



DCCW LEGISLATIVE COMMISSION

The Legislative General Session ended on March 3, 2023. It was a significantly good year for Catholic schools with the passage of four bills. This includes \$42 million in scholarship funding as Utah Fits All and each scholarship is \$8000. There will be 5,312 scholarships available; therefore, 100 percent of all children are eligible to apply. HB 215 helped Utah families with private and homeschool education with "The Utah Fits All," which requires all sixteen Catholic schools help low income families. The applications will be available in March 2024.

HB499 Homeless Services Amendments improved the process for selecting winter overflow shelters and made it easier for the states to select cities, if they are unable to do it. HB 60 Juvenile Justice Modifications was an expungement process for juvenile crimes, which is like the process adults already have in place. Utah legislators did not increase the minimum wage of \$7.25, this is inconsistent with the high increase in rent and cost of homes. Union jobs usually offer higher paying jobs and better benefits as legislators should encourage union collective bargaining as per Intermountain Catholic article on 3/17/23.

HB 467 sponsored by Rep. Karianne Lisonbee, R-Clearfield, and Senator Daniel McCay, R-Riverton was signed into law banning abortion clinics. Under this new law abortions may only be performed in hospitals and no abortion clinic is allowed to operate in Utah on or after Jan. 1, 2024. HB 297 was also signed into law, sponsored by Rep. Kera Birkeland R-Morgan, and Sen. Michael McKell improved support to sexual assault victims by requiring more reporting from doctors who are performing abortions under the rape exception and limits abortion in the case of rape or incest to eighteen weeks. A few years ago, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops developed the "Walking With Moms in Need" program. There is also another program "Project Rachel" for those affected by abortion.

It is very common for many people to shy away from politics and not want to be involved due to all the polarization. However, it is important as Catholics for us to take part in the political process and talk to our elected officials to encourage them to vote in a way which is conducive to our Christian values. We are encouraged by Pope Francis to take part and work on initiating positive changes both locally as well as on national issues. As per Intermountain Catholic article on March 3,2023 Pope Francis said in a new book of interviews stating that "everyone must engage in politics, which is simply what it means to take part constructively in the life of a nation or society". Speaking about the increasing polarization in the world, the pope said, "we are not water and oil, we are brothers and sisters."

There are many issues which continue to need legislative reform and negotiable solutions as Medicaid expansion, mental health accessibility, education funding, homelessness, hunger issues worldwide as well as in our own country. There are also the complicated border issues which involve action on U.S. asylum policy. One issue which I feel most passionate about is our numbers of school shootings and senseless deaths of innocent children and adults. Many of these involve the use of assault rifles which are in the hands of everyday citizens and are at the root of many of the mass murder cases. As per a PBS News Report on June 13,2022 gun violence is the leading cause of deaths in the U.S. Recent years have seen some of the worst gun violence in US history. In 2021 guns killed more than 45,000 Americans, the highest toll in decades, an upward trend is on track to continue. As per Sim Gill, District Attorney, "This issue isn't about the 2nd amendment. It's about death, the tragic self-inflicted immolation of society". We all need to advocate for proper gun reform to help save our children and society. The right to learn, heal and worship is the impetus behind my political activism years ago.

In May (Honor Mothers Who Choose Life), sell roses (purchased from Costco or Sam's Club) after Mass on Mother's Day weekend and donate the proceeds to your local Pregnancy Resource Center. Or collect and donate new and gently used items for moms who need some help welcoming their precious baby into the world.

In June (Honoring Fathers/Welcome Home), host a spring cleaning of the closets clothing exchange! Leftover items can be donated to help women who are transitioning from incarceration to the world. Pack a picnic lunch for shut-in parishioners or sell carnations after Mass on Father's Day weekend and donate the proceeds to your local men's shelter.

At our April convention in memory of Bobby Hunt, we continued to collect our favorite items: rosaries; eyeglasses; cancelled stamps (not the Forever Flag stamps); pull tabs from soda cans; and, mini hygiene products. More information will be coming about how these donations are distributed.

At the January DCCW Board Meeting, we had 100 baby bottles for distribution to the parishes via the CCWs. The hope was that these bottles would be filled with change, cash and checks during Lent and returned to us at the convention in April. Donations go to the Preganancy Resource Center, who will have an information table and collect the donations. You can also check out their website (https://pregnancyresource.net/) to learn about more ways to get involved, like donating time or becoming a prayer warrior.

With the repeal of Roe v Wade (something we have prayed about for many years!) comes the obligation to support moms who choose to raise their child. Keep in mind that many nearby states, like California, Nevada, Arizona and New Mexico, have designated themselves as abortion "sanctuary" states, using taxpayer resources to pay for all care related to obtaining an abortion.

I am looking forward to a great year with you! Please send me your ideas and suggestions. I appreciate all that you do and aspire to do in your parishes! I am excited to hear about what's happening in your communities. As I am still learning this role, I appreciate any feedback and welcome your thoughts and suggestions for the coming year.

May God continue to bless you and your families as we enjoy the Easter Season!


