savings account that's free to open and charges no monthly maintenance fees.

• Establish a custodial account. You may want to introduce your grandchildren to the world of investing by starting a custodial account (known as UGMA or UTMA) in their name. You can put most types of investments, such as stocks and mutual funds, inside this account and track their progress along with your grandchildren. Children often enjoy learning about investing - and they may like owning shares of companies that make familiar products and services. The earnings generated by these investments can have tax implications, so you'll want to consult with your tax advisor before opening the custodial account. And you can't hold onto this account forever - once your grandchildren reach the age of majority, they gain control of the account, so they can do what they please.

When they're young adults...

• Help with the down payment on a home. Once your grandchildren are out in the world, they may well want to become homeowners. And, as you know, it can be challenging to come

up with a down payment, so, if you can afford it, you may want to help. You'll be doing your grandchildren a big favor, because home ownership is a key element in building wealth.

• Provide financial guidance. The Lillian Volunteer Fire Department responded to 88 calls dispatched by the 911 operators in July including 51 medical assistance, 7 public assists, 6 motor vehicle accidents, 2 structure fires, 1 hazardous condition, 18 fire alarms/investigations and 3 aircraft stand-bys.

As many of you may know, every two years all our volunteers have the opportunity to either reelect the current fire chief or elect someone new. It certainly wasn't a hard decision to reelect Chief Nick Dewhurst after all he accomplished over the last two years.

This success is due to his great leadership as chief and he has accomplished several goals for the betterment of the department. Training has always been his main objective for a highly skilled and professional department.

He provided the opportunity for several volunteers to complete the Certified Volunteer Fire Fighter course, not only for our department, but also for neighboring departments. During Hurricane Sally, Dewhurst took the lead as Incident Command for Lillian

and in setting up а Point of Distributions

(POD) command post. This enabled Lillian residents to obtain much needed staples such as food, water, and tarps. Under his leadership we served 2,861 vehicles with over 2,000 cases of water, 18,000 MREs, 1,000 tarps, 18 pallets of ice and 5,000 hot meals.

Since the outbreak of Covid and the variant Delta, Dewhurst has enforced several strict protocols to ensure the safety of the department and community.

Having taken a sabbatical for several months, it was good to catch up with the Lower Alabama Search and Rescue (LASAR) unit in Lillian. New members joined and experienced members have moved into lead roles. Deputy Commander John Wade was appointed committee chairman for water rescue events by the AARS state rescue association. This is great recognition of his expertise and an honor for LASAR to have a member on this state committee.

Members Michael Brower, Jacob Brower and Charles Elliser were recognized as Outstanding Service Members during the July meeting. They were thanked for their volunteer service in maintaining the equipment and helping other members learn to do the same.

The unit has also been busy supporting many events, including the Blue Angels Air Show. LASAR provided spotter and rescue boats and the Incident Command Bus was used to communicate with responders on site.

A disinfectant fog machine with supplies, vehicle decontamination kits and lots of PPE were donated to LASAR via a State of Alabama program to support accredited and certified rescue squads. This program helps volunteer squads like LASAR save money by not having to purchase these supplies.

Eight members of LASAR along with other Baldwin County and Alabama state agencies participated in the Elberta Night Out on Aug. 3. The National Night Out program is an opportunity for members of the community to meet local first responders in person and to see the equipment used during emergencies. A medivac helicopter, fire truck, SWAT humvee and other equipment were on site for kids and adults to view and walk through.

LASAR brought their Incident Command Bus and demonstrated the multiple communication radios available to use during an emergency. LASAR also had the Dive Team Truck available, showing all of the equipment needed to support divers when on scene. And always a favorite with kids, LASAR had their red side-by-side ATV onsite.

The Alabama Association of Rescue Squads (AARS) state conference will be held at the Wharf Conference Center in Orange Beach from Nov 10 - 13. Many medical and first respond-

er units will have booths open to the public. LASAR members and other first responders will be able to take accelerated certification training but register need to online before the event.

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
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Remembering the 20th Anniversary of September 11

It is hard to believe that it is the twentieth anniversary of 9/11. Sept. 11, 2001, was a sad day for our nation. Most of us can recall exactly where we were and what we were doing when we heard the tragic news.

I was in a meeting with area ministers when my wife paged me and when I called, she said you need to get home and see what is happening in New York City.

I arrived home just in time to see the second plane crash into the second tower. The rest of the day was spent watching the news in disbelief.

On that day at 8:46 a.m. EDT - American Airlines Flight #11 collides into the World Trade Center; at 9:03 a.m. EDT -United Airlines Flight #175 collides into the World Trade Center South Tower; at 9:37 a.m. EDT – American Airlines Flight #77 crashes into the Pentagon; at 9:59 a.m. EDT - World Trade Center South Tower collapses; at 10:03 a.m. EDT - United Airlines Flight #93 crashed in Shanksville, Penn.; and at 10:28 a.m. EDT - World Trade Center North Tower collapses. I will never forget the sorrow of watching the towers collapse and seeing people walking the streets dazed and covered in dust.

On Aug. 31, 2002, then-President George W. Bush proclaimed Friday, Sept. 6, through Sunday, Sept. 8, 2002, as National Days of Prayer and Remembrance and Sept. 11, 2002, as the first Patriot Day recognition.

We will gather at Lillian Community Club on Saturday, Sept. 11, 2021, at 8 a.m. for a Patriot Day

Breakfast sponsored by the Optimist Club of Perdido Bay to honor all first responders, fire fighters and service men and women and remember those who died on this sad day.

Patriot Day is a time for us to pause and honor the memory of the nearly 3,000 innocent people who were murdered by terrorists in the brutal attacks of Sept. 11, 2001.

We pray for those whose lives were forever changed by the loss of a loved one. We strengthen our resolve to stand together as one nation. On that day we saw true heroism in the work of New York's police, firefighters and first responders.

I doubt that any of us not directly related had given much thought to the life-threatening danger these public servants lived with day in and day out until that day. We saw their courage and dedication, and it was a marvel to behold.

When asked, "What can I do to help in the war on terror?" President Bush answered, "Overcome evil with acts of goodness. Love a neighbor. Reach out to somebody in need. Feed someone who is hungry. Teach a child to read or join in community efforts to prepare for

Finding the Highest Purpose in Life

"While Jesus was having dinner at Matthew's house, many tax collectors and sinners came and ate with him and his disciples. When the Pharisees saw this, they asked his disciples, 'Why does your teacher eat with tax collectors and sinners?' On hearing this, Jesus said, 'It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick."" (Matthew 9:10-13)

Matthew the apostle had been a dishonest tax collector driven by greed until Jesus Christ chose him as a disciple. Matthew was not a stand-out character in the Bible. He is only mentioned by name in the lists of apostles and in the account of his calling. Matthew is traditionally identified as the author of the Gospel of Matthew.

We first meet Matthew in Capernaum, in his tax booth on the highway. He was collecting duties on goods brought by farmers, merchants and caravans. Under the Roman Empire's system, Matthew would have paid all the taxes in advance, then collected from the citizens and travelers to reimburse himself. Tax collectors were notoriously corrupt because they extorted far and above what was owed to ensure their personal profit. Because their decisions were enforced by Roman soldiers, no one dared object.

Matthew, whose father was Alphaeus, was named Levi before his call by Jesus. We do not know whether Jesus gave him the name Matthew or whether he changed it himself, but the name means "the gift of God."

On the same day Jesus invited Matthew to follow him, Matthew threw a great feast in his home in Capernaum, inviting his friends so they could meet Jesus, too. From that time on, instead of collecting tax money, Matthew collected souls for the kingdom of God.

Despite his sinful past, Matthew was uniquely qualified to be a disci-

ple. He was an accurate record keeper and keen observer of people. He captured the smallest details. Those traits served him well when he wrote the Gospel of Matthew some 20 years later.

By surface appearances, it was scandalous and offensive for Jesus to pick a tax collector as one of his closest followers since collectors were widely hated by the Jews. Yet of the four Gospel writers, Matthew presented Jesus to the Jews as their hoped-for Messiah, tailoring his account to answer their questions. Matthew displayed one of the most radically changed lives in response to an invitation from Jesus. Once committed, he never wavered in serving

Jesus. He left behind a life of wealth and security for uncertainty. He abandoned everything else for the promise of eternal life. Following the death and resurrection of Jesus, Matthew preached around Jerusalem for 15 years then went to other countries. We have only theories to his death, but likelihood is martyrdom in Ethiopia.

God can use anyone to help him in his work. We should not feel unqualified because of our appearance, lack of education or our past. Jesus looks for sincere commitment. We should also remember the highest calling in life is serving God, no matter what the world says. Money, fame and power cannot compare with being a follower of Jesus Christ.




