Perhaps President Ronald Reagan's speech at Arlington National Cemetery in 1986 highlights our topic this day as well, as look at some of the opening lines:

"Today is the day we put aside to remember fallen heroes and to pray that no heroes will ever have to die for us again. It's a day of thanks for the valor of others, a day to remember the splendor of America and those of her children who rest in this cemetery and others. It's a day to be with the family and remember.

Remembering is what we are all about as the church. First, remembering the work of God over the eons of time. Remembering the person and work of His Son, Jesus, who completed the work on earth on Ascension Day. Remembering the gift of salvation as we share the Supper together, recalling the words, "On the night which He was betrayed....." Remembering to carnage of war, what it does to families, and how we miss our loved ones who cared so much to lay down their lives for the freedom we hold so dear.

Memorials are all about remembering. So it stands to reason that as a country, as a faith community, that we are only as good as is our memory. I mean to say that if we forget all that has gone ahead of us, we lose our hold on the reasons why we are in the positions we are in today. Memorial Day began in 1868 by General John Logan recalling and remembering all of men and women, North and South, who perished in the Civil War.

We praise God for His faithfulness over the centuries. We praise Jesus and give thanks for all He did with the Cross, the Tomb, and the Cloud. We give thanks to those who gave their lives for us. It will not be forgotten.

THE FIRST LESSON: Acts 1:6-14 New Living Translation (NLT)

So when the apostles were with Jesus, they kept asking him, "Lord, has the time come for you to free Israel and restore our kingdom?"

He replied, "The Father alone has the authority to set those dates and times, and they are not for you to know But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you. And you will be my witnesses, telling people about me everywhere—in Jerusalem, throughout Judea, in Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

After saying this, he was taken up into a cloud while they were watching, and they could no longer see him. As they strained to see him rising into heaven, two white-robed men suddenly stood among them. "Men of Galilee," they said, "why are you standing here staring into heaven? Jesus has been taken from you into heaven, but someday he will return from heaven in the same way you saw him go!"

Then the apostles returned to Jerusalem from the Mount of Olives, a distance of half a mile. When they arrived, they went to the upstairs room of the house where they were staying.

Here are the names of those who were present: Peter, John, James, Andrew, Philip, Thomas, Bartholomew, Matthew, James (son of Alphaeus), Simon (the zealot), and Judas (son of James). They all met together and were constantly united in prayer, along with Mary the mother of Jesus, several other women, and the brothers of Jesus.

THE SECOND LESSON: 1 Peter 4:12-14 & 5:6-11 New Living Translation (NLT)

Dear friends, don't be surprised at the fiery trials you are going through, as if something strange were happening to you. Instead, be very glad—for these trials make you partners with Christ in his suffering, so that you will have the wonderful joy of seeing his glory when it is revealed to all the world.

If you are insulted because you bear the name of Christ, you will be blessed, for the glorious Spirit of God rests upon you.

So humble yourselves under the mighty power of God, and at the right time he will lift you up in honor. Give all your worries and cares to God, for he cares about you.

Stay alert! Watch out for your great enemy, the devil. He prowls around like a roaring lion, looking for someone to devour. Stand firm against him, and be strong in your faith. Remember that your family of believers all over the world is going through the same kind of suffering you are. In his kindness God called you to share in his eternal glory by means of Christ Jesus. So after you have suffered a little while, he will restore, support, and strengthen you, and he will place you on a firm foundation. All power to him forever! Amen.
