#### **VOLUNTEER SERVICES**

### **Program Descriptions**

- Lunch Buddy Program: The Lunch Buddy program is a mentoring program that matches referred students in grades Kindergarten through sixth with an adult from the community who has lunch with the student at least twice monthly. They stay on school property but have lunch in a one-on-one situation either in the classroom or other quiet area provided for them. Mentors are encouraged to develop a positive relationship, encourage school attendance, help build a strong sense of well-being, and have fun with the students. The goals of this program are to help the Lunch Buddy to build a trusting relationship with their mentor and for the mentor to express importance of school attendance and participation. Mentees are regarded as "at-risk" students, which can be defined by a number of factors. Such influences include basic demographic characteristics, family and personal background characteristics (socioeconomic status), parental involvement in the student's education, academic history of the student, student behaviors, and teacher perceptions of the student.
- The Career Mentoring program links referred students from the Junior and Senior High Schools with a mentor from a local business or organization. They meet weekly at the mentor's workplace and have the opportunity to learn hands on skills and build strong relationships with a positive adult role model. The goals of the program are to assist the student in setting vocational goals by placing them in the workplace to increase their awareness of career opportunities and to establish an understanding of work ethics, as well as build healthy, trusting relationships. Mentors help build the mentees self-image, strengthen their communication skills and help students recognize the value of continuing their education through high school and beyond. This mentoring relationship provides organizations and individuals the opportunity to impact the future employability of young adults. The goals of this program are to help the mentee to build a trusting relationship with their mentor and for the mentor to express importance of school attendance and participation.

The Marshall Leadership Team is a youth-led program that partners with an Adult Advisory Committee to learn leadership skills through a series of workshops held throughout the year. MLT conducts monthly meetings during the school year to network, learn leadership skills, and plan community service/programming for the school year. These meetings are led by the students and assisted by the adult advisors. For the 2013-2014 school year, MLT will offer five Leadership Workshops to the Marshall High School: MLT Programing Kick-Off and Club/Organization Officer Leadership Training; Freshman, Sophomore, Junior, and Senior workshops, each with different themes and speakers. Since the start of this program in 2006, the program has grown substantially with new ideas and more workshops added to benefit the students.

By working collaboratively with local businesses and organizations, MLT optimizes youth opportunities by teaching a sense of community ownership to our youth, thereby, fostering a sense of self-efficacy and self-worth in the student participants. The MLT program works to intensively develop the leadership skills of the officers and provide basic leadership programs to all high school students who choose to participate

An after-school program twice a year for both fifth and sixth grade boys and girls entitled GAP (Girls Are Powerful) and BAC (Boys Are Cool), promotes positive youth development in a variety of ways including teaching conflict resolution skills, promoting non-violent relationships, bully prevention, reducing exposure to violence in the media, promoting healthy self-esteem, and addressing a variety of issues unique to preteens, including puberty, appropriate hygiene and dressing. Each fifth and sixth grade student is given a personal invitation to the program. Sessions that include games, handson activities, videos, workbooks, guest speakers, snacks, and fun in an after school setting are held two times per year at the school.

- MAYN KIDS (Kids Interested in Discovering Science) is a new program MAYN introduced to second grade boys and girls this past March. This workshop promotes science education. State-level data from the Schools and Staffing Survey provide a measure of time on science instruction and change over time. Nationally, elementary teachers in grades 1 through 4 in self-contained classrooms spent an average of 2.3 hours per week on science instruction during the 2007–2008 school year. The instructional time for science can be compared to 11.7 hours per week on English language arts (ELA) and reading, 5.6 hours on arithmetic/math and 2.3 hours per week on social studies. While overall instructional time in elementary grades spent on four core subjects has increased over 20 years, the percentage of time devoted to science instruction has declined (Rolf K Blank, Ph.D., "What Is the Impact of Decline in Science Instructional Time in Elementary School?" Noyce Foundation, 2012). This new program had a high participation with 50 students in attendance. Goals of this program are to learn new skills, stay focused on and motivated by specific goals outlined, acquire accountability in decision making, and to make a connection with others while working in a group setting.
- Prevention Education: During Red Ribbon Week (RRW), MAYN promotes leading a Drug Free life.

  MAYN collaborates with the peer led groups in both the Junior and Senior High Schools to sponsor anti-drug and tobacco displays in the schools during Red Ribbon Week in October as well as National Smoke out Day in November. MAYN continues to be involved with local partnerships including Marshall in Motion and Prevention Coalition as well as the Illinois Family Violence Coordinating Council.
