FEATHERS IN THE WIND

Lately, I have been reflecting on the idiosyncrasy of our local Amana German (Kolonie Deutsch). One thing that I remember is that Mrs. Ruff, our English teacher, once commented that people from East Amana seemed to end their sentences on a higher note, like a question. I always felt that people from Middle Amana (especially men) spoke more with a nasal tone. I could give examples, but they have all long since died.

Our youngest son, while helping a patient, was told that he spoke German like someone from Stuttgart, which is ironic given that is where his greatgrandfather came from. I am always saying things incorrectly, such as "Dante" instead of "Tante," or "Blimo" instead of "Plimo," which I think has something to do with the way these words were pronounced when I was growing up in Homestead. Naturally, we use the informal "du" form of address instead of "sie." My German teacher at Coe College blushed when I would go off speaking in "Kolonie Deutsch," and, instead of addressing him as "Herr Doktor" would say "Du" (bad etiquette in the 1960s) I know that when the car and telephone were not yet around and communication between the villages was more limited, there were words, or phrases, that were used only in a specific town. My Tante Line Rettig, who moved from Amana to Middle in the 1920s, always told how she had to learn new phrases, just as my own mother did when she moved from Amana to Homestead some 20 years later. Providing Meals and Comfort - Ministry Enters 29th Year

The Amana Church has volunteered at the Iowa City Free Lunch Program one day each month for the past 28 years serving, on average, 110 people at each meal.

On the 3rd Tuesday a group of Amana Church and St. Mary's of Oxford volunteers, plans, cooks and serves noon dinner at the Free Lunch Program, 1105 Gilbert Court, Suite 100, Iowa City. They bring food with them and supplement what they've brought with what's provided at the FLP kitchen. Over 35 area churches and service groups provide the meals, each has one or more days a month assigned to them.

The FLP is open six days a week from about 11: 30 till 1 p.m. On cold days the doors open early so that people may come inside and warm themselves.

Amana Church Elder Betsy Momany began working with FLP to give Clear Creek Amana 8th grade students an opportunity to do a volunteer service project and as she tells us, "shine while helping others. It was a chance for young people who didn't always do great in school to show what they could do hands-on. We once had a young man who struggled with school be the one to shine when none of know how to re-light the (gas stove) pilot light. He did it and smiled the rest of the day."

The program has evolved to include more adults and St. Mary's Church of Oxford regularly sends volunteers. Momany explained, "When we took the CCA 8th grade students, we had 15 students and 5 adults. The pandemic put an end to taking school kids and afterwards there were too many students in a class for us to divide between the 10 months we could go during the school year. So, in Peg Roemig so that patrons could have a treat to take with them after their dinner.

The volunteers arrive at the kitchen about 9 a.m. cook and serve and then clean-up after the meal, making sure the dining area and kitchen are ready for the next day's service. By 1:30 p.m. they are heading home.

The Amana Church provides support, but it takes a village, or in this case two villages to do this work. Momany explained "Much credit goes to the Amana Society for donating meat, Lynn Trumpold and Amana deer hunters for donating 60 to 100 pounds of deer minute steak, St. Mary's church and congregation for donating food to fill 1 gallon bags with candy, canned meat, canned tuna, rice Krispie

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2020 we had St. Mary's folks join us.

Regular volunteers include: Pat and Kathy Kellenberger, Kristie Yoder, Kathy Brack, Tami and Joe Rohret, Larry and Lauri Tow, Susan Shoup, and Gary Klaas. Each month another four or 5 people volunteer to help from both congregations. It takes a team of people to cook a hot, fresh, hardy meal, serve it and clean up afterward.

What do they typically cook? Generally, they prepare two meat options, three large pans of spinach quiche prepared by Susan Shoup, grilled cheese sandwiches, vegetables, fresh fruit salad, potatoes, noodles or both, and a dessert. As Momany explained, some dishes (like the desserts) are prepared in advance, but most of the food is cooked at the FLP's big kitchen.

This year for the Christmas meal, the Amana-Oxford team made homemade beef roast and gravy, Susan's spinach quiche, sliced Amana ham, grilled cheese sandwiches, all the sides dishes and assorted home-made desserts made by Kathy Kellenberger.

Did You Know?....

There are those folks who are confused regarding West Amana. Some say "We are not part of the Land Use District". That would be inaccurate. A portion of West Amana IS within the Land Use District. So therefore, they would fall under the guidelines of the ACLUD ordinances.

The best way to figure out if your property in West Amana is within the boundaries of the ACLUD (as well as know whether your parcel is under Historic Preservation – HP guidelines) is to go to www.aclud.org. Click on Zoning Maps then on the link for West Amana. The gray colored areas are outside ACLUD, and the colored areas are within ACLUD.

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bars, fruit, juice, and assorted treats, many, many community members who bring us food and clothes every time we go and of course, HACAP which provides food for FLP at reduced rates." Tim and Betsy Momany help by buying essentials not otherwise provided.

"Anyone is welcome to join in volunteering. . . It is an answer to Christ's call to feed the hungry and more. I truly believe that those of us who go receive so much out of the experience. . ." Momany said. "We serve about an equal number of men and women. We have little children in the summer and during school breaks. There are about 15 percent of the folks who are men that served their country (in the military) but don't have any help," said Momany.

Many of the people are homeless, many are working and have a place to live, but cannot afford to buy food. They come in during their lunch breaks from jobs in the city. Many are elderly or handicapped.

After the 14th of each month the number of people who need food grows as generally in our state food stamps are used up by the 14th of the month. That's when the number of elderly people and mothers with their hungry children increases FLP volunteers have told us.

Each month the Amana-Oxford group takes donated clothing with them; often filling three, 8-foot tables free blankets warm coats, clothes and socks for all ages that people can take with them. Most often every single thing is pick up. Last month they brought in boxes of blankets and comforters – all were gone at the end of the day but for one small box which was taken to Good Will.

Can you help? If you would like to help by cooking food at home (often food is prepared at home and brough to the FLP) or coming to cook at the FLP contact Betsy at 319-530-0436. Or leave word at the Amana Family Practice Clinic or the Amana Church office.

Donations of food and clean, used clothing, sleeping bags, blankets and items are welcome. Donations are very needed to help buy fresh vegetables and meat.
