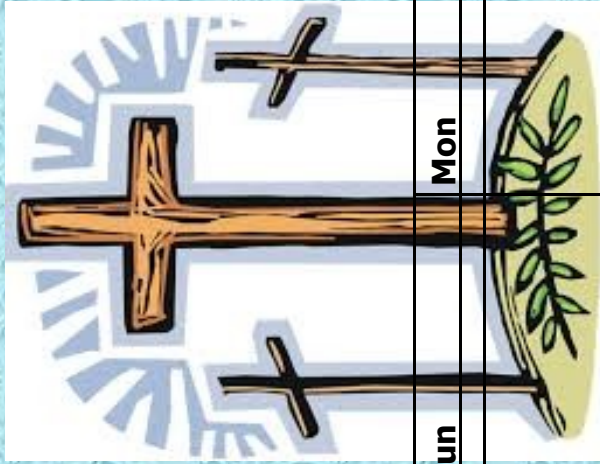

The Reverend's Ruminations - April 2021

On a recent Zoom meeting with the Fairmont Area Ministerial Association, talk turned to Holy Week and Easter plans, as well as the subject of recently-loosened COVID restrictions for churches. I'll go ahead and summarize: practices and policies do vary a fair amount in the community, but among our sister mainline Protestant congregations, mask use and social distancing are still very much observed. I have not fielded any questions or complaints regarding dropping such measures, and I think that is mostly because we have taken a fairly careful approach to in-person worship services for several months already. The average age of our membership makes this a particularly wise decision, and I thank you for being mindful of one another's health and safety. We've been able to worship together in a hybrid format for seven months while avoiding being a source of infection in our community. Keep up the good work, and get your vaccination when it's available to you!

I presume I'm not the only one, however, who has heard commentary from friends or even casual acquaintances about how "their church" or "the _____ church in _____" has been meeting "normally" for months—or even throughout the pandemic. Just yesterday I again heard, "we/they don't require masks, and have been singing and having communion the whole time." All I can do in those moments is shake my head and pray that the person relating the information is not currently carrying the virus. On the other end of the spectrum, St. Martin's Episcopal Church (just two blocks away from us) was only authorized by their diocese to resume limited in-person indoor worship beginning last week (March 21)! Amid those extremes, I feel comfortable saying that our existing protocols will remain in effect for the foreseeable future. Council and Board meetings are small enough groups that each has made choices about virtual or in-person options based on the comfort and health situation of their members, and I encourage that to continue as well.

On a different note, I recently received word that I am to attend the Air Force's Basic Chaplain Course at Maxwell Air Force Base in Montgomery, Alabama, from April 25 – May 21. *Yes, I was already a fully-qualified and experienced Army Chaplain, but this is a non-negotiable requirement of my transfer.* 😊 To limit the impact on my ministry here at First Congregational, I had hoped to be scheduled for a summer iteration of the course—although only half-heartedly, considering it's Alabama in the summer!?! But with all the pandemic restrictions that even the military has had to work under during the past year, slots were extremely limited, and this is the one I got. My absence does mean that confirmation classes will end a little earlier than planned, but Confirmation Sunday will take place immediately after I return on May 23. Worship services here will of course continue with pulpit supply and some very capable volunteers from our church family, so I pray that you'll make them welcome and even lend a hand where you can!

In the six Sundays between Easter and Pentecost (May 23), all the epistle readings prescribed by the Revised Common Lectionary are from the First Letter of John—not to be confused with the Gospel of John. The author of 1 John (as well as 2 & 3 John) is unknown, but scholars believe the writer probably belonged to the same community to which the Gospel of John was written. In the opening chapter, we hear this affirmation about the church community:

"This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light and in him there is no darkness at all. If we say that we have fellowship with him while we are walking in darkness, we lie and do not do what is true; but if we walk in the light as he himself is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin. If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us" (1John 1:5-10, NRSV).

In light of this understanding about our walk of faith and our role as members of Christ's family, I invite you to read the included reflection, "Church is Hard." May it challenge and comfort you in the weeks ahead!

As mentioned in my “Reverend’s Ruminations,” a recent post shared to a longtime friend’s Facebook page caught my eye. Maybe you’ve seen it too? It seems particularly poignant in this season of history when church as we’ve known it has been interrupted by COVID and at least partially replaced by virtual worship. Its authorship is credited to Jacob Waldron, who communicates simply yet truthfully:

Church is hard.

Church is hard for the person walking through the doors, afraid of judgement.

Church is hard for the pastor’s family, under the microscope of an entire body.

Church is hard for the prodigal soul returning home, broken and battered by the world.

Church is hard for the girl who looks like she has it all together, but doesn’t.

Church is hard for the couple who fought the entire ride to service.

Church is hard for the single mom, surrounded by couples holding hands, and seemingly perfect families.

Church is hard for the widow and widower with no invitation to lunch after service.

Church is hard for the deacon with an estranged child.

Church is hard for the person singing worship songs, overwhelmed by the weight of the lyrics.

Church is hard for the man insecure in his role as a leader.

Church is hard for the wife who longs to be led by a righteous man.

Church is hard for the nursery volunteer who desperately longs for a baby to love.

Church is hard for the single woman and single man, praying God brings them a mate.

Church is hard for the teenage girl, wearing a scarlet letter, ashamed of her mistakes.

Church is hard for the sinners.

Church is hard for me.

It’s hard because on the outside it all looks shiny and perfect; Sunday best in behavior and dress.

However, underneath those layers, you find a body of imperfect people, carnal souls, selfish motives.

But, here is the beauty of church—

Church isn’t a building, mentality, or expectation.

Church is a body.

Church is a group of sinners, saved by grace, living in fellowship as saints.

Church is a body of believers bound as brothers and sisters by an eternal love.

Church is a holy ground where sinners stand as equals before the Throne of Grace.

Church is a refuge for broken hearts and a training ground for mighty warriors.

Church is a converging of confrontation and invitation, where sin is confronted and hearts are invited to seek restoration.

Church is a lesson in faith and trust.

Church is a bearer of burdens and a giver of hope.

Church is a family. A family coming together, setting aside differences, forgetting past mistakes, rejoicing in the smallest of victories.

Church, the body, and the circle of sinners-turned-saints, is where He resides, and if we ask, He is faithful to come.

So even on the hard days at church—

The days when I am at odds with a friend; when I’ve fought with my husband because we’re late once again; when I’ve walked in bearing burdens heavier than my heart can handle, yet masking the pain with a smile on my face; when I’ve worn a scarlet letter, under the microscope; when I’ve longed for a baby to hold, or fought tears as the lyrics were sung; when I’ve walked back in, afraid and broken, after walking away; I’ll remember: **God has never failed to meet me there.**

The Council met via Zoom. The meeting was called to order by Moderator, Jane Kotewa. Reverend Germain led in prayer.

Members Present: Larry Thompson, Marilyn Forstrom, Abigail Roiger, Wendy Ziemer, Kay Campe, Catherine Johnson, Dave Adams, Jane Kotewa. **Ex-officio members:** Pastor Germain and Dara Bliesmer, Ass't Treas. **Members Absent:** Robbin and Cathy Celander.

Minutes of the February 17 meeting were approved as printed. Motion M/S/C (Abigail/Wendy)

Treasurer's Report: Catherine Johnsons reported the General Acc't has a balance end of Feb. of \$92,054.18 (\$60,484.71 in Operating Funds and \$28,808 in Capital Fund. Motion M/S/C to receive the report. (Larry/Wendy)

Pastor's Report: Pastor Cory reported on his monthly activities. He will be gone for an Air Force Chaplain Basic Course from April 25 to May 22. Confirmation will be May 23 and Family vacation May 26-29.

Board Reports:

Christian Education: Wendy reported that the Board has made plans for Confirmation and Graduation Sundays.

Hospitality: No report

Missions: Kay reported that Free Community Meals are covered except Nov and Dec. A number of memorials were given for the meals in Memory of Greg Ashland. The church will be delivering Meals on Wheels May 1st to 15th.

Facilities: Larry reported that both Laraway Roofing and Krause Konstruction have begun work on the tower roof and stone replacement projects respectively. Some rotting wood was discovered in the tower and replacement will add to the cost. KK discovered loose and missing brick behind some gutters which will mean additional replacement. Fortunately, Dean had extra brick to match. The Council would like to thank Dean Grotte on behalf of the entire congregation for his generosity in going above and beyond to help maintain our church facility in good working condition. Also for his extensive knowledge of the church building. You are a gift Dean!!!

Diaconate: Sue reported usual Diaconate work and Valentine's sent to shut-ins.

Worship: Dave reported that all is in order for all Easter services

Committee Reports:

Nominating: By General Consent, the Council agreed that Marilyn Forstrom will fill the Moderator position for the remainder of the year.

Old Business: The Council determined that though the wording in the Bylaws is a bit vague, the intent was that the make up of this committee would be the pastor, 4 members at large plus one member appointed by the pastor. Currently at large members are Abigail Roiger, Cindy Anderson and Jon Neitzel. Pastor's appointee is Lee Hanning. Abigail's term is over and Moderator will appoint David Meschke and Deb Thate to complete the members at large. Lee has one more year to serve as pastor's appointee at which time Pastor Cory will choose another. Bylaws will be reworded when next changes are proposed.

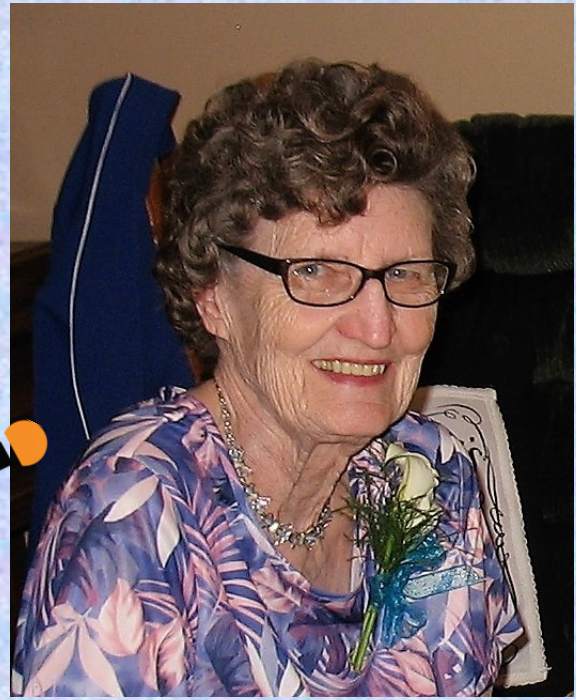
New Business: Treasurer, Catherine Johnson reported that a letter and check was received from the Warren and Mildred Brodt Trust in the amount of \$33,175 designated to capital improvements. There was discussion regarding conducting a Capital Campaign to cover capital expenses which are estimated to be approximately \$140,000. The Moderator appointed a committee of Catherine Johnson, David Meschke, Dave Adams, Larry Thompson, Robbin Celander, Eric Johnson and Pastor Cory Ex-officio to look into the best way to conduct the campaign. Motion was M/S/C (Kay/Larry) to authorize Treasurer Johnson to establish a line of credit for the purpose of paying construction bills as they may come in before the completion of a Capital Campaign.

MRCI requested use of the church for occasional training sessions. Motion was M/S/C (Ace/Wendy) to allow at Pastor's discretion.

The meeting was adjourned.

Easter Sunday is just around the corner on April 4, and **rightnow** MEDIA has several Easter shows and studies available. If you are looking for something short and impactful, here is a very accessible five-day devotional that you and your family can use to prepare for Easter. Free family and devotional guides are available to download, and each day includes a 12-minute video to watch and discuss. Here is the series synopsis of **Easter**:

Jesus died for us so that he could be alive in us today. Easter changes everything. The resurrection is the most important moment in history, but it is more than an event we remember on Easter Sunday. Join pastor J.D. Greear as he takes a deeper look at Jesus' life, death, and resurrection in the Gospel of Matthew, revealing the ways we should see ourselves in Jesus' story.

Have you noticed that you and/or your children have been spending a lot more time in front of the television or computer during the pandemic (and winter)? Yes, this is another electronic interaction, but perhaps this one can prove to be helpful as you talk about how to journey through the "real world" around you and your family. Brett Ullman guides the six-part examination, **Media.Faith.Culture – the Disconnect**, for which a book or online course are also available (but not required):

The concept and presence of media has become the modern-day parable that has forever altered how we interact with our world. What I have come to realize is a growing disconnect—both youth and parents are struggling with applying their Christian beliefs to the media that daily engages them.

When we interact with our culture, we take action and, when we think about what we are absorbing, we connect it to our self and our lives. As Christians, we need to actively be involved with our culture without blindly accepting it as true. Pascal said it wonderfully, "The greatest enemy of the spiritual life was inattention, complacency."

No more thoughtless watching.

No more thoughtless listening.

No more thoughtless online activity.

No more thoughtless anything...

Christianity is a strategic, intentional daily pursuit.
