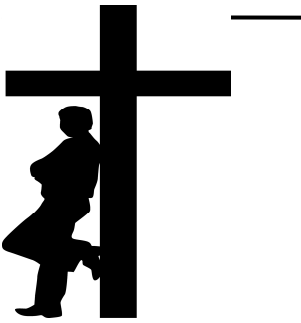

Much is going on in our work. I've just come back from the LARCUM (Lutheran, Anglican, Roman Catholic and United Methodist) annual meeting where we talked about what we share and how we are different and how we can witness to being one in Christ and focus on what we have in common and not what still separates us.

I participated in Bishop Reigel's installation last Saturday with Bishop Rev. Elizabeth Eaton of the national ELCA, presiding. I was then at one of my twice yearly required Continuing Education events on the 28-29.

We will be celebrating St. Francis of Assisi and blessing animals on Sunday, Oct. 4 at 4 in our pavilion. Invite your friends with pets. All must be on leashes, in carriers or restrained in some manner.

I will be gone to Birmingham for a reunion at the School of Public Health during the week of October 11th and then will have cataract surgery on one eye on Oct. 21 and the other eye on Nov. 4.

On Sunday October 25 we will celebrate Reformation Sunday, followed by a picnic, which is also a potluck. At 3 p.m. that day the

clergy of our Conference invite you to go to Trinity in Charleston for a talk on parts of Luther's Small catechism. After that if you would like to stay and help at Trinity's Table, where they feed the needy, you are welcome to do so and have a full day celebration of the Reformation!

On Sunday, November 1st, All Saint's Day, we will have a second offering for Hunters Helping the Hungry, the DNR program that has hunters donating deer to be processed so that they can then be given to our state food banks to feed the hungry. Your

ECCHO NEWS:

The ECCHO Board of Directors met Thursday, September 10, at Christ the King.

During August, ECCHO served 1,401 people: 1,282 people received food; 1,148 people found

clothes; 201 families were given household supplies; 44 families selected miscellaneous items. ECCHO served 23 new families. Plus, 229 children received school supplies; 232, new socks; 227, new underwear. In addition to

food, clothing, and household items, ECCHO provided clients with references to state and county agencies from which they could obtain assistance or information.

On Sunday, November 8th we will be blessed by the presence and preaching of Reverend Barry Ball, husband of a Methodist Bishop and a former Air Force Chaplain. We will celebrate Veterans Day and honor all of those who have served in the military, past and present. If you have friends or family who serve or are veterans invite them that day. We will have a potluck lunch following the service!

Partners in Care, PIC, and our relationship with the WV National Guard, continues to serve. If you remember we work with the Guard when they refer active duty people or vets to us

for assistance that the Guard can not supply. In addition we work with the Challenge Academy which helps 16-18 year old boys and girls who are struggling academically for a variety of reasons with a 22 week in residence program at Camp Dawson and then a year of working with a mentor. PIC is sometimes asked to help find mentors in the home area of the youth. We will be meeting Nov. 6 at the Guard with all the Guard chaplains and a representative from each of our denominations. Bishop Riegel will be there also along with General Hoyer. Please keep the Guard and the youth at the Challenge Academy in your prayers.

Our church work day will be Saturday, Oct. 17 at 8 a.m.– more details on what work is coming – please mark that day on your calendar to help at the church! Breakfast and lunch will be provided.

October is our Stewardship month

and the emphasis is on Celebrating God’s generosity. We will end the month on Oct. 25 with a picnic which is a potluck and weather permitting, an outdoor picnic and a celebration lunch.

During worship that day you will be given the opportunity to bring your estimate of giving card forward to place on the altar. Each Sunday there will be a talk on stewardship and information in the bulletin to assist you as you plan how to be generous back to God. Everyone has received my letter on stewardship and there will be additional ones coming out. I ask you to pray as to how you are using the gifts in time, talent and money that God has given you for the work of ministry.

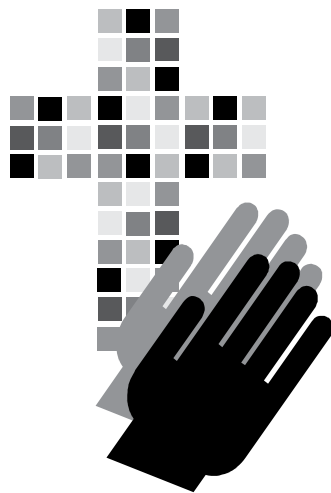

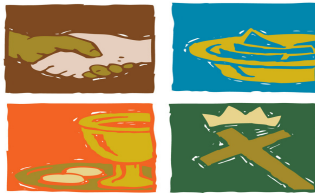
