Christmas

A calendar without a story is inadequate. It is hardly worth arriving at a place on the right day if we don't know who we are when we get there, if we don't know what to do. ¹

Those are the words of Eugene Peterson in *Epiphanies: Stories for the Christian Year*.

Peterson notes that it was an extraordinary achievement of the ancient mind to mark off accurately months, weeks, and days in our annual trip around the sun.

Christians inherited a Roman calendar that was adequate for getting up in the morning, calculating seasons or setting a date. The Roman stories were not adequate.

Early Christians told stories of Jesus and their experience with Him. As the stories were told and retold clustered around the calendar, they pushed the Roman stories off. While the numbers stayed the same, the "Roman" year slowly gave way to a "Christian" year.

The Christian year is a rhythm that moves from anticipating Christ, Christ's birth, life, death, resurrection and sending of the Spirit. It moves to the Christian's rhythm of obedience, faith and blessing.

Over time some days took on new meanings or were overtaken by new traditions. Advent – the season of waiting for the arrival of our Lord – is often buried under shopping days as we wait for Christmas presents.

"Christmas" is "Christ's mass." Mass is the central act of worship of the Catholic Church.

Grand Rapids MI: Baker Books 2003, page 7 Christmas or "Feast of the Nativity" is an annual festival celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ. Although the month and date of Jesus' birth are unknown, the church in the early fourth century fixed the date as December 25.

December 25 was the date of the winter solstice on the Roman calendar. It was one of those dates that remained the same but the Christian story pushed off the Roman story.

Linking Jesus to the Sun was supported by various Biblical passages. Malachi 4:2 proclaims, "The Sun of Righteousness shall rise with healing in His wings..."

In the fourth-century Saint Augustine explains the date chosen to celebrate Christ's nativity: "Hence it is that He was born on the day which is the shortest in our earthly reckoning and from which subsequent days begin to increase in length. He, therefore, who bent low and lifted us up chose the shortest day, yet the one whence light begins to increase."

Now there were in the same country shepherds living out in the fields keeping watch over their flock by night.

And behold, an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were greatly afraid.

Then the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid, for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy which will be to all people.


"For there is born to you this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord.



In 2005, when Dave Navert first walked in to Acmar UMC, adults cheerfully greeted Dave and his wife, Jeani, while children looked on with wide-eyed awe, wondering if this really is how Santa Claus looks on his day off! Dave and Jeani became members of the church in early 2006.

Dave and Jeani became part of our church family after he had retired from work on a maintenance crew for oil tanks. Born in Washington State, he had also been a salmon fisherman, which he really enjoyed. Dave and Jeani married in 1984, and in the late 1980s, they served as Santa and Mrs. Santa at the Eastwood Mall. Jeani remembers a special time when a couple came with a toddler they had just adopted, and visiting Santa was the first thing they wanted to do as a family.



days, there were annual Christmas gatherings where the children would be urged to sing, "Up on the Housetop" as loud as they could and Santa would appear! There would be baskets of fruit and goodies for each family. At our Acmar Community Christmas party in 2006, the folks who gathered to help us celebrate also sang the song and Dave, uh, Santa, came strolling in! Dave filled this role for the next ten years to the delight of many, young and old until health problems became more limiting. He also brought his portrayal out into the community by helping with Christmas celebrations with Moody Challenged Adults, a social club for adults with special needs.

More than once, he also visited a small group of young people with special needs at Moody High School. Dave/Santa would arrive at lunchtime and have a meal with his special friends who were so excited to have him sit at their table. (And many of the "cool" teenagers were smiling and a bit envious of this group with their special guest!) Even the lunch ladies smiled and were touched when he went through the line and produced candy canes for each lady from the seemingly never-ending supply from his festive vest pocket.

Dave also worked with Urban Ministry in Birmingham, a ministry of the North Alabama Conference. He became a lay speaker and served as pastor at Ragan Chapel in 2012 – 2013.

Dave passed away in November and is survived by Jeani, children Amy and John, step-sons Brian and Wesley, and granddaughters Ansley, Hannah, and Haley. Though he wore many

different hats throughout his life, his role as our own Santa will be how we remember him best especially as he read the story of Jesus' birth.
