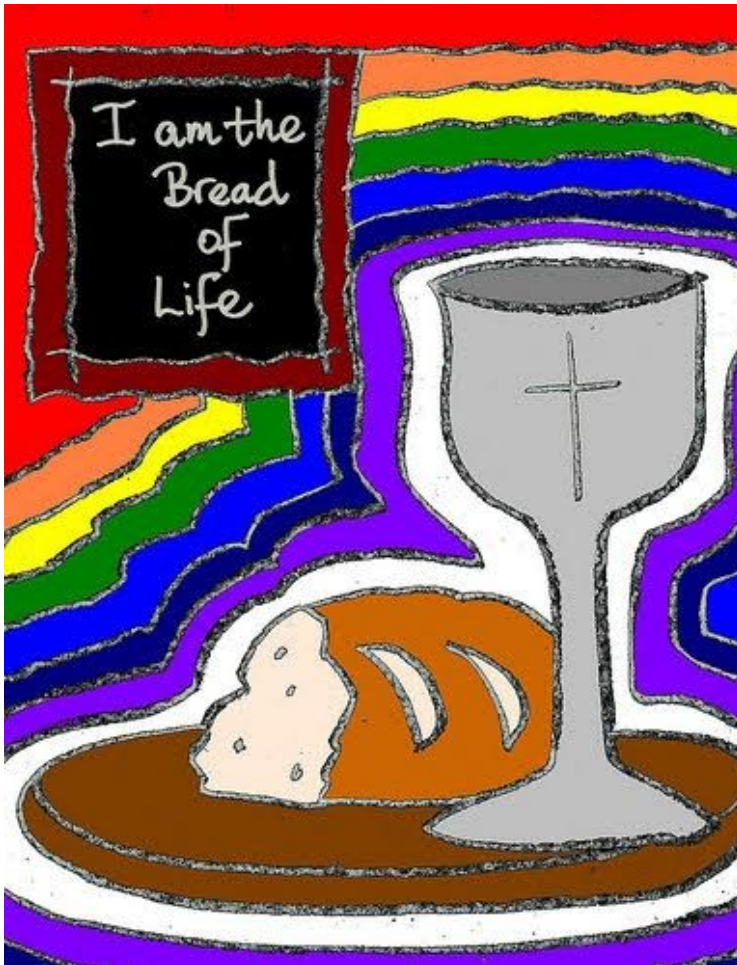

Vicar's Notes



Bread & peace

In August, Jesus as the Bread of Life is a central theme in our liturgy. The Gospel readings each week will invoke his teaching, "I am the bread of life." What does this mean - for you and me? How is Jesus' message - Jesus himself - bread for the world? We will explore this and more in our worship together this month. Each week, we will have a special opportunity to reflect on the connection between the common, ordinariness of bread as a symbol, as well as the mystery and meaning behind the symbol - hopefully we will do this in some fun ways. The first Sunday in August, we will receive a new batch of the bread we

use at the Eucharist, and dedicate (set it aside) for that use. Many of you know, but some may not, that Vivian Costello bakes the bread from scratch for both churches. When we use this home-made bread, we are - as one of the old prayers says - presenting bread that "earth has given and human hands have made."

During the month, while we reflect in part on the teaching of Jesus who is the "bread of life", we can remember that part of the story of Jesus is the incarnation: Jesus present in a specific time and place as a human person, and thus, our own connection and rela-

tionship with the earth around us, and other people. Listen for announcements and watch emails for some ways you can participate in celebrating Jesus and the bread of life!

Another thing to note about our worship in August is a change to when we exchange "the peace". Our Book of Common Prayer allows us to exchange the peace not only after the Confession, but also after the Eucharistic Prayer (before we receive communion). For the month of August, we will follow this rubric and exchange the Peace before moving forward for Communion. Why? Change can sometimes help us raise questions we haven't thought of before, or don't think about often enough: why do we exchange peace anyway? Or, "Why does it matter where we say the peace? Sometimes, a change just helps us highlight the importance of something we can take for granted when we do it by rote. Scripturally, it allows us to practice liturgically what the Bible says about presenting offerings (Matthew 5:23-24)

If you are offering your gift at the altar, and then remember that your sibling has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your sibling, and then come and offer your gift.

By moving the Peace to the end of the Eucharistic prayer, rather than before the offering as we normally do, we make a practice of this command to leave our gifts and make peace, in the name of the Prince of Peace. We then can return to complete our offering, and to receive God's offering to us, which is the meal that sustains us in our work as peacemakers in the world around. We receive bread and become bread, we receive peace and we become peace - both for the life of the world. This will be a trial through August, and we can reflect together on the experience as we plan for worship in the coming months.

Join us as we continue our worship in "ordinary time" among two extraordinary communities seeking to love and serve God and our neighbors.

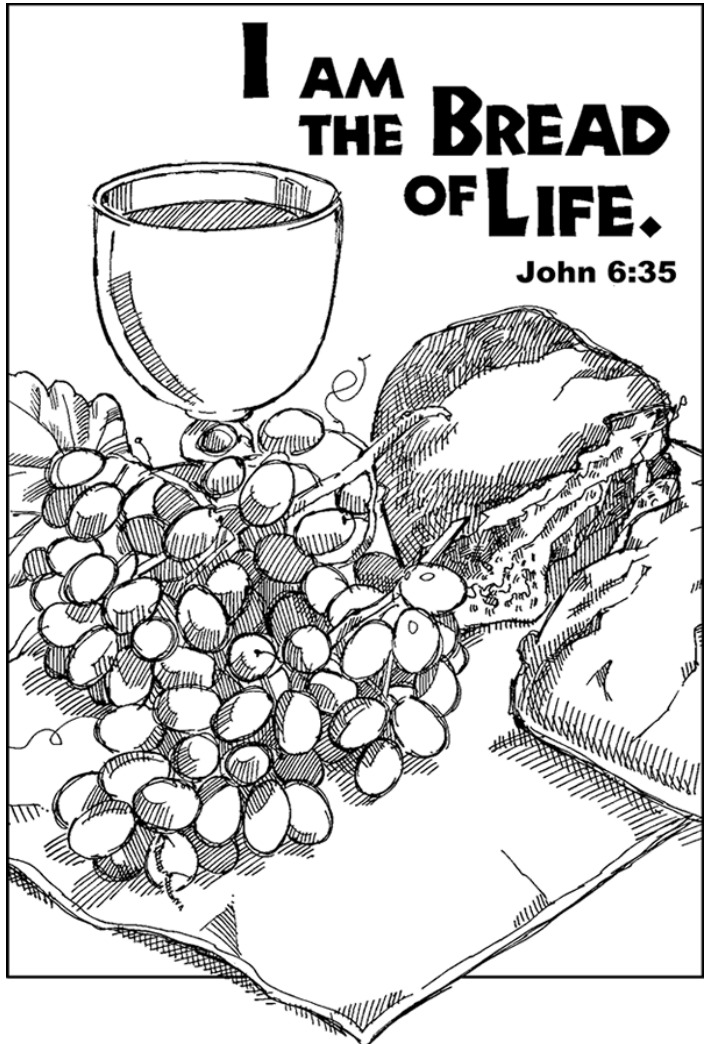
The New Jim Crow book group starting mid-September

A book group will be starting the week of September 15th to read and discuss The New Jim Crow by Michelle Alexander that addresses the current systemic problems of mass incarceration known as the “cradle to prison pipeline.” In the book, Ms. Alexander looks at the complex history of racial issues in our country, particularly in the south, that has resulted in black Americans being “born suspect” and forced into a problematic criminal system replacing old Jim Crow laws. Cornel West in his introduction calls this book, “the secular bible for a new social movement in early twenty-first century America.” He goes on to write, “We are witnessing the unique union of a powerful and poignant text with a democratic awakening focused on the poor and vulnerable in American society. “This book comes highly recommended by Bishop Marc and named as the Book Study of the Triennium at the last General Convention to encourage “study one of the most pressing social justice issues of our time, mass incarceration, and to move the minds and hearts of people of faith on this issue.” If you are interested in participating, email Julia McKeon, julia@holyfamilymb.org. 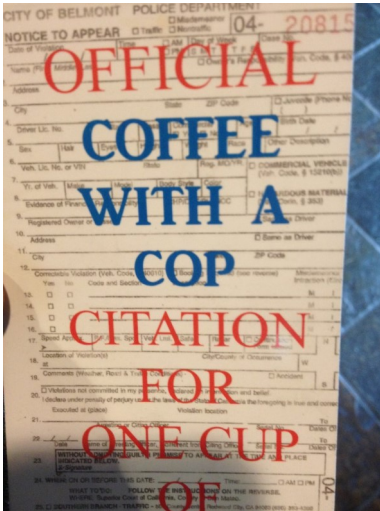

Backpack preparation/supply sorting: Friday, August 7th

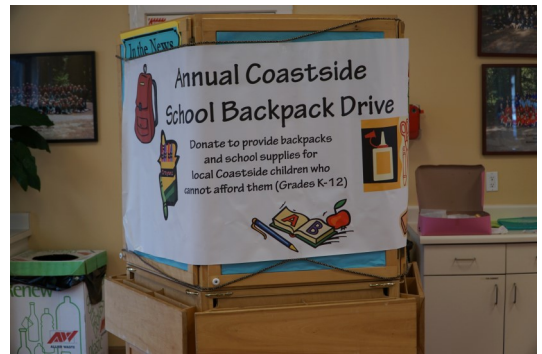
Backpack distribution: Saturday, August 8th

Shield the Vulnerable Training

As we distribute new keys at Holy Family, this is a good time to remind folks about the online training, "Shield the Vulnerable." This is a training course that helps make us aware of the signs of child abuse, and our responsibility to care for vulnerable persons as part of our Christian stewardship of human relations.

Anyone in the church who has a key to one of our buildings, and anyone who wishes to volunteer with youth or children, must have this training. Others are encouraged to take it as well. The training must be renewed every three years.

The training is offered online, and can be completed at your convenience! If you are required to complete the training, or renew it, please do so during August, and turn in your certificate (email or paper) to Vicar Michael.

Important: If you have already taken the training, you do not need to set up a "new account." This costs the church more money. If you have lost your login information, it can be retrieved through the website.

On the 1st Friday of the month, at 8:00 p.m. in the Chapel at Mercy Center Burlingame, prayers are held around the Cross. It is an opportunity to express our communion with those who are suffering and to commit all burdens to Christ who partakes in the suffering of humanity until the end of time.

In 1940 Brother Roger settled in the village of Taizé, France to offer a haven for political refugees. From the start the community was characterized by the search for peace and reconciliation in the human family. Brother Roger's intention was to gather together people who would commit themselves for life to celibacy and to live together, in order to form a "parable community."

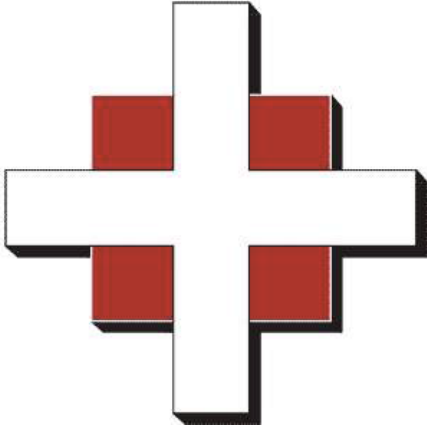
Today the ecumenical community that he founded includes Catholic and Protestant brothers from some 20 countries. Some brothers live in Taizé, others in fraternities among the poorest of the poor all over the world, in slums in Africa, Asia and South America.

Beginning in the 1960's thousands of young people have come to Taizé in their search for meaning. But Taizé has always refused to create a movement, instead encouraging people to become involved in local churches and society. That same spirit of peace and reconciliation, Mercy Center's Taizé services are attended by people of all ages. Join us on the first Friday evening of the month as we enter together in song.



Good Shepherd's

"I will make your windows of agates, and all your borders of pleasant stones." -- Isaiah 54:12



July 23, 2015

Dear Good Shepherd Friends and Family,

The passage from Isaiah, quoted above, is the antiphon traditionally used in the blessing of stained glass windows. Perhaps our spiritual ancestors at Good Shepherd prayed that antiphon in 1910 when the chapel, our original church, installed the beautiful stained glass that has accompanied us in prayer and inspired our worship for over a century! They have served beautifully, and we hope that they will for centuries to come.

After a century of exposure to earthquakes and elements, the three windows on the south side of the chapel have begun to show their age. These signs include buckling under heat and weight, wood rot in the frames holding them, missing and weakened leading and support bars, and cracks in some of the panes. The 2014 Bishop's Committee decided that good stewardship means restoring them for continued beauty and service in this house of prayer.

After prayerful and thoughtful review of several bids, we selected Helios Art Glass, a company that has worked on other Episcopal Churches and will be able to proceed with the work in a timely and affordable way. We are confident their work will be pleasing to us all when we see the windows reinstalled. This project will cost Good Shepherd \$22,000, which includes some light construction work to allow for removal of the windows, the restoration work to repair broken glass, reinforcing the windows with new leading and support bars, and the reinstallation of the cleaned and restored glass.



Last Sunday, we blessed the windows for their journey of restoration, and the windows were successfully removed without incident on Monday, July 20th. Fortunately, we have sufficient funding for this project. Through our church insurance company, and thanks to a \$5,000 gift from an anonymous donor, we have ample funding to initiate the project, which will commence on Monday, July 20th. We also have funding available to us through estate gifts from John Bailey and Hazel Ward, of blessed memory, that we may use to fund the balance of the project.

Windows Restoration



However, we do not want to deplete funds named for their memory, and we want to ensure there is funding for future chapel needs that may emerge.

Please consider a gift to the Good Shepherd Window Restoration Project to offset the cost and to ensure that we have funding for future needs to maintain the historic, beautiful chapel entrusted to our care. Enclosed you will find a response card and envelope, which you may use to indicate your pledge toward the window restoration through 2016. For your convenience this may be mailed to the church or placed in the offering plate on Sunday morning. We appreciate any amount you are able to contribute. Gifts and pledges received by August 30th will be blessed at our annual Rally Day Sunday, September 20th (gifts and pledges arriving after Rally day will

be blessed at a future service). In gratitude for contributions made, all donors will be recognized in our monthly newsletter and acknowledged among the historical photographs and documents displayed in the narthex of the chapel.

If you have any questions or would like more information about the current state of the windows, or the work to be completed, please do not hesitate to ask. Thank you for your consideration and your prayers for the ministry of the Good Shepherd, whose flock we are. We look forward to rededicating these windows to another century of service in God's house and for generations that will continue our prayers in ages to come.
