The Reverend's Ruminations - December 2020

As we enter the season of Advent with its anticipation of the Christmas event, old familiar feelings come over us. No matter what our age, this time of year brings twinges of anticipation. As children it was for the first snowfall, sledding, ice skating, hot chocolate, mom's holiday baking, and of course the Christmas presents that begin to appear under the tree. Come to think of it, some of the anticipation is the same as we grow older, only some of it starts to feel more like dread. When will I have to shovel that first snowfall or fire up the snowblower? Will I do some unexpected "ice skating" as I make my way to the grocery or the post office? How will I ever get all those cookies baked? And how will we afford to put any gifts under the tree this year in the midst of a pandemic? Will we even be able to have a family gathering if COVID-19 cases continue to stay at (or even set new) record numbers in the area?

It can start to feel overwhelming if we let ourselves lose too much of our childlike joy for the season, but that doesn't need to happen. Prioritize the most important of your chores, but don't forget to take time to watch those first flakes float down outside your window and just recall what a simple joy that felt like as a child. Take time to pray, thanking God that you are warm inside your home and asking that others less fortunate will find shelter against the cold. Open your Bible and read about the anticipation of Zechariah and Elizabeth, Joseph and Mary in the first chapter of Luke as it points to the familiar story of Christ's birth that we'll share during the Christmas Eve service.


Ten years ago this month, anticipation of a different kind was building to a fevered pitch. The 419th Movement Control Battalion (US Army Reserve) and I had finished ten months of work in Afghanistan, trained our replacements to carry on the mission there, and couldn't wait to get on a plane headed back to the United States. Ellen and the kids, like all the families, were counting the hours until our arrival. The anticipation for all of us was not unlike the excitement of a five-year-old lying under the family Christmas tree on December 23rd—the presents are in place, but can't yet be opened. When the day finally arrived and I surprised each of the kids in their classrooms, it felt like Christmas had come early as I held each of them in my arms. Having experienced *that* joy, I can only imagine the feelings that must have washed over Mary as she held the long-anticipated messiah in her arms that first Christmas day.

To help focus your Advent season this year, I will be distributing a weekly email *Advent and Christ-mas Family Toolkit* which is being produced by the UCC Minnesota Conference. Look for it to be included with my weekly bulletin email that prepares you to attend church services either in person or virtually through our Facebook, RightNow Media, or church web pages (or Thursday afternoons on Fairmont cable channel 12). If you would like to go a little deeper in your Advent preparations—with a scripture reading, short reflection, and prayer each day—I also have printed copies of an excellent devotional published each year by Luther Seminary in St. Paul. Stop by the office during the week or pick one up in the narthex on Sunday.

My wish for you this Christmas season is that you never lose that Advent anticipation you knew as a child. Take time during this busy month to keep Christ in your Christmas!

COUNCIL MINUTES

For 11-18-2020

First Congregational UCC

The Council met via Zoom. The meeting was called to order by Moderator, Jane Kotewa. Rev. Germain shared some thoughts on prayer and led in prayer.

Members Present: Jane Kotewa, Larry Thompson, Cory Hainy, David Adams, Dolores Gronewald, Wendy Ziemer, Catherine Johnson, Joanne Eisenbarger, Marilyn Forstrom. Ex-Officio member present were Pastor Cory and Dara Bliesmer, Ass't Treasurer.

Members Absent: Robbin Celander and David Meschke

Minutes of the October 21, 2020 meeting were approved as printed. (M/S/C Larry/Cory)

Treasurer's Report: Motion was M/S/C (Dolores/Larry) to receive the printed report. Note was made of the helpful side notes that Dave Meschke, Treasurer had made available in his absence. Being 92% through the year, we have only received 76% of pledged and non-pledged giving but it is believed we will end the year in the black, thanks in part to the PPP loan received last spring. Dara reported that we received \$1632 in the form of a Cares Act Grant to cover video/streaming equipment.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Cory's report was received as printed indicating routine duties, a Right Now Conference and Legion Honor Guard duties.

Board Reports:

Christian Ed: Wendy reported that the new curriculum is working very well. Kits will be made and delivered to the children in lieu of in person "Gingerbread House" building.

Diaconate: Cory Hainy reported on their usual activities. Abigail Roiger is spearheading an online auction fundraiser. Watch for more information.

Facilities: Larry Thompson reported that approximately \$1500 of the \$2300 cost of the snowblower has been donated so far. Additional donations can be sent to the church office. The Board has been working on repair of damaged walls in the storage room on south side of the stage.

Hospitality: Dolores Gronewald reported that the Board has received orders for 69 pies for their fundraiser.

Missions: Joanne Eisenbarger reminded us that the Council had agreed to serve the Free Community Meal on Dec. 30. We plan to serve Spaghetti, salad, garlic bread and bars. Joanne will do publicity.


Worship: Seasonal decorating will be done following worship on Nov. 22. Pulpit supply has been arranged for 11-22-2020, working on 1-24-21. Plans are moving forward for Christmas Eve service and Blue Christmas service...depending on COVID numbers.

Old Business: Catherine had sent a report from Nominating Committee. Efforts are still in progress. Following discussion reviewing our new cleaning service, motion was M/S/C (Cory/Larry) to increase Jill's pay effective Dec. 1, 2020. There was discussion regarding ongoing COVID strategy, confirmation, Bylaw changes and plans for distribution. The sale of ham loaves netted approximately \$400. The proposed budget was received from the Budget committee. Motion was M/S/C to recommend it to the congregation at the Annual Meeting.

New Business: The Annual Meeting date was set for January 31, 2021 with a snow date of 2-7-2021.

Pastor Cory closed with prayer and the meeting was adjourned.

INTERVIEW

Wanda (Rowan) Johnson - Nov 10, 2020

Wanda (Rowan) Johnson was born in her grandparent's home in Emmett County, lowa. At the time of her birth, it was usual to be "at home" with a midwife in attendance. She and her parents lived near lowa Lake but moved to Martin County before she was two years old.

Wanda attended District 28 Country School near Granada. Ruth Anthony (a well-known Granada woman) was her teacher. When she reached 7th grade, the country schools were closed to the older students and transferred to Granada High School in Granada. Wanda was graduated in 1954 as Co-Valedictorian with classmate Janice (Porter) Oberg. LaRayne Hiller was Salutatorian. (I remember these girls and how smart they were...and I was a little "in awe" of their accomplishments!)

After graduation, Wanda worked at First National Bank in Fairmont for three years. During this time she became a member of First Congregational Church UCC of Fairmont. She met Ken Jorgensen and they were married in 1957. They lived on a farm south of Fairmont and were blessed with three children: Ken Jr., Jill, and Jim. Ken Sr. had served in the Air Force, was discharged, and was farming when sadly he died in 1963.

Wanda and her children moved to Willow Street in 1963. She began work for the Law Firm in Fairmont in 1967. She married Bruce Johnson in 1969 but later divorced in 1978. She went to Mankato



She has been very active in our Church having taught Bible School and serving on a number of

boards. She served on the Search Committee that called Rev. Lyle Norris to be our minister.

Did you know that Wanda is the oldest of 13?! Oh, and, she now considers herself "retired"!

During the snowstorm outside, it was such a delight to talk to Wanda and to reminisce!

Rev. Cathy Barker

My father, a UCC minister, died of cancer at age 54, just after Thanksgiving. I was fourteen; my brother and sister were grown and had to go back to their homes. Mom and I were lonely, confused about the future, and our financial picture was very shaky. Fur ther, we faced a bleak Christmas . . . we didn't even want to think about that.

"Then came a check from the Christmas Fund. We were both deeply touched that our national Church somehow knew that we were in need and gave us this gift. It didn't solve all our troubles, but it made it possible for us to have Christmas. We felt the love behind the gift, and that was transformative.

"Throughout my mother's long life, she gave faithfully and gratefully to the Christmas Fund, and I have done the same through the churches I have served as pastor. I've often told our story, because I want people to know how important it is to reach out in this way.

"When the pandemic caused such upheaval, and an appeal came from the Pension Boards telling about the increased need for emergency funds, I sat right down and wrote a check. My husband and I are glad we could help."

The Rev. Jeanne Tyler was called to ministry in the 1960s, and along with her husband, John, spent 33 years jointly serving congregations in Wisconsin, Nebraska, and Iowa.

Born with cerebral palsy and diagnosed with moderate to severe hearing loss in the third grade, Jeanne became a fierce advocate for the church's awareness of, and response to, those with disabilities.

"There is a hidden cost of disability of which many are unaware," she explains. "The financial cost – speech therapy, hearing aids, motorized wheelchairs, specialized computers – all expensive. Without these, isolation and depression can set in."

Jeanne served with the UCC's Disabilities Ministries and in other capacities with the national church and was instrumental in the conception and funding of the Virginia Kreyer Endowed Scholarship Fund, which provides tuition and assistive technology for ministers with disabilities.

"I'm grateful for the United Church of Christ being with me on my journey, and it's essential that the church continue its commitment to clergy who have disabilities." Hearing aids have been a godsend to Jeanne, from the first ones she used while still in college. "They worked well for the time – I could hear the fire crackle for the first time and it was just thrilling."

After retirement, the high cost of newer technology hearing aids was problematic. A grant from the Christmas Fund filled the gap left by her insurance allowance, allowing Jeanne to have hearing aids that make all the difference. "As a pastor, I always asked people to support the Christmas Fund, to support those whose life work has been serving and empowering others, but I never thought I would be on the receiving end. I am humbled and grateful for this acknowledgement by my church that hearing aids are life-giving."

The Christmas Fund

For the Veterans of the Cross and the Emergency Fund



In the early months of the COVID-19 pandemic, the United Church Board for Ministerial Assistance, which administers the Christmas Fund, experienced a 400% increase in requests for emergency grants over the previous year. Thanks to the generosity of more than 275 donors to urgent appeals for gifts to the Christmas Fund, UCBMA was able to say "yes" to each of these requests.

Most of the donors who responded to these special emergency appeals were older persons and nearly half were firsttime contributors to the Christmas Fund. Many are also themselves recipients of Ministerial Assistance.

Here are just a few of the notes of thanks received from some of the Emergency Grant recipients:

"I must tell you that before I opened the envelope with the check I prayed that whatever the contents, that somehow I would make the days to come work . . . and when I opened that envelope with a great amount of trepidation, I could not believe my eyes that you and your Committee granted me even more than I had requested! I am still in shock, and still feeling so very grateful as I sit down with that fear off my shoulders."

"Wow, what can I say but a very humble thank you. This is tremendously generous, and I never, ever expected it. The best I had hoped for was to cover my recent medical bill. I am surprised and tearfully grateful."

"The emergency grant money arrived in last night's mail. THANK YOU to all who approved this emergency grant. I will be able to pay back loans that were made to make rent. We will also be able to supplement our rent money for quite some time until greater income starts coming in. We are hopeful those days will come."

"I'm speechless - Thank you all so very, very much! Keeping you all in my prayers. May the gift of your generous blessing spread wide and far."

Each year, the Pension Boards receives many notes and letters of thanks from recipients of assistance made possible by your gifts to the Christmas Fund.

These letters come from both retired and active UCC pastors or their surviving spouses. Here are excerpts from just two of the letters received by the Pension Boards letting us know what a difference your generosity has made in their lives and the lives of their families. Here are excerpts from two notes received last year:

"My/our gratitude goes beyond words! With this gift I was able to pay the outstanding propane bill and have the propane tank refilled. It was depleted to 10% of capacity, and we have been having some very cold nights this winter. My husband's illness has precluded him from doing any work for the last 6 months, and we have fallen way behind in our living expenses...

"My church, although solvent, was unable to give me a raise this year and is experiencing a shortfall in pledges. Thank you again for your faithful and compassionate gift which has enabled us to keep warm!"

"This note is a heartfelt thank you for the very generous emergency grant that the Board provided us to help offset costs associated with my kidney transplant and follow-up medical procedures and appointments. Not surprisingly, our family prayed a lot in the months leading up to my transplant in great anticipation of what was coming, and in the time since, having received the gift of a 'second chance' at life... We are grateful for modem medicine, excellent medical providers, and the support of our local and wider church families and friends, including the United Church of Christ Pension Boards...

"We never lost faith, trusting in Christ's promise that we would not - and will not - have to walk alone. Thank you for meeting us along our path and for extending your outstretched hand to help us financially."

We will take our offering for the Christmas Fund throughout the month of December.







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homemade MOOSE MUNCH

Instructions

Preheat the oven to 250 degrees F, and lightly grease a baking sheet.

Place the popcorn in a large mixing bowl, along with the nuts.

Melt the butter in a medium saucepan over low heat.

Stir in the brown sugar, corn syrup, and salt.

Increase the heat to medium and bring the mixture to a boil, stirring.

When the caramel comes to a boil, reduce the heat to medium low and allow to simmer, stirring, for 3 minutes (or until the temperature is registers about 235 degrees F on a candy thermometer).

Remove the pot from the heat and stir in the vanilla and baking soda (the mixture will foam up).

Slowly drizzle the mixture over the popcorn, while stirring/tossing the popcorn to coat it with the hot caramel. (It might be easier if you have a kitchen helper. One can pour while the other stirs.)

When the popcorn is well coated with caramel, spread it out in an even layer

on a greased baking sheet.

Bake for 1 hour.

Allow to cool completely, then drizzle with melted white chocolate and melted dark chocolate.

Let the chocolate set, then break the moose munch into chunks and package up in mason jars, paper boxes, or cello bags for gifting.

2 3-ounce bags microwave popcorn (lightly salted), popped
1 cup cashews
1 cup whole almonds
1/2 cup unsalted butter
1 cup light brown sugar, packed
1/3 cup dark corn syrup
1/2 teaspoon kosher salt
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
2 ounces white chocolate, melted
2 ounces dark chocolate, melted

HyVee and Fareway Receipt Report as of Nov 15 2020

During the last four weeks, \$24,565.98 (16.38%) worth of Hy-Vee slips were turned in. After 7 weeks, Hy-Vee is at \$41,706.78 (27.80%) toward the 13th \$150,000 goal.

During the same four weeks, \$15,819.98 (10.55%) worth of Fareway slips were received. After 113 weeks, Fareway is at \$141,970.51 (94.65%) toward our 3rd \$1,000 from Fareway Store. These four weeks a large amount was received, equal to about 13 weeks. Now, we may reach the goal in February 2021.

Thanks for bringing into the Church, or mailing them to me. Even the very small amounts help.

During this period, slips going back to October 2015 were received. Remember this program started the first of March 2011, so any slips from then until now can be used. Any Fairmont Fareway and Hy-Vee food store register slip can be used. Even slips from Hy-Vee Gas, Coffee Shop, Food Service, and Pharmacy help us toward the goal.
