NEW BOARD MEMBER— JASPER COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCETY



James Wilson McKinstry was born in Knoxville on March 5th 1938. During WWII he lived with his mother and grand-parents in Knoxville and Anamosa, Iowa. He has lived most of his life in Newton since his father returned from WWII.

His wife, Rosemary, passed away January 25th of 2014. To that marriage of 23 years, there were no children born. HISTORIC CEMETERY WALK - WAVELAND CEMETERY - PRAIRIE CITY

On Saturday, June 28, 2014, during Prairie City's Prairie Days celebration, the Prairie City Historical Society, in cooperation with the Jasper County Historical Society, celebrated their first Cemetery Walk. The weather was perfect, the predicted rain held off, and the people who portrayed the pioneers and the large crowd that participated, had an enjoyable and informative experience. The visitors were sent around to the various stops in groups as soon as enough were in attendance and refreshments were available for all.

The Walk started off at the Military Monument where Betty Buckingham, in period costume, gave the history of the Waveland Cemetery.

The first stop on the tour was with James Elliott, 1820-1921, the founder of Prairie City, Ia., in 1851. The city was originally named "Elliott" but was changed to Prairie City in 1864 when it was found out there was already an Elliott in Iowa. Mr. Elliott was portrayed by Dick McKleenven.

The next stop was with John Brewin, 1818-1894. He was born in England and was a farmer, honored citizen and pioneer. Mr. Brewin was portrayed by Lonnie Appleby.

The next station was with Vivian Wilson, 1893-1980. Vivian was the wife of Wilmer Wilson. She loved to ride horses, and she was a beloved teacher and China Painter. Vivian was portrayed by Rachel Peter.

The next stop was with Dr. Ella Johnson 1891-1972. She was a family doctor and the wife of Kress Johnson, Veterinarian. Together they treated all of Prairie City's residents both human and animal. Her Osteopath office was on the north side of the city square. She was also a member of the Eastern Star Lodge. Dr. Ella was portrayed by Linda Perrenoud.

Next we have Robert Thompson, 1879-1953. He was an immigrant from Ireland and a farmer. He settled in Gilman, Iowa, later moving to Prairie City. Mr. Thompson was portrayed by Graham Davis.

The next historical figure was Ashford Dowden, 1847-1901. He was an inventor, and farmer, 'The Golden Rule' was his Rule for Life. Ashford was portrayed by Alex Fraker.

The last stop on the tour was with Eliza Blee Zachary, 1819-1900. Eliza was the wife of L. E. Zachary, Banker She was the mother of seven children, and the family lived in the three story white French-Renaissance house on the south side of the old Stage Road west of Prairie City. Eliza was portrayed by Mary Ann Nevins.

We'll be featuring another cemetery next year.

JASPER COUNTY HISTORICAL MUSEUM STEAM ENGINE IS UP AND RUNNING

On Saturday June 21, volunteers met at the Historical Museum for one hour of instructions, by Brian Healy, on the operation of, and the safety procedures necessary in the operation of the steam engine. After the class room instructions, the volunteers went to the Engine House to work on the steam engine. Several hours were spent replacing seals, checking gauges, greasing and oiling appropriate places on the engine.

The next step was to fill the boiler with cold water and pressure test the whole water-steam system at 150 pounds per square inch (psi). In operation the steam engine operates at 100 psi. Any leaks were addressed and the steam engine was ready for the Sunday firing off.

On Sunday the water tanks were filled and the fire box was filled with wood and lighted.

After about 45 minutes the steam was up and the engine was driven outside. If you have never seen a steam engine running, there is lots of noise, with steam coming out of the stack and various parts on the engine. Fly wheels are spinning, pistons are flying back and forth, and a loud chuck, chuck, sound is heard. It is an awesome sight and sound

The Minneapolis Threshing Machine Company built the Steam Traction Engine, number 8651 in 1915. The steam engine is rated at 20 horse power. Its length is 22.5', width 8', and the height is 10.5'. The highway speed is approximately 3 mph. Operating weight, with 200 gals of water, is 26700 pounds, which is over 13 tons.

An extra treat was a stew which was cooked in a Dutch Oven, on the very hot engine.

The steam engine was again in the Newton 4th of July parade. The steam engine is housed in the museum's Engine House and you can see the steam engine close up at the Jasper County Historical Museum every day, May 1 Through September 30, at 1:00, with the last tour starting by 4:00.

NEW BOARD MEMBER - JASPER COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY

My name is Sterling Richards but I am better known as Skip. My wife Susan and I have been married seven years. We were both widowed, and we met online. Susan is from Canada, where her two sisters and three children and five grand children live. I have two married children. My son and wife live in Des Moines and my daughter and husband and three grand children live in Alleman, Iowa.

I am not from Iowa, I was born in Denver and lived in Rock Springs, Wyoming where I spent my growing up years. My father worked in the Union Pacific coal mines as an electrician and mechanic. In 1957 the mines were closed and we moved to Eunice, W.Va., where the mines were open. We lived in Company housing and shopped in the Company Store. My senior year in High school was in a segregated school. The black students went to a small school a few miles away. After graduation I went to college to be an engineer. After a year and half I figured out I could not spell engineer so I joined the US Navy. I am considered a Viet Nam Veteran

After four years of service, I got married and lived in Long Beach, California where we raised our two children. I received an Associated Degree in electronics, (before computers), and worked in a small company for about four years. Calif. is a nice place to visit but I did not like living there.

Meanwhile, my brother, parents and Uncle all had moved to Iowa. They were managing three Texaco Service Stations in Des Moines. In 1970 I moved my family to Bondurant and I worked in the service station business for three years. In 1973, I went to work in the US Post Office in Des Moines where I spent the next twenty seven years, retiring in 2000. During this time we moved to Altoona and then to Prairie City. My first wife passed away in 2005, after 42 years of marriage. Suzy and I lived in Prairie City for five years and then we moved to Newton in 2012.

While in Prairie City I was a member of the Prairie City Lions Club and a charter member of the Prairie City Historical Society, and a contributing writer and photographer for the Prairie City News. Most of my articles were about the Lions Club and Museum activities. After building Pine Wood Derby cars for 24 years I consider myself a 'skilled' Pine Wood Derby car builder. I started giving seminars for new cubs and their parents (about five years ago) on how to build Pine Wood Derby Cars. I started the seminars with the Cub Scout Pack in Prairie City and have added three Cub Scout Packs in Newton.

I have always enjoyed visiting museums and being on the board of the museum in Prairie City. When Mary Ann Nevins asked me if I would serve on the Jasper County Historical Society I was glad to do it.

I am a volunteer Docent and have written two articles for the newspaper, both about the museum. One article and picture is about the Steam Engine, and the other is about the Prairie City Cemetery Walk. I know there are many committees to serve on in the museum, The one I think fits my interests and talents is the Marketing/Social Media where I can write articles and take pictures about Museum activities.

Carol was not only one of 4 Indians in her high school class, she went on to graduate with honors and became an elementary school teacher after college. Carol retired in 1999 after teaching for 30 years at Berg Elementary School.


