I hope you had a good month of July. It was very enjoyable having Rabbi Ken Milhander with us for three weeks and it gave Hazzan Lance the chance to have a great vacation visiting some fantastic places.

July is always a quiet month as far as having synagogue events because of so many people going on vacations but those will pick up again very soon.

I just returned from a week in Newport, Rhode Island. While I was there, I took the opportunity to attend Shabbat Services in the oldest synagogue building in the United States. The Touro Synagogue congregation was founded in 1658 and the building dedicated in 1763. It is not the oldest congregation in the U.S. (that is Shearith Israel in New York City) but the oldest surviving synagogue building. The history is too long and involved to fit into this article but there is one point that really stood out to me because of our current situation. After the revolutionary war, there were not enough Jews in Rhode Island to take care of the building. The religious artifacts had been sent to New York to Shearith Israel for safe keeping. The building survived because it was taken care of by the Quaker community until the Jewish community could re-establish itself. The more I learn, the more I see how our relationship with the Quaker community is intertwined.

<u>Prayer for Helping the Sick</u> There is one type of help that we can offer to the sick that involves a minimum of effort on our part: it is a prayer to G-d to help the sick. This prayer is recited in the synagogue at the Torah reading service on Mondays, Thursdays, and the Sabbath and at any time when the Torah is read. The name of the sick person is submitted to the rabbi or singer who recites the prayer. Upon the passing of one's father, mother, brother, sister, husband, wife, or child, it is Jewish Law to have seven days of mourning called "Shiva" (seven). This is a very important "Mitzvah" for friends and relatives to visit mourners to comfort them. This "Mitzvah" is called "Nichum Aveilim" which means "Comforting the Mourners" and should never be made empty handed. Please don't speak to a mourner till they speak to you first.

<u>Yahrzeit</u> When a human being passes away, they leave a great many memories in the hearts of those who knew them. To family they leave the memory of years of shared happiness. To friends, the memory of the helping hand offered them in time of need. To the world, they leave the memory of devotion to G-d, country, and mankind. Yahrtzeit is the Yiddish word for anniversary as Jews we use this term only in reference to the anniversary of death. As rabbis teach the day of a death of a parent or close relative should be marked. We should be reminded of the love and devotion they showed us. We should rededicate each year at the time of the yahrtzeit the good teachings and morals they taught us.

On the evening of the yahrzteit we light a 24 hour candle. This candle is a symbol of the soul which lives on after the body has died, and is determined by the Jewish calendar. If you have a problem with this see a rabbi.

<u>Kaddish</u> is a prayer of praise to G-d; it is not a memorial prayer. It is recited by the Cantor during the services. It is also recited by mourners during services for a period of 11 months during the first year, and every following year at the yahrzeit. We recite the "Kaddish" when we mourn in recognition that although G-d has taken away a person loved by us, we nevertheless praise Him for his just acts.

In addition to the yahrzeit day, there are four other days when we recall our departed ones, these are: Yom Kippur, "Sh'mini Atzeret" which is the last day of "Sukkot". "Acharon Shel Pesach", the last day of Passover, and the second day of "Shavuot". On these days a special memorial prayer is recited in the synagogue after the Torah reading. It's title is called "Yizkor". It is customary to pledge a donation to charity on this day in honor of the departed. It is proper for all who have parents that are living to leave the synagogue until the prayer is over since they do not recite it.
