LED BY THE STAR OF CHRIST!

(Is. 60:1-6; Ps. 72: 1-2, 7-8, 10-13; Eph. 3:2-3a, 5-6; Matt. 2:1-12)

"Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem! Your light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon you." This is the opening exhortation from today's first reading where prophet Isaiah envisages the return of the exiles and how all nations will join them in a pilgrimage of celebration to Jerusalem. This will be a pilgrimage to see the Light. Thus, *Rise up in splendor* because *your light has come*.

The feast which we celebrate today, *Epiphany*, has its etymology from the Greek word, *epiphanein*, meaning "appearance, showing or revelation." The term was used to describe the appearance of a god among the people – a *theophany*. The Eastern Greek-speaking Church found it natural to use the word to describe the appearance of the true God in flesh. Originally, in the Western Church, Epiphany celebrated the three manifestations of the divinity of Christ – His birth, the adoration of the magi and His Baptism. In our day, Epiphany celebrates the manifestation of Christ to the magi, traditionally called "the three wise men" or "Three kings". It celebrates the manifestation of Christ not just to the Jewish people but also to the Gentiles – to believers and to unbelievers. He made Himself known to all – Christians, Moslems, pagans, Buddhists, Hindus, etcetera.

Indeed, God has manifested Himself to you and to me. *Epiphany* invites every Christian to examine his/her concept of God. God has given Himself to us and we must come to understand the image He has given to us, because how we model our lives depends on the impression we have of Him. By this Feast God reveals to us that every person, even "the Gentiles (pagans/sinners) are coheirs, members of the same body." The unbelievers also are copartners in the promise of eternal life Christ has made to us; thus, you and I must be the agents of His Gospel of salvation to everyone. When others know we are Christians, and particularly Catholics, they will look to see whether we have the image of God in us.

The *star* which led the magi to discover Christ should also lead you to discover Him, so that those Who see you will always see the image of Christ in you. Christ is the image of the invisible God Who is caring, forgiving, compassionate and loving. You also must be the image of Christ Who cares for His neighbor, forgives those who offend Him, shows love to all including His enemies, and is compassionate to those in need. As a Christian, the Lord exhorts you to "rise up in splendor, because your Light has come, and the glory of the Lord shines upon you." The Lord shines the Light of His glory upon you through the birth of His Son, Jesus Christ.

Like the magi you must allow His Light to shine upon you and to lead you so that you may truly come to rediscover Christ in every event of your life throughout this New Year. Do not let yourself be distracted or be deceived by those around you who, like Herod, may want to destroy the faith that you have. Do not be deceived by the tricks of the Devil through those things that might pull you away from the Light of Christ into the realm of darkness. In all your endeavors, you must always strive to discover Christ and pay homage to Him in every event of your life. In everything, you must only be led by the radiance of the true Star, Jesus Christ, our Lord and God!



THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

FIRST SUNDAY AFTER JANUARY 1st



The feast of the Epiphany is one of the oldest in the Church and one of the greatest in the ecclesiastic year. The word *Epiphany* is a Greek word which signifies a manifestation or revelation. During the first three centuries the manifestation of

Christ to the chosen people, and His manifestation as the Savior of all races and nations, were celebrated on the same day, but since the 4th century, December 25th, has been the feast of the Nativity, or Christmas, and first January 6th and now the first Sunday after January 1st the feast of the Epiphany, or the feast of the Three Wise Men. It is so called because the Gospel of the day tells us that *Magi* (now considered to be astrologers) came from the East to Jerusalem saying: "Where is the newborn King of the Jews? We saw His star at its rising and have come to pay Him homage."

They may have come from Arabia, Chaldea or Persia. Tradition says that there were three, Gaspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. The prophecy that "a star shall rise out of Jacob," and the teaching of the prophet Daniel at Babylon had spread throughout the East. When the



mysterious star appeared, learned men recognized it as a sign that the coming of the Messiah was at hand and that He would be born in Judea. Following the star they reached Bethlehem. On entering the house, they found the Child with Mary, His Mother. They prostrated themselves and did Him homage. Then they opened their coffers and presented Him with gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

PRAYER: God, this day You revealed Your only Son to the Gentiles. Grant that we who already know You by faith may one day contemplate Your sublime beauty. Amen.
