The Importance of Church History

When I went to college, as I've shared before, I was not intending to end up in pastoral ministry. Instead, I headed off to college with the idea of becoming a high school history teacher, and so ended up taking a number of history courses in my first couple of semesters at college. It was only later, as I began to discern my call towards pastoral ministry, that I began to shift my scholarly activities towards a different area of studies, that of philosophy and religion. Still to this day, though, I enjoy taking time to read through history books. I know that not everyone is really thrilled about history, or studying it, but it still is an important area of study for all of us.

And in the church, this study remains important as well. It is enlightening to look back and learn from historical events in the church. Indeed, all of our practices in the church have a historical reason for existing, and it's helpful for us to understand what has led us to do them even to today. Church history, although at times a very dry subject, is still important for us to know and understand. And that's why I enjoy taking time to look back and understand how we've come to where we are today.

Take, for example, our identity as being Anabaptists, a key aspect of who we are as a congregation and a denomination. Taking time to go back and look at the historical aspects of this movement helps us to understand better what it means for us to make claims today, and to model our practices today, to live out being Anabaptists. So let me take a few moments to do a quick little review of the historical origins of the Anabaptist movement, which under girds one of the key practices of our denomination: a rejection of infant baptism and an embrace of adult baptism.

The term Anabaptist originally goes back to the early church, and the Donatist movement. The Donatist movement arose after a period of persecution in the early church, and argued that if sacraments, including baptism, were performed by a priest who later recanted, they were invalid. And so, they argued and practiced that persons who received baptism by a priest who recanted had to be re-baptized, since the first baptism was invalid. Thus, a pejorative term emerged, that being anabaptist, which literally means re-baptizers.

Our current understanding of Anabaptism comes not from this early movement, but instead from the time of the Reformation. The Reformation was a pivotal turning point in the history of the Christian church, marking the beginning of the ongoing splintering that we see throughout the larger Christian tradition. It began in what is now Germany, with the publication of Martin Luther's 95 Theses, and eventually led to the breakup of the Catholic church. Those who broke away became the Protestant churches, of which we are a part, because they were protesting against the teachings of the Catholic church, headed by the Pope in Rome. The development of the pope as the head of the church is another interesting story, but one for another time.

During the Reformation, several groups arose which argued that the reformers were not taking their critiques of the mainline Catholic tradition to the fullness of their conclusions. Such persons became known as the Radical Reformationists, and are the area that modern Anabaptism traces its roots. These persons were focused on several areas, but one of the key features was to declare that one had to choose baptism, and rejected infant baptism on the basis that faith in Christ was required prior to baptism.

Up to that point in time, infant baptism was the norm in nearly all the Christian world. And so, many of those who joined the early Radical Reformation, and rejected infant baptism, declared that their infant baptisms were not true baptisms. Thus, they then performed adult baptisms, which those opposed to them saw as re-baptisms. Reaching back in their own history, then, their opponents began to call them Anabaptists, and to persecute them for their beliefs and actions. Eventually, it got to the point where one of the few things the mainstream Protestants and the Catholic church agreed upon was that the Anabaptists were heretical, and should be wiped out.

Now, the Church of the Brethren does not trace its origins directly to the early Radical Reformers in the 1500s, though there are certainly some ties. Instead, we trace our origins to the group of eight who became convinced of the necessity of faith prior to baptism, rejecting their infant baptisms, and engaging in the civil disobedience of re-baptizing each other in the Schwarzenau River in 1708. Yet much of their thinking has ties back to the early Anabaptists of the Reformation, who also rejected infant baptism.

There are, of course, other aspects of Anabaptism that have historical roots that can help us understand who we are today. But this core belief that baptism requires us to have faith in Christ, to be able to choose to follow Jesus, still shapes us today. It's part of why we have a time of consecrating and dedicating new infants in the church, instead of doing infant baptism. It's part of why we teach and practice adult baptism, or at least waiting until children have reached an age when they can choose and proclaim their own faith in Christ, and request baptism.

Now, you might wonder why I've been thinking about the role of church history. Next month, I'll be starting to teach a class on church history for the Brethren Leadership Institute (BLI). As part of my own preparation for that class, I've been taking some time to dive back into the history of the church. The class is open to anyone who would like to learn more about the history of the church. If you would be interested in joining in the class, let me know and I can help you to get registered for it through BLI.



National Youth Conference "Foundational" Colossians 2:5-7 July 23 – 28, 2022 in Fort Collins, Colorado

The registration fee, which includes food, lodging, and programing, will be \$550. Youth who have completed ninth grade through one year of college at the time of NYC (or are age equivalent) and their adult advisors will gather at Colorado State University in Fort Collins, Colo. Online registration will open in early 2022 on www.brethren.org.





With the help of a friend, they can be unfrozen and get right back in the game. We all appreciate new chances to continue on.

For training, we are examining all the things that happen in a day at camp and how they can be intentional and reflect the daily themes. I remember years ago, a Team Leader was walking their group up to the dining hall when they noticed baby maple trees growing along the pathway. The team leader took the time to wonder why certain ones grew thick in the soil and others grew sparsely along the gravelly

drive. After a while, a camper explained, "Wait! Did we just do Bible Study?" You see, that team leader chose a moment to notice nature at camp and also connect it with the Parable of the Sower that they studied that day.

Stories like that one are why I love working in ministry at camp. Our job is intentional. Facility, Food Service, Office Staff, Volunteers, Prayer Partners, Campers, and Parents, you all have a role in this intentional community of summer camp.
