AWESOME SPOT HEROES

Hearing your child laugh has a visceral effect, and most of us would do anything to hear it again and again. That is where the story of Awesome Spot Playground began for a young family with four children in Modesto.

Tommy and Rachel Loredo had their second son, born November 15, 2007. Young Tommy was born with physical and congenital health circumstances that would create a need for multiple surgeries and a life saturated with doctor visits and therapy. His mobility is made possible with wheelchairs or a walker. Through these challenges, Tommy has been the same, mentally and emotionally, as any child. He loves to play, laugh, and engage. As Tommy grew, his desire for independence grew with him. His intellect has never been questioned, and despite his physical challenges,

he is witty, smart, caring, and energetic. He faces limitations in public play areas that make fun and inclusion out of reach.

When Rachel Loredo heard about a park playground that was built in Palo Alto, California, that was designed to be socially inclusive and physically accessible to all children, she was compelled to write a letter of gratitude to its founders for having created a playground that children like Tommy could enjoy, where he could play and laugh. In April 2015, the Loredo family was included in the grand opening of the Magical Bridge. This was when the idea of possibilities began to take root for her and her family. It was

something completely new that opened a river of hope. Rachel's first step was to reach out to the Modesto

Parks & Recreation Department, which supported the idea of bringing an inclusive playground for children with disabilities to the Modesto area. The work then began to

garner support, raise funding, and design a playground. Landscape Architect Chad Kennedy was introduced to facilitate the design of the play space.

Chad has advocated for equal play opportunity for many years, and his support of this project has required trailblazing the group never imagined. The process has been long and has had as many victories as roadblocks, but the effort has had a core group of private and corporate supporters determined to see the fruit of this process. In 2022 there was ground broken at the playground site in Beyer Park. It has been a seven-year journey and continues to have more steps. Tommy Loredo is now 16 years old, and he and his family are still working to build this space for children whose early life experiences can be changed by something as impactful as an inclusive playground.
