PASTOR	LEANNE'S MESSACE	"WHEN WORDS FAIL"

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A lot of my time is spent using words, so it should come as no surprise that I think words are very powerful. Words are powerful when I say, "I now pronounce you husband and wife" or "I baptize you in the name of the Father Son, and Holy Spirit." They are powerful, when I hear our Child Care Workers correcting children with words that teach rather than scorn. They are powerful, when politicians use the vocabulary of violence to address their ideological opponents. They are powerful when a parent sits down with a child to explain how the world works and what makes life safe. They are powerful when lovers address their differences in terms that seek cooperation instead of domination.

But sometimes words fail - - and lately I have experienced that. When we or people we love are in pain, it is not unusual for one to wonder what to say. When 19 children and two loving teachers are shot down in cold blood, and the media goes crazy with political word-wars that do nothing... I find myself grieving heavily, sputtering in anger, and hurt, and frustrated, and keenly aware that all the words in the world will fix nothing.

Because I think words are powerful, I feel utterly helpless when words fail, when I do not know what to say, or when I know that no matter what I say, I cannot fix the pain or drive away evil.

I hate helplessness. I hate powerlessness. I need my words.

My impulse, (and maybe yours too) at times like this is always to pray, but prayer, too, involves words. Fortunately, the God of scripture who knows the human heart intimately, understands our wordlessness. When the need to express sorrow, anger, frustration, and longing is so intense we cannot speak our own passion. The Apostle Paul tells us, "Now in the same way the Spirit also helps our weakness; for we do not know what to pray for as we should, but the Spirit Himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words;" (Ro. 8:26a). This means that in prayer, our tears, sighs, moans and groans are heard by God as the vocabulary of the soul.

God is present when words fail.

## PASTOR'S MESSAGE CONTINUED:

What's more, according to Paul; the Spirit that knows us so intimately that it can help us express ourselves to God without words, is also the Spirit that knows God intimately. "And He who searches the hearts knows what the mind of the Spirit is, because He intercedes for the saints according to the will of God." (Ro. 8:26b) For Paul, this wordless communication is the purest form of connection -- through the Spirit our wordless depths are connected to the wordless depths of God.

This is amazing. Yet, even more amazing is how the Apostle describes the outcome of this connection. He says in the same chapter, "If God is for us, who is against us? <sup>32</sup>He who did not spare His own Son, but delivered Him over for us all, how will He not also with Him freely give us all things? <sup>33</sup>Who will bring charges against God's elect? God is the one who justifies; <sup>34</sup>who is the one who condemns? Christ Jesus is He who died, but rather, was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who also intercedes for us. <sup>35</sup>Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will tribulation, or trouble, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or danger, or sword? <sup>37</sup>But in all these things we overwhelmingly conquer through Him who loved us. <sup>38</sup>For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, <sup>39</sup> nor height, nor depth, nor any other created thing will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord."

So, there we have it – when words fail, when we feel utterly powerless, our powerful connection to a loving God is secured by the Spirit who does not need our best words to communicate our feelings to God. When words fail, we are not powerless. When words fail, God hears us clearly. This is the word of the Lord – thanks be to God.

# "A Word with Wanona" This month it is my pleasure to introduce to you Muriel Peterson.

Muriel 12 or 13 years old

Muriel was born and raised with her brother in Steele, North Dakota. Muriel attended grade school and high school in Steele, North Dakota. She graduated in 1963 from Jamestown College where she received her Bachelor of Arts degree in Christian Education. She continued her education in 1984 at Mary College to complete her Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration. The years in between Muriel worked in Iowa and Nebraska. After graduating from Mary, she worked for the Department of Human Services until retirement.

One thing you may not know about Muriel is that she had the Grand Champion Baby Beef Steer at the Kidder County Fall Fair in 1957.

A highlight for Muriel occurred 61 years ago. Muriel was a Summer Service Worker from June to August, 1961 as a volunteer under the Board of National Missions, United Presbyterian Church USA in SE Alaska. Several

protestant churches were part of a formal agreement where they were assigned parts of Alaska to focus on Missionary work. The Presbyterian Church already had a strong presence in Southeast Alaska and a portion of the interior as well, and continued that work under the agreement. Muriel joined that mission.

When Muriel asked her mother if she could sign the consent form for this mission and the money for the trip to/from Juneau, she told her to ask her father because her mother knew he would say No." Muriel was the extra help needed during fall harvest. So going to Alaska meant she wouldn't be home to help. Much to her mother's surprise, he signed the form and Muriel was off to Juneau with 11 others from the lower 48 states. Muriel was assigned to Team II, in the most remote fishing villages of Alaska, along with Len from Texas and Sandy from Missouri. The major transportation was a boat or float plane (landing/taking off in the water). The Church supported two mission boats to travel from island to island. The Anna Jackman was a dubbed a "working yacht" which housed 26 kids and the other Princeton Hall. Both would run the length of SE Alaska as part of the church's mission in that area. Muriel's team taught Vacation Church School at the Presbyterian Churches in Juneau, Kake and Metlakatla.



The Anna Jackman "the working yacht" - was a fourth-generation Presbyterian mission vessel designed and destined for service in coastal Alaska. Just like her predecessors, the Anna Jackman was a vital link between small coastal Native Alaskan villages and the rest of the world.

Kake was the most remote village. During the day the men were on fishing boats and the women were working in the cannery. Owners of Kake's Salmon Cannery owned the only store and to Muriel's surprise they sold sunflower seeds from Bismarck's Oscar H. Will & Company. Here the stove and refrigerator in the manse (Presbyterian minister's residence) were electrical, but power was only available a few hours a day in the evening.

## "A Word With Wanona" Continued:

Another village Muriel was assigned was Metlakatla which was located on a small island that had a few miles of road and fewer cars. A parishioner had one of those cars. He showed the group around the island including bunkers remaining from WWII. Remembering Alaska was purchased from Russia, these bunkers were built in preparation for a Russian invasion. In Metlakatla the manse had a very high foundation for privacy because native residents would try to peek in the windows.



During Russia's ownership of Alaska, the churches were supported by their government. In the center of Sitka was the Russian Orthodox Church. It was a beautiful church laden with elaborate gold inlay and artifacts, but in very poor condition. The priest was selling the Russian Orthodox crosses and other trinkets to help finance their church. Members were not accustomed to financially supporting their church.

Sitka is also the home of Presbyterian Church's Sheldon Jackson Junior College. The curator of the museum on campus was a missionary, Gladys Whitmore, who originated from Tuttle, North Dakota. When Gladys visited her family in Tuttle, she would do presentations at the Presbyterian Church in Steele. Muriel was very familiar with her mission work in Alaska. She also had a high school classmate whose husband was teaching in Sitka at the time she was assigned there.

Muriel's Summer Service mission group ended the 1961 season with a 10-day work camp at Rainbow Glacier Camp which was near Haines, Alaska. Their mission involved manually digging the large hole for the outhouse that would seat/accommodate four.





Muriel was baptized and joined the Presbyterian Church in Steele, North Dakota at the age of 16. She moved to Bismarck and joined the First Presbyterian Church in Bismarck in 1984. Her contributions include making the dozens and dozens of scones for the High Teas and funded the additional cost of the Curb Cut at the Thayer entrance, the automatic door for the restrooms, and financial support of the Parish Nurse. Thank you Muriel for sharing your life journey.



# Resource Management Committee - Pentecost Offering 2022 and Youth Mental Health

When the day of Pentecost came, the believers were together in one place. Suddenly, a sound like that of a violent wind filled the house. Then, what looked like flames of tongues of fire appeared and settled on their heads. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began speaking in other languages as the Spirit gave them the ability. I have toured a local, wonderful non-profit Mental Health Clinic that serves Bismarck and the surrounding area. It is Dakota Children's Advocacy Center located at 1800 East Broadway Ave., Bismarck.

Your Pentecost Offering will be used to support the Dakota Children's Advocacy Center. 40% of the offering will go to the above center and stay local. 25% supports Youth Adult volunteers serving communities around the world. Another 25% supports Ministries with Youth uniting them in Christ and to be messengers of God's word. The last 10% is devoted to children at-risk.

Give generously to this worthy cause. If we all do a little, it adds up to a lot.

Middle and High school students mark your calendar for June 18<sup>th</sup>.



**Proclamation-Christian Education**—Graduates will be recognized May 29. Cupcakes will be served following worship. Mark Jensen will lead several activities for youth during the summer.

**Proclamation-Worship and Music**—Lay readers for Sunday worship are being recruited—sign-up on the bulletin board.

**Property and Equipment**—The elevator has been fixed. Prairie Engineering has provided an updated probable cost estimate for Phases II-III of the HVAC project.

**Resource Management**—So far, \$5,580 has been received in per capita payments and \$3,801 was donated to One Great Hour of Sharing. Local charity aided by part of the Pentecost Offering will be Dakota Children's Advocacy.

**Board of Deacons**—Dennis Rosenkranz and Bev Patch-Larson will serve on the Nominating Committee. New impaired hearing devices are being purchased.



**PER CAPITA** This is a reminder that if you have not yet made your per capita payment, your per capita fee of \$48/member can be paid at any time during the year. The Per Capita fee is the assessment the church pays for each member which goes to the larger Presbyterian Church of PCUSA to provide funds for the operation of the Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly offices, as well as some of the mission programs of the denomination (PCUSA).

Our church is assessed \$48 per member and pays this fee out of the budgeted funds of the General Fund. It is requested that each member consider making a \$48.00 payment to the church as a special offering to cover this amount. If paying by check make the check out to the church and note on the memo line "Per Capita".
