

In keeping with the continuing "Discipleship" theme of our Church this year and as we focus on our need to be "A Eucharistic People"; am sharing with you an article I abridged that appears TheCatholicJournal-us website, written by Father Dino Vanin, and dated July 30, 2017. It has some important points for us to consider and is titled:

The Joy of Being "Eucharistic People"

Bishop Paul

"I am God's wheat and shall be ground by their teeth so that I may become Christ's pure bread. Pray to Christ for me that the animals will be the means of making me a sacrificial victim for God. No earthly pleasures, no kingdoms of this world can benefit me in any way. I prefer death in Christ Jesus to power over the farthest limits of the earth. He who died in place of us is the one object of my quest. He who rose for our sakes is my one desire...I no longer take pleasure in perishable food or in the delights of this world. I want only God's bread, which is the flesh of Jesus Christ, formed of the seed of David, and for drink I crave his blood, which is love that cannot perish."

This is a quote from the letter that Bishop Ignatius of Antioch (c. $35-c.\ 107$) wrote to the Romans on his way from Syria to Rome to be torn to shreds by hungry lions in the Circus Maximus.

Let us add the following to that quote: "Let them grow together until harvest; then at harvest time I will say to the harvesters, First collect the weeds and tie them in bundles for burning; but gather the wheat into my barn." (Mt 13:30)

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That [is] the order that the heavenly Householder [gives] to his harvesters on the 16th Sunday in Ordinary Time. On the 17th Sunday, we have a similar setting: "When the fishnet is full they haul it ashore and sit down to put what is good into buckets. What is bad they throw away." (Mt 13:48)

Do we realize that the best scenario foreseen by Jesus is for us to be wholesome food: wheat saved in our Father's barn until it is ground and made into bread as well as good quality fish?

St. Ignatius of Antioch understood and lived this unusual, yet incredibly true insight to the very end of his life, to his martyrdom.

The parables of Jesus are much more than symbols or metaphors, they are challenges directed at our minds and hearts so that, in freedom, we can make the right existential choices to make our journey to the Kingdom successful. We are instructed to react properly and effectively to God's love-filled overtures.

The desirable result comes solely from our proper reaction to [these parables]. On the other hand, our part could not be any easier. As we go about whatever we are doing and thinking and desiring and talking about and dreaming of, we are "besieged" by grace.

Anywhere in the world if a person stumbles upon a buried treasure and gets to keep it [he/she] must consider himself/herself lucky. Yet, Jesus assures us that this is never the case with the Kingdom of God. It is never a question of merits, special skills, methodical planning, or luck, or chance. It is exclusively grace. The Father has hidden the treasure in such a way that we must work hard not to find it!

Are we curious, then, as to the nature of the treasure that the Father has buried with the sole purpose of helping us find it as soon as possible?

If we appreciate St. Ignatius' desire to be fed the Eucharist so that he could become bread broken for Christ; if we place much value on St. Paul's rejoicing in his sufferings because he was filling up what is lacking in the afflictions of Christ for the sake of his Body, the Church (cf. Colossians 1: 24), we would know that the true treasure is the desire to become Christ-like, "Eucharistic people," to become bread broken for and offered to others and blood poured out for their sake.


The treasure consists also in being "found" by the Father, the divine merchant; and become convinced that our joy is in living out the New Commandment of loving each other as Jesus loved us when he allowed his body to be broken and his blood to be poured out for our redemption. We are called to be wheat in the Father's barn only for a short while. According to his design we are destined to become bread for others. We are meant to be good fish selected to feed the various "hungers" we notice on the faces of those around us.

He said to them, "I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer..." (Lk 22:15)

Jesus' eagerness to feed us his Flesh and Blood should be echoed by our eagerness to become food and drink for our neighbor. Today, we realize that whenever we hear Jesus' solemn words: "Do this in memory of me" we should take them as his burning desire to have us step forward and be counted as those who are willing to be sacrificed in union with him so that his Life may quicken in many more people. By now it should have dawned on us that every time we gather to do Eucharist, some of us are guided by the Holy Spirit towards the treasure hidden in the field of their life, while others are enlightened to value the call to be broken bread and poured blood as the treasure worth all they possess.

The cycle of joy in our self-immolation in union with Christ might begin with these words: "Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the [Table] of the Lamb." Right after those words settle in our hearts, although completely unworthy, we cue up to feed on the Body of Christ to become Eucharist ourselves, mindful that our willingness to be sacrificed for others is a foreshadowing of the endless Supper of the Lamb and the joy that we experience now is but a little taste of the joy that will never cease.

Whereas, we have again considered with renewed enthusiasm and rekindled creativity the Future Direction of our beloved Church by continuing to reflect upon the meaning of Growth with regard to its Membership, the continual need for Increased Spirituality and the value of Lifelong Learning for its members of all ages, the ongoing pursuit of personal holiness as the means of enabling joyful responses to God's call to Sacred Vocations, and the need to further enhance our Community Involvement and Presence;

Resolutions of the XVI Eastern Diocese Synod October 10, 2020

Due to the Coronavirus and the inability to meet face to face, the XVI Synod of the Eastern Diocese convened virtually October 10, 2020. Hosted by Blessed Trinity Parish, Fall River MA the Synod was summoned under the authority of Right Rev Paul Sobiechowski, Bishop Ordinary of the Eastern Diocese and attended virtually by the Most Rev Anthony Mikovsky, Prime Bishop of the PNCC. Very Rev Robert Nemkovich Jr served as the moderator for this virtual Synod. Additionally, Bishop Paul Hewitt, Bishop Ordinary of the Diocese of the Holy Cross joined us and presented to the Synod.

The Synod began with a morning prayer which set the tone and inspiration for the proceedings of the day. Through our deliberations, we learned and discussed the following:

Whereas we acknowledge the active participation of the delegates, guests, and clergy in fulfilling their discipleship role entrusted to them as members of our Holy Church and through their attendance and commitment in spreading God's word throughout our communities, our diocese and our Church.

Whereas we as delegates, reflect upon the legacy of faith set forth upon us by our organizer, Bishop Francis Hodur, the clergy, and organizers of the Church.

Whereas, we continue to support the endeavors of Future Direction and the overall theme of Discipleship towards increasing growth and membership, lifelong learning and renewed Spirituality among all members; to expanding community engagement efforts; and to enabling joyful responses to God's call to Sacred Vocations and service.

Whereas we acknowledge the work of the Eastern Diocese Strategic Planning Committee who over four years has worked diligently to:


- a. increase the awareness of our church by enabling parishes to use more social media technologies, especially Facebook in promoting masses and special services, and various events and fund-raising activities.

BEING EUCHARISTIC PEOPLE

PNCC Future Direction - Action Plan for PNCC Parishes

Based on the efforts of the 24^{TR} & 25^{TR} PNCC General Synods

Continue to develop and emphasize Discipleship through 2022: Focusing on the importance of receiving our Lord in the most Holy Eucharist for the strength to faithfully follow Him in word and action. During 2022 we hope more will return to in person worship and an active participation in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass receiving the Body and Blood of our Lord in Holy Communion. As this is the central aspect of our worship – our Catholic Christian living will have its root therein. We will reflect on different aspect of the Eucharist and how we can live daily as Eucharistic people. Please see the monthly Future Direction messages regarding this effort with reflections for living this out daily.

JANUARY – PREPARING TO RECEIVE OUR LORD IN THE EUCHARIST FASTING, PRAYERS BEFORE AND AFTER HOLY COMMUNION

Scripture: 1 Corinthians 11:23-26

Reflection and Action Item:

Receiving our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist is a sacred and important moment for which we should be prepared. This is not something to take lightly as we are receiving Jesus to strengthen us on our earthly journey in the way that God has planned for our salvation. We must prepare to meet Jesus by fasting, prayer and participation in the Holy Sacrifice of Mass.

From PNCC Prayer Book:

Fasting is an ancient religious tradition, helping one focus on the needs of the soul over the needs of the body; the need for Christ over the needs of self. As Jesus said during His own forty-day fast, "Man does not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds out of the mouth of God." Fasting before communion helps us properly prepare for the solemn and reverent receiving of His sacred Body and Blood. Fasting before Communion is not primarily an act of Penance, but one of homage to our Lord.

The faithful are required to fast for two hours before receiving Holy Communion. This means eating no food of any kind (except when necessary with medication) and drinking nothing except water. Exceptions to this fast are when someone has a medical condition that requires eating or drinking, when someone has diabetes, when a woman is pregnant, when the Eucharist is taken to someone who is sick, homebound or dying. This does not discourage the pious practice of fasting from midnight.

Action Item: Remember to fast and offer the Prayer before Holy Communion prior to beginning of Holy Mass and then remember to offer the prayer after Holy Communion from the prayer book.

Also consider a few minutes reading page 8 of the Mass Book prior to the beginning of Holy Mass.

When approaching the priest for Holy Communion make sure to do so reverently.

FEBRUARY – ACTIVELY ENGAGE THE FORTHCOMING PRE-LENTEN SPIRITUAL PREPARATION PROGRAM – BOTH THE PERSONAL AND PARISH COMPONENTS

MARCH - IMPORTANCE OF THE EUCHARIST - CATECHISM REMINDERS AND REFLECTIONS

Scripture: John 6:51-58; Mark 14:12-16, 22-26

Reflection and Action Item: In the PNCC the moment of receiving Holy Communion is sacred and holy. Our practice is that only those men ordained to Holy Orders may distribute the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ. Their hands are consecrated as are the Chalice, Paten and Intinctorium used during Holy Mass. Following the words of consecration, the priest keeps his thumb and index finger together as he has touched the divine. Communion is administered with reverence under both species – the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ are received by the faithful. A beautiful and precious moment. Let us reflect this month on just what this moment means by recalling some of our catechism questions.

362) Why does Christ give us His Body and Blood in the Holy Eucharist?

Christ gives us His Body and Blood in the Holy Eucharist:

- To unite us with Himself in Holy Communion.
- To remain ever on our altars, as a proof of His abiding love for us.
- To unite us with our heavenly Father.

364) What is Mass?

Mass is the Sacrifice of the New Testament, in which bread and wine is consecrated into the Mystical Body and Blood to God through the ministry of a priest, for a perpetual commemoration of Christ's Sacrifice upon the Cross, offered once and for all time.

365) When was the Sacrifice of Mass instituted?

The Sacrifice of Mass was instituted at the Last Supper, when Jesus commanded His Apostles to do what He had done, that is, to change bread and wine into His Body and Blood.

And having taken bread, He gave thanks and broke, and gave it to them, saying: "This is My Body, which is being given for you; do this in remembrance of Me." In like manner He took also the cup after supper, saying: "This cup is the New Testament in My Blood, which shall be shed for you." (Lk 22:19-20)

366) What is the place of Mass in the Polish National Catholic Church?

In the Polish National Catholic Church Mass is the central point of worship and life, in perfect continuity with the teaching of the Apostles and practice of the primitive church. The Sacrifice of Christ upon the Cross is the supreme act of love.

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that, whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." (Jn 15:13)

When we take part in the Mass, we are called upon to offer ourselves with Christ to God, through our own acts of faith, love and sacrifice.

"Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends." (Jn 15:13)

376) Why do we offer the Sacrifice of the Mass?

We offer the Sacrifice of the Mass:

- To adore God.
- To thank Him for all the benefits He bestows upon us.
- To ask His blessing.
- To obtain His mercy for the living and the dead.
- To apply the merits gained on Calvary to the Church in general, and to individual souls, in particular.

390) Why does Jesus Christ come to you in Holy Communion?

Jesus Christ comes to me in Holy Communion so that He may:

- Unite me with Himself.
- Strengthen me in the practice of good works.
- Strengthen the divine life which I first received in baptism.

APRIL – THE LAST SUPPER – DO THIS IN REMEMBRANCE OF ME

Scripture: John 13:1-15

Reflection and Action Item: On Holy or Maundy Thursday we hear about the Last Supper, the Passover Meal our Lord celebrated with His disciples from John's Gospel. What is important for us to realize in this most important passage of Holy Scripture is how Jesus yokes receiving His Presence in the Eucharist to a life of serving others. In God's Word we hear how during this most sacred meal during which the Holy Eucharist was instituted our Lord taught them to wash the feet of others. To serve and wash others feet is tied directly to receiving the Body and Blood of our Lord. Receiving Holy Communion should compel us to action as servants and disciples of our Lord – living as He commanded. "You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you."

Action Item: Strengthened by receiving the Holy Eucharist, allow Christ to live in you by your works of love and mercy to others, especially those in need. During this month offer three works of mercy or deeds of kindness for others in the Name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

MAY - DEVOTION TO THE MOST BLESSED SACRAMENT

Scripture: John 6 (Bread of Life Discourse); Luke 1:36; John 1:14

Reflection and Action Item:

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During the month of May we honor the Theotokos (The Mother of God – The Blessed Virgin Mary). We do this in part through the Liturgical Worship of the Church, one paraliturgical service we celebrate is May Devotions. The Litany to the Blessed Virgin Mary with the Exposition of the Most Blessed Sacrament.

The Blessed Virgin Mary gave her consent to God through the Archangel Gabriel: "Behold I am the servant of the Lord, be it done unto me according to your word." Then, "The word became flesh and dwelt among us." Mary's yes to God resulting in receiving Jesus into her heart, mind, body and soul and we receive Jesus in our hearts, minds, bodies and souls in receiving Holy Communion and adoring his presence in the Most Blessed Sacrament of the Altar.

From PNCC Prayer Book:

Make our dear Lord in the Blessed Sacrament your constant thought; remember that He is your friend; tell Him all your sorrows; go often in the week, if only for a few minutes, to relieve your mind in trouble, and you will find that the hardest trials will seem to pass away in a moment. Go to Him always, you will wonder at the fullness of the comfort and support which you will receive, and at the clearness of the answers that will come in time of doubt. Place your cares into the hands of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, and they will become light, very light.

Jesus, my God, I adore You, here present in the Sacrament of Your love.

Divine Redeemer, Who in Your infinite goodness has been pleased to give Your precious Body and Blood in the Holy Eucharist, I adore You with the most profound respect. I thank You for all the favors You have bestowed upon me, especially for the institution of this Most Holy Sacrament. As You are the source of every blessing, bestow Your benediction upon me, my relatives and friends. Bless my Church, bishops, priests, deacons and all those for whom I pray (especially ...). Let Your blessing flow abundantly and may it be felt in the souls of those who cannot come here to receive it. May the weak and tempted feel its power wherever they may be. Let all feel its influence, moving them to come to You. O Lord, grant me a strong love of You, a hatred of sin, a greater respect of grace, and great zeal for your honor and glory and for my sanctification and salvation. Amen.

My Lord and my God!

Blessed and praised be the most holy and divine Sacrament now and forever. Amen.

Action Item: Offer this reflection from our PNCC Prayer Book weekly during this month giving reverence and respect to the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ in the Most Blessed Sacrament.

JUNE - THE SOLEMNITY OF CORPUS CHRISTI

Scripture: John 1:1-14; John 6:35-53; John 15:1-8; Matthew 26:18-20, 26-29

<u>Reflection and Action Item</u>: On Thursday after the Solemnity of the Holy Trinity, the Catholic Churches around the world celebrate the Solemnity of Corpus Christi, also known as the Solemnity of the Most Precious Body and Blood of Christ.

The Solemnity of Corpus Christi is a religious manifestation and confession of Christian and Catholic faith. By the presence and active participation in the liturgy Catholics publicly profess their faith in the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist. This is a time when Catholics show their love for Christ by honoring Him in a public way and show their love for their neighbors by bringing the Lord and Savior closer to them.

On that day, after celebrating the Eucharist the faithful go in a solemn procession with the Blessed Sacrament to four altars.

The Solemnity of Corpus Christi has been solemnly celebrated in parishes of the Polish National Catholic Church since her organization. It was adapted from Western Catholic tradition and is strongly connected with our faith in the real presence of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. The procession associated with the feast day may be performed on the feast day itself, the Sunday within the octave, or any day throughout the octave. The Sequence within the Mass is said for the octave of this feast.

Processions held within the octave are often combined parish and/or seniorate celebrations. They usually incorporate the local branches of the United Women's Societies for the Adoration of the Most Blessed Sacrament.

Action Item: Attending the Parish or Seniorate Corpus Christi Mass and Procession giving thanks and praise to God for His precious gift of the presence of our Lord in the Holy Eucharist.

Remember Clergy Appreciation Weekend & Sacred Vocations Month, pray that the Lord Jesus will send more priests and deacons to his Church, and be sure to show your gratitude to your parish clergy by some meaningful gestures of appreciation.

July - Altar Servers - St. Tarcisius

Scripture: Matthew 5:13-16; 1 Corinthians 12:4-7

Reflection: In our celebration of the Holy Mass, our altar servers play such an important role. Consider just how much they do in serving God and the Church by assisting our priests and deacons during the Sacred Liturgy. They carry the cross and lit candles during processions, carry and handle the incense in procession and during the Mass, present the wine and water to the priest during the preparation of the gifts, wash the hands of the priest, ring the bells during the consecration, and hold the patten as the faithful receive the Most Sacred Body and Blood of our Lord. Our altar servers participate in the Mass by joining in the spoken responses and the singing of the hymns and music of the Mass. In doing all of these things with piety and attention, though, our altar servers fulfill a commission that we may sometimes overlook: they set a good example for us of true, loving piety for Jesus in the Most Blessed Sacrament.

St. Tarcisius, known as the "boy martyr of the Eucharist" was a young Christian in the Church of Rome in the 3rd Century, whose love and reverence for Christ's true and abiding presence in the Eucharist inspired him with the courage to give his life for our Lord! He is an ideal Patron Saint for our altar servers and an inspiration to all. His traditional feast day is August 15 but is secondary to the Solemnity of the Dormition and Assumption of the Blessed Mother. St. Tarcisius, pray for us!

Action Item: Here is an article about St. Tarcisius at the end of which you can assess your own reverence for the Holy Eucharist.

Schedule Sometime this month recognize all of your parish's altar servers: list their names in the bulletin, acknowledge them at the end of weekend Masses, pray for them by name during the General Intercessions, etc. Have a reception/picnic for the whole parish to thank them for their service and example of reverence to the Holy Eucharist.

AUGUST - SINGING OUR FAITH IN EUCHARISTIC HYMNS

<u>Scripture</u>: (Ephesians 5:19-20) Sing psalms and hymns in your hearts, giving thanks to God the Father at all times and for everything in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Reflection and Action Item:

If given some time to think, I am sure that most of us could name a large number of Church hymns that we know by heart. The singing of hymns has been a part of our Christian celebrations whenever we gather for Holy Mass and at the many other devotions within our parishes. These hymns are certainly beautiful and we are often moved in a deeply spiritual way when we hear them or sing them. Some of these hymns are only used in certain seasons of the Church year, but there are also hymns that speak to certain Catholic Christian realities, in particular, the Eucharistic Hymns. These hymns almost serve as a mini-catechism speaking truths that we all hold about what occurs when we gather for Holy Mass and when we receive Holy Communion. Just looking at one Eucharistic Hymn within our PNCC Hymnal "Hallowed Be Forever" allows us to see many aspects of our faith. This hymn contains lines such as "Hallowed be forever, Living Host Divine" showing us that the living Christ is present to us at Mass and in the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. "Sacrament Most Holy, by which we are fed," reminds us that in the reception of Holy Communion we are sustained and strengthened by the presence of Jesus. Another hymn "Jesus, My Lord and Savior" sums up exactly what we do each time we gather for Mass: "Jesus, my Lord and Savior, here I would worship Thee. All that I have I give Thee for Thou didst die for me. Here in this Bread of Heaven, here in this Host divine, thanksgiving, praise and honor be every moment Thine." Each of these Eucharist hymns says something to us and to all who hear us about our faith in Christ Jesus, present to us during the celebration of the Holy Eucharist.

Action Item - Sing along with the hymns when gathered during the celebration of Mass. Also taken a favorite Eucharistic Hymn, such as "Hallowed Be Forever" or "Jesus, My Lord and Savior" and sing it, either by yourself or with your family, each day.

SEPTEMBER - THE EUCHARIST IN THE DECLARATION OF SCRANTON

Scripture: (Acts 2:46-47) Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home, and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people.

Reflection and Action Item:

The Declaration of Scranton formulated and accepted by the P.N.C.C. Bishops on April 28, 2008 and later accepted by the Clergy Conference and the General Synod, helps guide the Church in its relationships with other Christian bodies. The document has allowed us to enter into fruitful and real ecclesial relations with the Nordic Catholic Church in Scandinavia and the rest of Europe. The largest and most vital paragraph of this document speaks to our faith in the Holy Eucharist and the celebration of Mass, which must be a part of any agreement that we have between Churches.

Important aspects of our faith are spoken of within this paragraph: Holy Mass is "the true central point of Catholic worship." We confess that we receive "the Body and Blood of our Savior Jesus Christ." When we gather for Mass we also know that we unite ourselves with "the one offering which Jesus Christ makes in Heaven." During the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, we participate in a true connection between heaven and earth.

This paragraph also shows us that when we gather at Holy Mass as a parish, there is also something else that occurs. It allows us to come together and unite ourselves to each other. The Holy Eucharist is "at the same time, a sacrificial feast by means of which the faithful in receiving the Body and Blood of our Savior enter into communion with one another (1 Cor. 10:17)." This reference to the First Letter to the Corinthians is recited during the Contemporary Rite of Mass, "Because there is one bread, we who are many, are one body, because we all partake of the one bread." This one body, our parish church, is also Christ present in the world today in another way. All then that the parish does, in the worship of God and in service to God's people, especially those within our local communities, is participating in the work of Jesus Christ in the

world today. What we do at Holy Mass allows us to extend the presence of Jesus Christ, outside our Church walls.

Action Item — Read the Eucharistic (6th) paragraph of the Declaration of Scranton as well as the Scripture quotes cited. Spend some time at Holy Mass reflecting on what actually occurs when we gather to worship God and receive His Son in Holy Communion

Schedule Zoom video conference: Soup, Sandwich & Sermon or Wine and Cheese Gathering –
Adult Education

OCTOBER - CLAIRE OF ASSIST

Scripture: Philippians 3:8-14, Matthew 19:27-29

Reflection: St. Clare of Assisi, whose August 11, came from a wealthy family which was devoted to our Lord within the Church. Tradition tells us that, after hearing St. Francis preach, she felt God's call to follow Jesus is a way similar to Francis' and embrace a life of detached poverty, simplicity, chastity, and prayer. Her family was against this, but she firmly held onto the call of the Holy Spirit and pursued this vocation along with other women whose leader and example she became to the point that they referred to her as "alter Franciscus"—"another Francis."

When St. Clare's life became challenging or overwhelming, when she grew tired or even afraid, she ran into the arms of Christ in the Eucharist. In this way, she is a wonderful example to all of us as disciples of Jesus, Whenever the unique pathway of discipleship that God has set out in front of each us becomes rocky or ridden with holes, and we feel like we can go no further and might even like to give up, we can go to Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament and receive our strength. St. Clare, pray for us!

Action Item: Here is St. Clare's Prayer to Jesus in the Holy Eucharist:

Every weekend this month, get to Mass early or stay a while after Mass and pray it to our Lord Whose true and abiding presence is in the tabernacles of our churches.

Schedule: October is also the month of the Holy Rosary, so schedule a time for the members of the Parish Family to gather in church and pray the Holy Rosary in the presence of the Most Blessed Sacrament.

NOVEMBER - CYRIL AND METHODIOUS

Scripture: Mark 6:34-44

Reflection Prayer: St. Cyril and his brother St. Methodius were born in the early 9th century in what is today Greece within a devout Christian family. They both dedicated their lives to Christ within the Church living this out many different ways—including Cyril's being a professor in a University and Methodius becoming the abbot of a monastery—but they are best known for being "the Apostles to the Slavs." Called by the Holy Spirit and sent by the Church as missionaries to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the peoples of Eastern Europe, the brothers traveled to what was then called "Great Moravia" which included territories that are today part of Poland, the Czech Republic, Slovakia, Hungary and Serbia. There they had great success in founding churches and training new clergy, preaching to the people, baptizing them and feeding them with the Body and Blood of the Lord. In order to translate the Scriptures—starting with the Gospels and the Psalms—and liturgical texts of the Church into the language of the Slavs, they even devised an alphabet. Although it has passed through some stages of development over the many years, is still used today in many languages.

The spiritual (and even cultural influence) of these brothers on so many of us within the Polish National Catholic Church cannot be overstated. It is as if Jesus saw so many people hungering for Him, and asked Cyril and Methodius to go and feed them on his behalf, and because they willingly and sacrificially did, the Slavic people have been encountering Christ in the proclamation of the Word and in receiving Him in the Most Holy Eucharist for over 1,150 years! St. Cyril and St. Methodius, pray for us!

Action Item: Follow the loving and courageous example of "the Apostles to the Slavs" and share your own faith with some else in this simple way: Invite them to come to Mass with you.

Schedule Mass and Event (Breakfast) for those who serve

Encourage Giving to those in need on Giving Tuesday

Schedule Drive of Collection to help homeless veterans in some way

Schedule Zoom video conference: Soup, Sandwich & Sermon or Wine and Cheese Gathering – Adult

Education

DECEMBER - THE EUCHARIST: THE HEART AND CENTER OF WHO WE ARE

<u>Scripture</u>: (Ezekiel 36:26-27) A new heart I will give you, and a new spirit in will put within you; and I will remove from your body the heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh. I will put my spirit within you and make you follow my statutes.

Reflection and Action Item:

As we were all beginning to once again open up our parish churches following the most difficult parts of the pandemic, I had the opportunity to distribute Holy Communion to a number of individuals who had not received our blessed Lord in Holy Communion for some time. I remember seeing the tears of joy in their eyes as they approached the altar to receive Jesus and how moved they were to be united, at that moment, with our Lord. These individuals were aware that up until that time they were missing something precious and holy within their lives.

It is so very easy for each of us to lose track of exactly what are the most important things in life. First and foremost of these things must be the worship of God in the Holy Eucharist and the reception of His Son in Holy Communion. When we do not participate in this central point in our lives or when we do not attend to it the way we should, we begin, in fact, to have "stony hearts." God desires that we come to Him in worship and in love; He desires that we are united to Him in the reception of Holy Communion. He seeks to put within us "hearts of flesh," hearts renewed under His continuing creative power and love.

In order to us to be true and faithful Catholics, true and faithful followers of Jesus Christ, our worship and participation at the Holy Eucharist is essential. It is our worship of the God Who created us, our union with the Lord Who loves us and gave Himself for us upon the Cross. It is the opportunity to join with others into the one body of Christ on earth to accomplish His work and build the kingdom of God. It is truly the heart and center of who we are and all that we are, as individuals and as parishes together. In fact, it is the heart and center of all creation.

Action Item - After the reception of Holy Communion at your parish church, pray the Prayers of Thanksgiving after Communion from the PNCC Prayerbook and contemplate the great gift you have received as Christ comes to you in Holy Communion.

Schedule and conduct Advent Retreat/Penitential Service

Parish Engagement – Physical and Spiritual

As we move towards a post-Covid world we need to encourage a return and renewal of our worship and building the Kingdom of God with the opportunities presented to us. While continuing to encourage vaccination, all parishes should return to all previous as well as additional discipleship activities/engagement. This should be done by the parish committee, other committees and groups of the parish following the Bishops Covid guidelines and CDC guidance.

EUCHARISTIC ADDRATION

As we focus on the Holy Eucharist in 2022 make time for Eucharistic Adoration in the parish. Stress the importance of this time in prayer and reflection before the Most Blessed Sacrament. Pray the Litany of the Most Blessed Sacrament either corporately or privately during this time.

INCREASE PARISH SPIRITUALITY

In addition to Eucharistic Adoration. Consider purchasing PNCC Prayer Books for the pews in your parish. Also provide daily prayers and reflections for different Liturgical Seasons of the Church Year.

For 10 minutes prior to the celebration of Holy Mass have a time when the pastor is unavailable for Church business and that no other things are being discussed but a focus on the Holy Sacrifice of Mass. This will continue to bring an enhanced spirituality and reverence for the Eucharist to our parishes. Encourage use of the introductory pages of the Mass booklet – especially page 8 as well as prayers from our Prayer Book preparing for Holy Mass and Confession.

COMPLETE AT LEAST EIGHT COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECTS

It is important that parishes continue their outreach into the local community. This year we are to increase the project by another one and making it eight. These efforts will create a greater presence of the parish in the community. Even during this ongoing pandemic there are many opportunities and ways that we can live out our discipleship and put our faith into action bettering our local communities and thus our world.

SPECIAL MASSES (IN PERSON)

Again have at least two Special Masses and open them to the community. This would be in addition to our Sunday Mass. During Lent have a Mass for Healing and invite all those who are ill, hurting spiritually or emotionally to attend and spend time in prayer, to hear God's Word and receive Christ in the Eucharist and the Sacrament of Anointing. Use the Mass for Healing during Lent – this will be emailed to all clergy as a reminder at the beginning of Lent.

In the fall (November) have a Mass to Salute those who Serve - for your first responders/those in military service and Veterans. This Mass could be followed by a meal to honor those who serve/who have served. You could also have a Mass in time of tragedy when the need may arise in your community or our nation. These could be followed by a time of fellowship and food at the parish.

You could also schedule a Mass for those grieving at any time during the Church Liturgical Year.

Welcome the community to these Masses by promoting them in your local media and newspaper, as well as fliers and social media. Invite other local groups to join you for these Masses.

CONTINUE AND STRENGTHEN YOUR SOCIAL MEDIA PRESENCE

Begin or continue to post regular messages to your parish Facebook – Instagram pages and appropriate videos to your parish YouTube page. Ask your members to share them through their social media accounts as well to reach more people. Keep your websites current and user friendly. Take advantage of the opportunities that technology offers to promote our precious faith and how this faith is lived in the work and ministries of your parish.

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ADULT CONTINUING EDUCATION

VIDEO CONFERENCING, WINE AND CHEESE CLUB OR SOUP, SANDWICH AND SERMON

Continue to gather for adult education and formation in our Christian Catholic faith. Perhaps you could use the reflections from the monthly figures for 2022 above. This can be done via Zoom, Internet Conferencing, the Soup, Sandwich and Sermon Concept, Wine and Cheese Gatherings concept (based on the Pub Theology: Beer, Conversation and God), using a Book Club format or even via online.

DAYS OF SPIRITUAL RETREAT AND

Lent and one other (Advent) Pick a day during the seasons of Lent and one other time in 2021 to spend in retreat and prayer. This can be done on either a parish or seniorate level. Ideas for the Retreat include: Mass of the Day, special Lenten/Advent service of Penance, Scripture Readings/Reflections and Meditations, Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament; For Lent: Stations of the Cross, Sorrowful Lamentations, etc. This can be open and advertised to the local community either in person or virtually.

DAY OF CARING AND SERVICE

Pick a day to designate as a day of caring and service living out your discipleship as a parish family. After beginning with prayer there are may things you can do. Caring cards for those sick and in nursing care, put together something for the homeless (food or clothing), prayer blankets for those in need, treats for our health care workers or first responders. There are just a few things that could be done for those in your parish and local community to show your love of God by showing kindness and love to them.

THE PENTECOST EXPERIENCE

"I believe that the Holy Spirit of God, rules the world in the natural as well as in the moral order; that all the laws of the universe, as well as those by which the soul of individual man and humanity as a whole are guided, are an emanation of the will, goodness and righteousness of the Divine Being."

Bp. Francis Hodur

"Bethlehem was God with us, Calvary was God for us, Pentecost is God in us."

Robert Baer

The Solemnity of Pentecost celebrates the birth of the Christian Church. The term "*Pentecost*" comes from the Greek word "Πεντηκοστή" meaning "fifty."

On that first Pentecost, Luke records in the Acts of the Apostles, that the Holy Spirit came as a "rushing and mighty wind." He also records that there were 120 persons gathered, both men and women, On that day, we are taught that the Holy Spirit, as promised by Jesus, came and would sanctify and edify the Church, which is the "Body of Christ."

According to our faith, we believe that God exists in three Divine, but separate persons: God the Father, the Creator of all things, God the Son, the Redeemer and Regenerator of the World and the Holy Spirit, the Sanctifier of the Church and its believers. We read in the Old Testament, that the Holy Spirit was with God from the beginning. "In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth, and the earth was without form and void, and darkness was upon the face of the deep; and the Spirit of God moved over the face of the waters."

The Holy Spirit is known in Judaism as "Ruach", the very breath, the "wind of God". In the OT He was also known as the "Elohim" the Seven-fold Spirit of God.

We also find in the Old Testament, that the Holy Spirit came unto a select few, with divine gifts for the purposes of providing wisdom and leadership, but most

importantly the gift of prophecy. One of the Prophets, Joel, prophesied over 500 years before the Pentecost: "And in the last days it shall be, God declares, that I will pour out My Spirit upon all flesh and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions and your old men shall dream dreams."

In the New Testament, the revelation of the Holy Spirit begins with Jesus. For Jesus was the unique bearer of the Spirit. He came unto Jesus in the form of a dove at His baptism. Jesus was guided and empowered by the Spirit throughout His public ministry, which included the miracles as well as His preaching and teachings of the "Good News." It was at the Last Supper, that Jesus further reveal His promises to His disciples that the Spirit would be with them, to protect them as a Comforter, and help them to remember and testify everything He taught them. Our Lord Jesus reminds all of us that this same Spirit would be with those who formed the Church.

I would like to share with you two thoughts of the truth of the Holy Spirit on this Pentecost:

1. The first truth is that the Holy Spirit empowers all God's people. The prophecies of the Old Testament and the promises of Jesus concerning the Holy Spirit were fulfilled on that first Pentecost. At that time, God did pour forth His Spirit on all those gathered as it was foretold by the prophet, Joel. The Spirit of God would also bring forth various gifts for the purpose of edifying or bringing the Church together in "One" Spirit. On that first Pentecost, the outpouring of the Spirt also caused those assembled with the speaking of all the known languages of the world. This would give them the ability to preach in different languages as they were to be the bearers of the "Good News" of Jesus. Prior to His Ascension, Jesus told them: "But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be My witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria and unto the ends of the earth."

2. The second truth is that the Holy Spirit leads individuals. The NT Epistles tells us that the story of that first Pentecost continues to the present day. We learn that the Holy Spirit guides the Church and brings new life, to its members, who form the "One Body" of Christ. Jesus teaches us in the Gospel of John that the Holy Spirit will come into the hearts of the believers.

The Holy Spirit imparts different gifts to better serve God and His people. He assists them in prayer and worship. He transforms Christians into persons, bearing the "gifts of the Spirit"; love, joy, peace patience, gentleness, goodness, faithfulness, humility and self-control. The Holy Spirit creates a new family of God, and a new fellowship with each other which is the Church.

The one question that puzzles many people about the Holy Spirit is: How do we know when the Spirit is present? The Holy Spirit cannot be defined by logic or reason in the mind of man, but only in a sincere heart and trust in Jesus, the Anointed One of God. When Christ is not Lord, the Spirit is not at work. When Christ is Lord, then the Spirit is at work. The major work of the Holy Spirit is to pour out God's love into the hearts of people so they may have a new understanding of the love God has for all. As we learn and share this divine love, each believer is sanctified (made holy) and the Church is edified (enlightened). Together, the individual and the Church are bound together by this Spirit. We are taught that Christ is the "Bridegroom" and that the Church is His "Bride."

THE SOLEMNITY OF PENTECOST

I find that the two works of Saint Luke in the New Testament; his Gospel account of Jesus and the Book of the Acts of the Apostles are perfect companions to each other. Holy Scripture brings to us, through his writings, the events leading up to the Pentecost experience. The following are several key scriptural passages which brings to us chronologically greater insights to this day.

"On one occasion, while He [Jesus] was eating with them, and He gave them this command: "Do not leave Jerusalem, but wait for the gift My Father promised, which you have heard Me speak about. For John baptized with water, but in a few days, you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit." (Acts 1:4-5).

Luke continues to record the words of Jesus:

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be My witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." After He said this, He was taken up before their very eyes, and a cloud hid Him from their sight." (Acts 1:8-9).

"Then He led them out as far as Bethany, and, lifting up His hands, He blessed them. While He was blessing them, He withdrew from them and was carried up into heaven. And they worshiped Him and returned to Jerusalem with great joy, and they were continually in the temple blessing God." (Luke 24:50-52).

We continue to read in the Gospel of Luke:

"Then the apostles returned to Jerusalem from the hill called the Mount of Olives, a Sabbath day's walk from the city. When they arrived, they went upstairs to the room where they were staying. Those present were Peter, John, James and Andrew; Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew; James, son of Alphaeus and Simon the Zealot, and Judas son of James. They all joined together constantly in prayer, along with the women and Mary the mother of Jesus, and with his brothers." (Luke 1:12-14).

That first Pentecost, as recorded by Luke, in the Acts of the Apostles, became the fulfillment of our Lord's "Promise" that exists to all of us this day.

"When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues, as the Spirit enabled them." (Acts 2:1-4).

We read that there were travelers from around the world who gathered in Jerusalem that day to celebrate **Shavuot**, which is also known as the "Feast of the Last First Fruits." In Judaism, the celebration of Shavuot, commanded by God, was and is tied to the giving of the "Ten Commandments of God", also known as the "*Matan Torah.*", which was and is celebrated on the fiftieth day after Passover. We find that St. Paul in his letter to the Galatians, refers to the fruits of the Spirit. (Galatians 5:22).

THE PROMISE OF THE HOLY SPIRIT AS FOUND IN THE GOSPEL OF JOHN

Saint John, the "Beloved" disciple of Jesus, most importantly, records in his Gospel account, the words of Jesus speaking at His Last Supper, with a "Promise" of the coming of the Holy Spirit, whom He called "the Spirit of Truth," "Paraclete," "Advocate," and "Comforter"



<u>Jesus Promises the Holy Spirit</u> (John 14:15-21)

"If you love Me, keep My commands. And I will ask the Father, and He will give you another advocate to help you and be with you forever, the Spirit of truth. The world cannot accept Him because it neither sees Him nor knows Him. But you know Him, for He lives with you and will be in you. I will not leave you as orphans; I will come to you. Before long, the world will not see Me anymore, but you will see Me. Because I live, you also will live. On that day you will realize that I am in my Father, and you are in Me, and I am in You. Whoever has My commands and keeps them is the one who loves Me. The one who loves Me will be loved by My Father, and I too will love them and show Myself to them."

In John 15, Jesus again speaks of the coming of the Spirit:

The Work of the Holy Spirit (John 15:26-27)

"When the Advocate comes, whom I will send to you from the Father—the Spirit of truth who goes out from the Father—He will testify about Me. And you also must testify, for you have been with Me from the beginning.

Jesus was to tell His Apostles that evening that they were to be His witnesses and in John 16:7-8, 12-15 John writes that Jesus again speaks of the coming of the Spirit:

Jesus Promises the Spirt of Truth (John 16:7-8, 12-15)

"But very truly I tell you, it is for your good that I am going away. Unless I go away, the Advocate will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you. When He comes, He will prove the world to be in the wrong about sin and righteousness and judgment. I have much more to say to you, more than you can now bear. But when He, the Spirit of truth, comes, He will guide you into all the truth. He will not speak on His own; He will speak only what He hears, and He will tell you what is yet to come. He will glorify Me because it is from Me that He will receive what He will make known to you. All that belongs to the Father is Mine. That is why I said the Spirit will receive from Me what He will make known to you."








POLISH EXILE AUGUST MALCZEWSKI VEL JAKUBOWSKI REMEMBERED

On Sunday, April 24, 2022 was the 185th anniversary of the death of August Malczewski vel Jakubowski, a Polish exile was remembered. Members of the Polish Heritage Committee as well as two

guests gathered at August's gravesite at Bridge Street Cemetery for a memorial service. Father Adam Czarnecki conducted the prayer service and a new Polish flag was placed at the grave. John Skibiski read a short history of Mr. Malczewski vel Jakubowski and Fred Zimnoch read his obituary that was published in the Daily Hampshire Gazette.

Short history as provided to the Gazette by Fred Zimnoch:

August was a young Polish nobleman who was exiled from Poland with a group of Revolutionaries who participated in the failed uprising of November 1830 that hoped to free



Survival Center.

Poland from under the yoke of Russia. While in this country he wrote a history of Poland called "The Remembrances of a Polish Exile". Then in Northampton he taught French at Miss Dwight's Seminary for Young Ladies. After one year, he became grievously ill and died. At the time he was about 21 years old. His students provided for his burial and the gravestone shown in the photos in the article.






DIOCESAN CHRISM MASS 2022

On Holy Tuesday April 12, 2022 Our Saviour's Parish in Woonsocket, RI, hosted the Diocesan Chrism Mass. The Holy Mass of Chrism was celebrated by Bp. Paul Sobiechowski and the Clergy of the Eastern Diocese.

The Holy Oils, used by the Church in the Sacramental Rites, are blessed by the Bishop. During the Mass bishop blesses the Oil of Catechumens used in Baptism; the Holy Chrism which is used in Confirmation, Baptism, the Ordination of Priests, the consecration of Bishops, and in the consecration of altars, chalices and Church buildings, and bells; and the Oil of the Sick used in the anointing of the sick. These Holy Oils are symbols of spiritual nourishment and the light of grace, and are presented to and received by the parish communities on Holy Thursday during the Mass of the Institution of the Holy Eucharist (The Lord's Supper).

The beautiful music for the Mass was provided by Karen Sobiechowski and the United Choir members of the Eastern Diocese.

ANGLICAN G3 – PNCC CHURCHES WORKING TOGETHER TO PROVIDE HUMANITARIAN RE-LIEF FOR UKRAINE

On March 15 and 16, 2022, the G-3/PNCC Ecumenical Dialogue Group met at the Anglican Cathedral of the Epiphany in Columbia, South Carolina. Representing the G-3 were Archbishop Mark Haverland (Anglican Catholic Church – ACC), Archbishop Chandler Jones (Anglican Province in America - APA) Bishops Paul Hewett (Anglican Catholic Church - DHC), Brian Marsh (Anglican Church in America - ACA), and Alexander Webb (ACA) and Fathers Robert Bader (ACC - DHC), Jonathan Foggin (ACC), Creighton McElveen (APA) and Christian Tutor (ACA). Polish National Catholic Church members included Prime Bishop Anthony Mikovsky, Bishop Paul Sobiechowski, Father Seniors Robert Nemkovich Jr. and John Kowalczyk and Father Scott Lill. Bishops Hewett and Sobiechowski served as the Dialogue Co-Chairman for this meeting.

With prayer and concern for the war in Ukraine the Anglican G3 and PNCC Churches decided to work together to aid those fleeing from Ukraine. Contributions from the churches and The International Anglican Fellowship (IAF) will be sent to parishes of the Polish Catholic Church in Poland (Sister Church to the PNCC) which is undertaking regular humanitarian relief efforts on behalf of the Ukrainian refugees in Poland.

Updates were given by the various churches and the Union of Scranton about recent events within their respective communions and to how they are now moving forward in our post Covid situation. The dialogue also discussed aspects of Intercommunion between the PNCC and Episcopal Church prior to 1976 and other issues and ways the Churches can continue to grow closer together and achieve the unity that our Lord prayed for His Catholic Church. Bishop Hewett celebrated the Holy Mass during the meeting and

Evensong.

Thanks to Bishop Hewett. Fr. Braddock and the Cathedral of the Epiphany for their hospitality in hosting this meet-The next ina. meeting of the G3/PNCC Ecumenical Dialogue will take place in January of 2023 to be hosted by the PNCC.

The readers were Phyllis Hunt and Beverly Runowicz. The Gospel was proclaimed by Father Senior Krusienski.

Karen Sobiechowski, diocesan organist, led diocesan choir members in appropriate hymns dedicated to the Holy Eucharist.

Father Tenus pastor of St. Casimir's Parish, extended greetings of his parish and the local ANS Society. He invited all to the sanctuary to have a group picture taken after which we adjourned to the parish center for light refreshments.

At 11:37 am the Convention was called to order by President JoAnn Menzia who led us in prayer. welcomed all to the convention and made introductions.

In conjunction with Future Directions, the theme of our convention was "Becoming Eucharistic People" emphasizing our devotion to the Blessed Sacrament.

The Mandate committee report was ratified on a motion by Marilyn Folcik, seconded by Phyllis Hunt. The Roll Call was completed by the recording secretary after which Bishop Sobiechowski administered the oath of office to the delegates.

Minutes of the 70th Convention had been sent electronically and were accepted with a motion by Marilyn Folcik seconded by Diane Bielizna.

The financial reports, also sent electronically (see below), were accepted on a motion by Arlene Strazzulla and seconded by Deb Charette.

The treasurer's report indicated the following:

The Financial secretary's report indicated ten parishes have sent in dues and are up to date. A total \$585.00 has been collected in dues and \$680.00 in donations. We have 117 members in the diocese.

Election of officers for 2022-2024 was conducted by Vice-president Marilyn Folcik.

A motion to accept the proposed slate of officers with the addition of Nancy Reilly as auditor was made by Karen Sobiechowski, seconded by Phyllis Hunt. The following were elected: President JoAnn Menzia (6th term), Vice-President Marilyn Folcik (6th term), Recording Secretary Janice Klimczak (8th term), Financial Secretary Susan Locks (8th term), Treasurer Sally Watson (7th term), Auditors: Sue Pretola (6th term), Diane Hodgkins (6th term), Anne Barnet (6th term), Nancy Reilly (1st term), Organizers: Cynthia Hebert, Northeast seniorate (4th term), Mary Ann Curylo, Central seniorate (3rd term), Open position, Southwest seniorate; Marshals: Karen Sobiechowski (2nd term), Deb Charette (1st term), Janice Soltysiak (4th term), Phyllis Hunt (6th term), Arlene Strazzulla (3rd term).

A game of bingo, featuring words referring to the Eucharist was played, led by Marilyn Folcik and Arlene Strazzulla. Game was won by Sub-deacon Justin Daviault.

Lunch was served at 12:30 pm.

The meeting resumed at 1:20 pm with our guest speaker, Father Robert Koerber, pastor of Holy Name of Jesus Parish, South Deerfield, MA. His presentation was entitled: The Eucharist - "The Center of Our Worship and an Historical Perspective".

In his talk Father Koerber emphasized that the Holy Eucharist is the real presence of Jesus Christ in the form of bread and wine. In our church, as in the Orthodox faith, the Eucharist is considered a "mystery".

Father also explained that our Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament Society is important because we bear witness to the devotion and adoration of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament.

In addition our responsibilities include demonstrating love of God and loyalty to the Polish National Catholic Church. We promote spiritual development, care for the church sanctuary including flowers, linens and cleanliness, attend and assist at worship services, remember the ill with visitations, cards and calls and pay final tribute to deceased sisters at their wakes and funerals.

New Business

The National ANS convention will be held May 19-21, 2023 hosted by the ANS sisters of Holy Trinity Parish, Plantsville, CT. This will also be the 72nd consecutive convention of the Adoration of the Most Blessed Sacrament of the Eastern Diocese.

Vice President Marilyn Folcik informed those in attendance that the National Board will send mandates out via regular mail. Guests will be housed at Courtyard by Mariott, 1081 West St., Southington, CT. A tentative schedule has been proposed including registration from 1-5 pm on May 19, meet and greet at 5:30 pm with light supper, greetings and opening remarks from 6:30-8:30 pm. Registration on Saturday, May 20 at 8 am will be followed with Mass at 9 am and group picture. A continental breakfast/ meeting will begin at 10 am. Lunch will be served at 12 noon continuing with the business meeting and elections. Vicki Triano, local minister, will be guest speaker in the afternoon followed possibly by a Bible Study video or other activity. Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament will be celebrated at 5 pm followed by dinner/adjournment. Sunday, May 21 Mass will be celebrated at 10 am followed by breakfast and adjournment by noon.

Future locations for 2024 were discussed. We are overdue for a convention in the Central Seniorate. To make attending easier and lessen the work load for hosting sisters it was suggested that we hold the convention in a central location with perhaps a potluck lunch.

Bishop Sobiechowski explained why the Youth Retreat will be held at Blessed Trinity Parish, Fall River, MA again this year in person. Covid restrictions and health considerations make it impossible to arrange activities at Camp Howe this year but hopefully things will change soon. A motion to fund the Youth Retreat in the amount of \$200 was made by Nancy Reilly, seconded by Sue Locks and passed.

President Menzia then said a prayer for our sisters departed since last year. Prayers were also said for those who are ill, anxious or under stress. It was suggested individuals and sodalities send our sister Emilia DeVore birthday cards for her 99th birthday.

President JoAnn Menzia spoke about "Angels Among Us", about serving others. Each organization represented was given a gift bag containing lap afghans created by member Jean Doda, now deceased. These should be given to people who are ill or ailing to bring them cheer. She also suggested sending cards and making phone calls to keep in touch with those unable to get around.

After an explanation of an adult education project to be more mindful of the Bible's teachings, sunflower seedlings, symbol of hope in the Ukraine, were distributed to those in attendance. It is hoped that as the sunflowers grow, so too will the Eucharistic people of the PNCC. The basket raffle brought in a total of \$307. Half will go into the ED-ANS treasury, half will go to the ANS of Lowell for their favorite charity

Bishop Sobiechowski thanked all for their attendance and listed upcoming activities in the diocese/seniorate/general church: Bible Study, second Thursday of each month; NE seniorate Corpus Christi Mass, Woonsocket, RI June 16; Diocesan Council, June 4, Plantsville, CT; Cathedral of the Pines, July 10.

Bishop Sobiechowski gave the closing prayer and his blessing. The convention ended at 3:10 pm.

Parishes in Lowell, MA, Manchester, NH, Plantsville, CT, South Deerfield, MA, Westfield, MA participated. There were 22 lay participants and 6 clergy representing 5 parishes.






Stanisław

Urodzony 15 stycznia 1869 w Krakowie w rodzinie rzeźbiarza. Od 1880 wychowywał się u krewnych. Uczył się w gimnazjum Św. Anny, zaprzyjaźnił się wówczas z Józefem Mehofferem, Lucjanem Rydlem, Stanisławem Estreichem. W 1887 rozpoczął studia malarskie w krakowskiej Szkole Sztuk Pięknych, której dyrektorem był wówczas Jan Matejko. Matejko powierzył wyróżniającemu się studentowi współudział w wykonaniu polichromii odnawianego kościoła Mariackiego. W latach 1887-90 i 1896-1897 uczęszczał na Uniwersytet Jagielloński, gdzie słuchał wykładów z historii, historii sztuki i literatury. W 1890 udał się w podróż zagraniczną przez Włochy i Szwajcarię do Francji, następnie do Niemiec i Pragi. W latach 1891-1894 trzykrotnie przebywał w Paryżu, gdzie uczęszczał do prywatnej Acadėmie Colarossi, zetknął się m.in. z Paulem

Gauguinem, uczęszczał na spektakle teatralne i operowe. Do Krakowa powrócił w 1904. Zaprojektował i częściowo wykonał polichromię w restaurowanym kościele Franciszkanów. Nawiązał współpracę z Teatrem Miejskim w Krakowie. W roku 1897 rozpoczął współpracę z krakowskim "Życiem" jako ilustrator, w 1902 został docentem Akademii Sztuk Pięknych, w 1905 radnym miasta Krakowa. Projektował wnętrza i meble. W 1905 stawiając swoją kandydaturę na stanowisko dyrektora krakowskiego Teatru Miejskiego planował odnowienie i wzbogacenie wielkiego repertuaru teatralnego; ostatecznie dyrektorem został L. Solski. Od wielu lat ciężko chory podupadał na zdrowiu, wreszcie unieruchomiony w podkrakowskich Węgrzcach kończył rozpoczęte dzieła, częściowo już tylko dyktując. Zmarł 28 listopada 1907 w Krakowie. Pogrzeb Wyspiańskiego stał się manifestacja narodową, pochowany w grobach zasłużonych na Skałce.

Dramaturg, poeta, malarz, reformator teatru. Napisał w sumie 37 tekstów dramatycznych - jak William Shakespeare. Zorientowany w rozmaitych konwencjach dramaturgii europejskiej, pisał dramaty nawiązujące do tradycji dramatu antycznego (Powrót Odysa, Achilleis), szekspirowskiego - napisał traktat-parafrazę Hamlet; Legenda i debiutancki Daniel nawiązuje do dramaturgii Wagnera; do dramatu Maeterlincka - Protesilas i Laodomia: skomentował w swoich dramatach powstanie listopadowe: Warszawianka, Lelewel, Noc listopadowa; reinterpretację historii Polski przeprowadził w Legendzie, Bolesławie Śmiałym i Skałce. W trylogii ideowej: Wesele (1901), Wyzwolenie (1903) i Akropolis (1904) zaproponował zasadniczy rozrachunek z Polską współczesną. Był pierwszym inscenizatorem całości Dziadów Mickiewiczowskich; twórca i ideolog polskiego teatru monumentalnego, wyprowadzonego z XVI Lekcii Mickiewiczowskich wykładów o literaturze słowiańskiej. Wesele, uważane za najważniejszy dramat Wyspiańskiego, zostało zainspirowane ślubem przyjaciela poety -Lucjana Rydla. Wystawione po raz pierwszy 16 marca 1901 rychło utraciło swój charakter reportażowy, stało się jednym z najważniejszych głosów w dyskusji o Polsce, obok licznych inscenizacji tego dramatu na uwagę zasługuje film Andrzeja Wajdy (1973).

Wyspiański

Born on 5th January 1869 in Kraków to the family of a sculptor. His relatives raised him from 1880. He studied at St. Anne's Grammar School, where he made friends with Józef Mehoffer, Lucjan Rydel, Stanisław

Estreich. In 1887 he commenced his study of painting at the Fine Arts School in Kraków, where Jan Matejko was the principal. Matejko trusted his outstanding student with collaboration in the creation of polychroming during the renovation of St Mary's Church. In 1887-90 and 1896-1897 he attended the Jagiellonian University, where he listened to lectures on history, art history and literature. In 1890 he travelled abroad through Italy and Switzerland to France, and then to Germany and Prague. Between 1891 and 1894 he went to Paris three times and attended a private school the Acadèmie Colarossi, he came into contact with Paul Gauguin, he frequented the theatre and opera. He came back to Kraków in 1904. He designed and partly created the polychrome surfaces in a renovated church of the Franciscans. He

established co-operation with the Municipal Theatre in Kraków. In 1897 he commenced the co-operation with Kraków's "Życie" ("Life") as an illustrator, in 1902 he became a reader at the Fine Art Academy, and in 1905 an alderman in Kraków. He was an interior and furniture designer. In 1905, when he ran for the post of the principal of the Municipal Theatre in Kraków, he planned to reconstruct and enrich the great theatre repertoire; J. Solski eventually obtained the post. He was seriously ill for many years and was finally confined in Wearzce near Kraków. There he finished the commenced works, partially by means of dictation only. He died on 28th November 1907 in Kraków. His funeral became a national manifestation; he was buried at the cemetery for the distinguished at Skałka.

Dramatist, poet, painter, reformer of theatre. He wrote 37 plays altogether - just like William Shakespeare. Being familiar with various conventions of European drama writing, he wrote dramas referring to the tradition of ancient drama (Powrót Odvsa, Achilleis), and that of Shakespearean drama - he wrote a treatise-paraphrase of Hamlet: Legenda ("A Legend") and his debut Daniel refers to Wagner's work; Protesilas and Laodomia to Maeterlinck's play; he commented on the November Uprising in his dramas: Warszawianka, Lelewel, Noc listopadowa; he reinterpreted Polish history in Legenda, Bolesław Śmiały and Skałka. In his ideological trilogy: Wesele ("The Wedding") (1901). Wyzwolenie ("Liberation") (1903) and Akropolis ("Acropolis") (1904) he proposed a fundamental reckoning with contemporary Poland. He was the first to stage the whole of Mickiewicz's play - Dziady ("Forefathers' Eve"); the creator and ideologue of Polish monumental theatre, derived from XVI Lekcje, Mickiewicz's lectures on Slavic literature. Wesele, which is considered the most important of Wyspiański's dramas, was inspired by the wedding of the poet's friend -Lucjan Rydel. Wesele, staged for the first time on 16th March 1901, soon lost its journalistic character and became one of the most important voices in the discussion about Poland; apart from numerous theatre productions, the film by Andrzej Wajda (1973) deserves attention.

Niech nikt nad grobem mi nie płacze, krom jednej mojej żony, za nic mi wasze łzy sobacze i żal ten wasz zmyślony.


