THIS DATE IN HISTORY

June 14, 1964 General Westmoreland travels to Malaysia to study the methods used by the British to defeat Communist guerrillas there.

June 2, 1967 A marine patrol is ambushed by elements of a 2,900 man North Vietnamese regiment near Tam Ky, 30 miles southwest of Danang. The U.S. 5th Marines sustain 73 killed and 139 wounded and report 540 North Vietnamese killed.

June 29-30, 1970 The final withdrawal of U.S. ground combat troops from Cambodia is completed, ending two months of operations in Cambodia. Military officials report 338 American killed and 1,525 wounded in the operation. The South Vietnamese report 866 killed and 3,724 wounded. About 34,000 South Vietnamese troops remain in Cambodia. Allied forces claim 11,000 enemy casualties.

Vice President's Corner


Hi everyone -

D.C. World War I Memorial Design Approved

On May 18, the U.S. Commission of Fine Arts (CFA) approved the U.S. World War One Centennial Commission's design concept for a national World War I memorial in the nation's capital. The presentation was a significant milestone in progress toward building the memorial, on a site authorized by Congress in 2014. CFA is one of the two federal agencies with responsibility for design approval of memorials in Washington, D.C., along with the National Capital Planning Commission.

Edwin L. Fountain, vice chair of the World War One Centennial Commission, said, "The concept for a national World War I memorial in Washington has been in the making for nine years. We are pleased the CFA endorsed our proposal to honor the service of 4.7 million Americans who served in World War I, and the sacrifice of the 116,516 who gave their lives. We look forward to working with the CFA, the public and other stakeholders as we continue to develop the final design."

The memorial will be located on Pennsylvania Avenue at Pershing Park, a 2-acre site one block from the White House. The park currently features a statue honoring Gen. John Pershing, the commander of American forces in World War I, and a pool of water set in a modernist landscape design by M. Paul Friedberg. The new memorial – developed by the design team of Joseph Weishaar, who won the design competition for the memorial project, along with John Gregg (GWWO Architecture), and Phoebe Lickwar (Forge Landscape) – will consist primarily of a 65-foot-long bronze bas-relief sculpture by acclaimed American sculptor Sabin Howard that will be located along the western edge of the water feature, along with additional commemorative elements in the park. https://www.legion.org/honor/237561/dc-world-war-i-memorial-design-approved

Three Names Added to the Wall in 2017

Each spring, VVMF (Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund) works with the Department of Defense (DOD) to ensure that The Wall is accurate. When MIAs are recovered in Vietnam or when an appeal has been approved for addition to The Wall, VVMF makes the appropriate changes. On May 2, 2017 three new names took their rightful place among their fallen brothers and sisters. Each year, new names are added to The Wall to fix clerical errors and mistakes, and to honor those veterans who died as a direct result of their wounds sustained while in Vietnam

When names are added, a highly technical process is required. Precise measurements must be made to ensure letters are lined up, have the right width and are etched into the granite to a depth that matches the etchings already on the memorial. The letters are burned into The Wall as a dust-free sand blasting apparatus is passed over it. The physical work of adding the names and changing statuses is performed by James Lee of the Colorado-based company, Engrave Write.

The Department of Defense (DoD) sets the criteria for and makes decisions about whose names are eligible for inscription on The Wall. VVMF pays for the name additions and status changes and works with the National Park Service (NPS) to ensure long-term preservation and maintenance of The Wall.

The name additions and status changes were recognized during VVMF's annual Memorial Day Observance at The Wall on May 29, 2017 and the number of names on The Wall will be formally changed to 58,318. The names added this year were: Cpl. Kenneth R. McGuire, Panel 34W Line 42; Sgt. John T. Whitson, Panel 32W, Line 58; Sgt. Edward L. Wilmers, Panel 62E, Line 7

Every Day is Memorial Day By Johnathon Clinkscales

More than 1,000 people participated in the 149th National Memorial Day Observance at Arlington National Cemetery to honor and commemorate fallen U.S. service members.

Retired four-star Marine Corps Gen. Joseph F. Dunford Jr., who is the 19th chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and Secretary of Defense Gen. James Mattis gave opening remarks during the ceremony.

"More than 1 million Americans who have answered the call of duty gave the last full measure of their devotion so their fellow citizens could live in freedom and raise their children in peace," Dunford said. "Today, we reflect on the enormity of the sacrifice. We reflect on the hopes and dreams never realized. Today, we also reflect on the sacrifice of the families left behind, the anguish of parents, spouses, siblings and friends, the sadness of children growing up without their fathers or mothers. And we know that for the families, every day is Memorial Day."

What's most important about the fallen service members, Dunford said, is recognizing and honoring how they lived. These were people who not only fought for something larger than themselves, but also understood that the key values and traditions of this nation was worth fighting for, he said.

"The kid on the line who never had a chance to grow old will always be there, to teach us that suffering has meaning if it is accepted out of love for others," said Mattis. "To the families of the fallen, both here and at home, no words will ease your pain. But I beg you, let it have meaning — unite your sorrow to their awesome purpose."

President Donald Trump, who laid the wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, gave his first Memorial Day address to the nation.

"Words cannot measure the depths of their devotion, the purity of their love or the totality of their courage," Trump said. "We only hope that every day we can prove worthy not only of their sacrifice and service, but of the sacrifice made by the families and loved ones they left behind. Special, special people."

Army veteran Ron Anderson understands the true meaning of sacrifice. Anderson, a Purple Heart recipient from Texas who received his medal on May 26, was shot and wounded in combat during the Vietnam War. Anderson said his life was saved by the heroic act of another fellow comrade, an angel on the battlefield whom he thanks God for every day.

For Anderson, **every day is Memorial Day**. He said he's proud & humbled to come from a family of veterans. https://www.legion.org/honor/237623/%E2%80%98every-day-memorial-day%E2%80%99
