As I enter my fourth year of serving as a pastor, I cannot say it has become easier or better.



## BACKPACK BLESSINGS



At the start of this month, we are serving 15 families. This number will grow with the beginning of the school year, and more families in need are identified. Many of the households are three generational as this is the only way they can make ends meet. This program blesses members of our community with healthy food to lessen the burden of todays' grocery prices.

And just as we are a blessing to these families, we receive blessings in return. Recently, the Churchill Main music group played a concert for "Music On The Porch Day". A free will offering of \$306 was collected to support this ministry. A big thank you to all who were involved in this event!

We only deliver to those who do not have transportation and others pick-up each week on Wednesdays in the morning and late afternoon. While we receive most of our food through TEFAP (the emergency food assistance program) operated by the United States FDA and Macomb County, we still spend an average of \$100/week to ensure these families have food to offset their weekly budget. The food we give out each week is valued at \$100 per family and consists of frozen and canned meat, milk, eggs, bread and canned/boxed goods. Fresh food such as cheese, fruits and vegetables are provided when available from TEFAP or at a reasonable cost.


