MONTH OF IYAR/ZIV/5777/MAY 2017



There are two names for the second month of the Jewish calendar, *Ziv* and *Iyar*. Both names are synonyms for *Light*. Ziv is the special light that shines from the sun, and Iyar is the light within us. Ziv is the light of energy that shines upon the earth and our bodies, while Iyar is the light within our souls that awakens in us the desire to serve G-d through our physical being, removed from the source



of Divine Light. In general, this is the spiritual and physical renewal of the consciousness in the Jewish soul. During this awakening, our souls are inspired to build an eternal House of G-d in our reality. [Kings 1, 6:1]

Nisan and now lyar are the awakening months of the spring. This is when the flowers are growing and the meadowlands shine with buttercups. It is as if the earth had been washed by our powerful winter rains. Aroused seedlings now produce yellow and blue iris. The season brings to life swatches of anemones, scarlet, red, purple, and lilac upon the earth. There is a basic reality that is accomplished by fulfillment of the counting of the Omer.

<u>Omer</u>

It is the beginning of a grain festival when a priest would elevate the first sheaf of barley in the Temple. To better comprehend this, I refer to the Torah commandment, "When you enter the land that I am giving to you and you reap its harvest, you shall bring the first sheaf of your harvest to the priest. He shall elevate the sheaf before the Eternal for its acceptance in your behalf." [Leviticus 23:10-15] The omer is the measure of barley brought to the Temple on the second day of Passover. As stated in the Torah, we count 49 days from the bringing of the first omer until the eve of Shavuot, the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai and the day we became G-d's chosen people.

Lag Ba'Omer

On 18 Iyar in the early 2nd century, Rabbi Akiva's students ceased to die from an epidemic. Throughout the land of Israel and Jewish communities of the world, this day is marked with festivities and bonfires.


<u>Summary</u>

From the month of Iyar three different levels of light shine forth:

- Luminary (ma'r) that shines on Lag Ba'Omer. This is omer 33 and reflected in Psalm119:18. Stated there, "Unveil my eyes that I may perceive wonders of your Torah." In brief, Psalm 119:19 States that we must not fritter away our brief opportunity to infuse meaning into G-d's existence through adherence to His commandments.
- 2. Light. Iyar derives its light from the above light of G-d.
- 3. Splendor (Ziv). This is a lamination that reaches souls from G-d's far reaches. This splendor illuminates souls at the lowest level (Earth) and shines upon them G-d's love and care, thus drawing us close to the Torah. When we state, "Today is the . . . day of the omer," it reflects our meditation that "today" refers to revealed light, and of the "omer" symbolizing the splendor which shines from the divinity of G-d. This is the spark of life, a divine spark present in the heart of each Jew, from their birth onward. It is our heart's desire to arouse a powerful effort to make G-d a dwelling place on Earth and support His faith that is everlasting.

In Memory of Alícía Appleman-Jurman by Ríta Rubín



It is with profound sadness that we learned of the death of former Beth Shalom of Whittier member, Alicia Appleman-Jurman (born Ada Jurman). It is fitting that Alicia passed away during Nisan, the month in which we observe Yom Ha'Shoah, Holocaust Remembrance Day. For those of you who did not know Alicia, here are some of her own words from her biography, *Alicia: My Story*, published in 1988:

First they killed my brother Moshe... Then they killed my father.... Then they killed my brother Bunio... Then they killed my brother Zachary... Then they killed my last brother, Herzl.

Only my mother and I were left. I vowed that I would never let them kill her, that I would protect my mother from the Nazis and their collaborators for as long as I lived.

Alicia's childhood in Poland ended at the age of thirteen, when her life became one of hiding from the Nazis and scavenging for food. She was the lone survivor in her family, having been thrown out the window of a train taking her family to a concentration camp.

After Germany's defeat, she joined the underground group Bricha, helping smuggle Jews out of Poland to Austria, then on to the Palestine Mandate, which was to become Israel. In early 1947 she sailed aboard the Theodor Herzl, which was stopped by Britain's Royal Navy. The ship's crew and passengers were sent to Cyprus and interned for eight months there. In December 1947, Jurman made it to the Palestine Mandate.

In the War for Israel Independence, she was part of the Palyam, the sea force of the Palmach, later serving in the "Chayl HaYam" naval forces that fought at Jaffa. There she met Gabriel Appleman, a volunteer from the United States. They wed in 1950 and came to the United States two years later. They returned to Israel in 1969, were there during the Yom Kippur War (1973), and returned to the U.S. in 1975.

After moving to the United States, Alicia dedicated her life to writing and speaking about the Holocaust so no one would ever forget; yet she was always upbeat and saw the goodness of people. When she talked about the evil of the holocaust, she also talked about how others risked their own lives to save her and other Jews escaping the Nazis.

May we find solace in the words she wrote in the dedication of the book she gave to my son Gary on his Bar Mitzvah:

To dear Gary Alexander, July 1, 1989 A tragic page in history was written for my generation. God willing, you will write your page with happiness, love, Shalom, and a celebration of human dignity. With all my love and mazel tov on your Bar Mitzvah. Alicia Appleman-Jurman

May she rest in peace. Alicia is survived by her three children, Dan Appleman, Roan Bear, and Zachary Appleman.




