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## **CLERGY COLUMN**

Happy 11th Sunday in Ordinary Time!

Before last Sunday, it had been so long since we had had a Sunday in Ordinary Time - all the way back to February 11th. As I write this, I've looked at the readings for Mass, but don't yet know what I'll preach about. But one thing I've now remembered is how much I love the structure of the readings during Ordinary Time, even while it is also a little frustrating.

Some of us may know this, but the First Reading, the Psalm, and the Gospel are all meant to connect into one general theme. Sometimes the theme is very easy to notice and other times it can appear to be like something of a puzzle. And the theme is not a mandatory preaching topic by any means - priests and deacons are allowed to preach on anything they'd like, though the homily \*should\* be focused on the readings proclaimed during Mass. Anyway, the Gospel readings tend to simply move their way through the particular Gospel of the year (this year's Gospel is primarily from Mark, though we'll be taking a five-week break from it at the end of July and during the entire month of August). Sometimes there are passages skipped over, for various reasons that are not always easily understood, and other times one reading will pick right up where the previous reading left off. The First Readings, on the other hand, jump around the Old Testament (always the Old Testament during Ordinary Time), since the Church wanted to choose a passage that connects with the Gospel. The Psalm Response does the same thing, with everything being directed by the Gospel passage for the day. From my perspective, it's a fun and engaging challenge to find the connection and then to pray with the readings as I study them, to see what the Lord may be inspiring for a homily.

The Second Readings, however, present a different challenge. They are equally good in my mind - I mentioned last week how much I love St. Paul - but they are not intended to connect with the other readings. It's my understanding that the Church simply wanted to include more of St. Paul in the liturgy, so that more people could hear his insights, so they added a reading from one of the epistles when they reformed the liturgy after the Second Vatican Council. The challenge for me is that I often want to preach about the 2nd Reading while also wanting to preach about the Gospel. Now, I know I preach longer-than-average homilies, but can you imagine if I preached two homilies each Sunday? I can't imagine that would go over very well. Sometimes I'll try to make a connection, so that I can include all of the readings in the homily, but other times I'm left trying to figure out which to preach about. We're going to see this quite clearly during that five-week break from Mark in late-July and all of August. The 2nd Readings during those weeks are very good, but they are not at all easily connected with the Gospel readings. It's almost too much goodness!

Here's a reminder that I produce a Bible Study each week, three videos that take a little bit of time (usually 15 minutes or less) to look at each reading coming up for Mass. I release the videos on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays each week. Sometimes the videos have similar content as the homily and other times they aren't quite the same.

# Tale of two martyrs: Sts. Thomas More and John Fisher

The English saints St. Thomas More and St. John Fisher are buried side by side. Executed a couple of weeks apart, their offense was the same – denying that Henry VIII was supreme head of the church.

Despite being permanently entwined in the afterlife, their paths seldom crossed. They are often described as soul mates, but were they really friends?

The Tower of London was probably the place where these two men would have been most in each other's company. This is where any pilgrim will need to go in order to understand their piety in the face of adversity. It has often been stated that the two martyrs were imprisoned in the same building within the Tower. While this is probably not true, their bones were thrown together in a chapel within the royal complex.

The space they definitely shared was their place of execution. When you reach there, it would be a good time to say a prayer for the merciful end they both enjoyed. In a rare moment of compassion, Henry VIII changed the original sentence. As traitors to their king, they were supposed to be hanged, drawn and quartered, a punishment as excruciating and degrading as crucifixion. In the end they were beheaded, and neither was a botched job.

More and Fisher both spent over a year before their executions in the Tower of London. It has often been said that they shared adjacent cells in a building called the Bell Tower. In the absence of any proper accounts, it seems that only Fisher resided there. More was likely to have enjoyed a residence of comparative luxury. He visited Fisher at least once. His reaction, if it had ever been recorded, would have been despair for his fellow convict. St. Thomas lost some weight in custody; Fisher was left such a physical wreck the crowd at Tower Hill gasped when they saw him climb the scaffold. In a letter Fisher wrote to King Henry, he had to plead for food. The Cardinal-Bishop was even more distressed by the cold. He begged the king for clothing, "I have neither shirt nor sheet ..."

As for the rest of their remains, from the neck down, the two saints were dumped into an unmarked grave.
