11th Sunday Ordinary Time Year A Matthew 9:36-10:8



"At the sight of the crowds, Jesus' heart was moved with pity for them because they were troubled and abandoned, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few; so ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest." Then he summoned his twelve disciples and gave them authority over unclean spirits to drive them out and to cure every disease and every illness. The names of the twelve apostles are these: first, Simon called Peter, and his brother Andrew; James, the son of Zebedee, and his brother John; Philip and Bartholomew, Thomas and Matthew the tax collector; James, the son of Alphaeus, and Thaddeus; Simon from Cana, and Judas Iscariot who betrayed him. Jesus sent out these twelve after instructing them thus, "Do not go into pagan territory or enter a Samaritan town. Go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. As you go, make this proclamation: 'The kingdom of heaven is at hand.' Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse lepers, drive out demons. Without cost you have received; without cost you are to give."

Eucharistic Renewal Meditation

Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Anthony & St Pius Families,

11th Sunday Ordinary Time Year A

Matthew 9:36- 10:8

"First start *small*, then you can tackle it *all*!" This seems to be the theme running through our gospel today. From the mention of only few laborers (Matt 9:36) in the beginning of Jesus' mission with the actual selection of only 12 men to start with (small enough beginning to list them all by name-Matt 10:2-4) to the narrowed focus initially of only evangelizing the 'lost sheep of Israel' (Matt10:5-6), Jesus intentionally has this great soul-saving mission start out small. Keeping the 'roll-out' small is also why Jesus mentions not going into pagan territory yet. Some people take offense in Jesus' parochial attitude about avoiding pagan and Samaritan territory in the first days of mission, but I understand Jesus to be saying, "Do not go into pagan territory, <u>YET!</u>" His later universal call to evangelize 'all the world' comes later as He gives it at the end of Matthew 's gospel (Matt 28:19 "Go, therefore and make disciples of <u>all nations</u>"). So trust that everywhere is invited to follow, the call of Christ will be offered to everyone, but in proper time and in an ever broadening outward reach (not all at once in the beginning).

Jesus is such a personal shepherd to us. His motivation for mission, is given in the first line today: "At the sight of the crowds, his heart was moved with pity for them because they were troubled and abandoned, like sheep without a shepherd" (Matt 9:36). Even faced with crowds, Jesus keeps it personal. And I like how in calling apostles, he does it personally, as they are each named and listed for us by Matthew, to the point of highlighting each individual apostle such that if two of them have the same name, they will be uniquely identified by their family, occupation or hometown. I also notice that Matthew lists the Twelve in established pairs, further keeping it personal by appointing such a 'buddy system' of support. In John 10:3, we hear that Jesus the Good Shepherd, "he calls his own sheep by name."

Having such a personal and compassionately humble beginning to Jesus' ministry should not surprise us because we will hear throughout Jesus' teaching that He celebrates all the small things. For example, He teaches that "if you have faith the size of a mustard seed, you will say to this mountain, 'Move....and it will move" (Matt 17:20), that "the greatest among you is the least" (Luke 22:26), and "the kingdom of God belongs to such as these children" (Mark 10:14). So, Jesus starts out small with His simple 12 apostles and works them around the home area to establish their rooted base of ministry before taking on all the rest of the world!

Keeping things small and personal is a common idea in the ancient Greek world, too. I was struck in college by Plato's concept of the ideal democratic city-state being limited to a manageable small number. Plato settles on 5,040 as perfect size of a democratic community. (to know why he settles on that exact number takes us deep into Pythagorean numerology= 5040 is twice divisible by 12, and is product of 7! = 7x6x5x4x3x2x1 among other interesting connections). In Plato's Dialogue, <u>Laws</u> Book 6 {771}, he writes "Every city has a guiding and sacred principle given by nature, but in some the division or distribution has been more right than in others, and has been more sacred and fortunate. In our opinion, nothing can be more right than the selection of the number 5040." He considers that number as ideal to keep the participation of everyone, informed and active, among all of its citizens. Such a smaller city grouping sustains good reverence maintained toward God and familiarity toward other citizens. He figured that was how many could gather on a Greek hillside to discuss together and solve issues that the community faced. What I find so interesting from these Greek ideas of Plato about the perfect community size, is that we will later see Jesus select His twelve apostles to be sent out as missionary church planters all over the known world. Perhaps an inaugural event for their commissioning came with Jesus' feeding of the 5,000 in Matthew 14:16-21, where Jesus commanded them (the 12 apostles) to feed the crowd themselves and still had the 12 wicker full baskets after the feeding. Maybe it is a stretch (like the multiplied 2 fish + 5 loaves), but I imagine we can all take away from the Plato & Jesus parallels, the need to keep some things small (like church!) for them to work efficiently, yet still personally! (Keep in mind, too, what we read back during the Easter Season from Acts 4:4 "many of those who heard the word came to believe and the number of men grew to about five thousand.") Following Jesus' example, we also want to foster community by keeping His priority of small beginnings, focused on little things and most importantly, always keeping ministry personal.
