







State Human Services Secretary's Innovation Group Food Stamp Reform

States are facing an uphill battle on reforming the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), otherwise known as Food Stamps. A common sense approach is needed in Washington D.C. to allow States the ability to ensure welfare benefits are being used appropriately.

- 1) Enhanced Nutrition
- Eliminate the purchase ability for junk food, soda, and energy drinks. Align allowable SNAP purchases with Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program.
- 2) Photos on EBT Cards

Enhance program integrity by requiring photos on all EBT cards. A photo on an EBT card needs to be a condition of eligibility.

3) Waivers

Eliminating all waivers will restore the original intent of the law. Examples include: ABAWD waiver, Asset Test waiver, Categorical eligibility and simplified reporting waivers.

4) Data Transparency

Require FNS and EBT vendors to capture detailed SNAP transaction data and provide this information to States.

5) Program Integrity Reforms (Individuals)

- i. Authorized Representatives should be declared in writing when an individual applies for benefits.
- ii. Require in-person meeting prior to benefits being granted with a requirement that a valid photo ID is produced.
- iii. Restrict the amount of replacement cards an individual can request in a twelve-month period.
- iv. Require individuals to cooperate with Fraud Investigators or lose their benefits.
- v. Change federal rules to eliminate "simplified reporting" to require individuals to report changes in household or income immediately.
- vi. Increase the retention rates to allow states to retain at least 50% of the funds collected from Intentional Program Violations.
- vii. Include income for illegal alien families with SNAP eligible citizen children that are receiving benefits.

6) Program Integrity Reforms (Retailers)

- i. Increase the minimum eligible food inventory requirements of the four major food groups to be stocked for sale at convenience store category retailers.
- ii. Allow States to enforce EBT retailer trafficking violations in the SNAP
