SEPTEMBER PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

September already, I hope to see you at our annual Ice Cream Social September 1st. This has been a very productive year for the Hernando Beach Property Owners Association, our members are hard at work on issues that affect Hernando Beach.

Hernando Beach now has something to brag about, we now have the highest point of land on the coast of Hernando County, Mount Shoal Line! As of this writing the Dollar General store is still just a giant, 8 foot high, mound of fill dirt dumped on the vacant lots. However there has been no progress towards construction. Many residents, including myself as President of HBPOA, have complained loud and long to Hernando County and Dollar General about how ridiculous this huge mound of fill dirt is. We hope so, in addition we were assured at the November 2015 meeting with all parties that a monument sign would be used and not a pylon sign, the new plans call for a pylon sign. We will soon have to do some trimming of the bushes, they are thriving and getting too big. We also thank Jim and Carol Garrett for donating the US flag and flag pole for the park, it is a wonderful addition.

HBPOA will have 300 Hernando Beach in photos 2017 calendars on sale soon. The theme this year was Hernando Beach Life as depicted through the cameras of local residents. Our sincere thanks go out to all residents who took the time to submit their photos, they are outstanding. HBPOA meetings are held the 1st Thursday of every month except July and August. Meetings are held at the Coast Guard Station on Calienta St, doors open at 6:45pm and meetings start at 7pm.

Dues are \$25.00 annually and include the Beachcomber Newsletter mailed to you.

Annual dues become due and payable in January of every year and are NOT prorated.

Members who join in November or December are considered paid up as members for the following year.

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HBPOA Meeting 6/2/16

Meeting called to order at 7:07 PM by President Gladys Moore who led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Guest speaker Patricia McNeese of the Hernando County Planning Department was introduced by President Gladys Moore. Patricia spoke of the Noxious Tree Ordinance which entails the removal of the Brazilian Pepper Trees and White Lead Trees. This removal has been contracted by the Earth Balance company. It was started last Monday and entails removing 646 lead trees and 123 Brazilian Pepper trees so far.

3 task orders were first done last week and there are two more tasks to be completed by August 1st or sooner depending on availability. Trees are cut off above ground, stumps removed and area sprayed. Chemicals used to spray do not effect the waterways. At this time removal is only for Brazilian Pepper and White Lead and not Australian Pine.

Patricia introduced Frank McCabe and Michael Steel who are out in the field, along with Bill Lester, from the University of Florida/IFAS Extension Hernando County who are also involved in this project. Questions were asked about seedlings returning and with the Brazilian Pepper they are viable for 6 months, the White Lead for 10 years. There was a concern of some areas where

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

trees have been removed the seedlings have already returned. In such a case home owners were encouraged to contact the county. There will be a list of companies that the county has put together and will be placed on the website. Any problems with either of these companies should be reported so that they can be dealt with.

Guest speaker Diane Greenwell from the Governmental Affairs Committee was introduced by Gladys Moore. Diane's slide show began with a list of all committee members of the GAC which was formed back in January. From this main committee many subcommittees were formed. One being the Vision Committee. The Vision Committee has been instrumental in putting together not only the Hernando Beach's Mission Statement which is to promote public safety, develop recreational and business opportunities to enhance the enjoyment of Hernando Beach residents and visitors to the area. Our community seeks to work with our county government to group objectives to accomplish more than one goal at a time by using strategic planning and foresight.

The Vision Plan for Hernando Beach is mainly to increase safety by improving, enhancing and enforcing public safety to include ALS services and development, clean-up and beautification of our community. First step was the Survey sent to all of Hernando Beach. There were 18 questions relevant to the HB Vision Plan. Responses

were used for statistical analysis combining Very Important and Important, along with Neutral, Least Important and Other.

Results were shared and this information will be placed on the HBPOA website for all to see. Not only the answers to these questions were recorded by many write in comments. Those results stressed that many wanted to keep Hernando Beach unique, have it remain the same, be more interactive with the businesses, and not to have our community become a tourist trap.

A big concern was to establish water quality by having our water tested. Also to expand boat ramps and improve parking just to name a few. All of these issues will be considered and added to tasks that the GAC and subcommittees will address in the upcoming future.

President Gladys Moore also introduced David Murdock our new Fire Chief. David has been with the fire department in Hernando going on 8 years. He informed all that there were many big plans in the make for the community.

He was commended on his rescue of the injured crane on Shoal Line. He stated that the crane was taken to a Emergency Clinic on Deltona and Northcliff and when well again will be relocated back to Shoal Line area. He was asked "just how do you capture a crane?" His answer was "first of all they do go for the eyes, that is not a myth" You should have a towel or light sheet and place

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this over the bird which calms them and they can then be put into a cage and transported. All were very glad to have David here in Hernando Beach.

The May Minutes were accepted by motion by Cal Holland and seconded by Nancy.

Margo McConnell gave the Treasurer's report. It was accepted and factual and filed for audit.

Margo also spoke of the Irrigation System for Triangle Park. To finish Triangle Park the sprinkler system is needed. Cost would be about \$1700 to 1800 which includes installing and mulching. The HBPOA has allocated \$950 but there is still \$850 needed. There is a "GoFundMe" on Facebook and all were encouraged to donate whatever they could and to share the Facebook with others. Once funding is received installation would be done within a couple of weeks.

Landscaping Committee – In Kathy Watkins's place Cal Holland reported on the Triangle Park update. Benches were sealed, weeding has been done. Female inmates will help with further weeding. Cal mentioned that the irrigation system is really a necessary thing to keep things growing and beautiful. He and Gladys have trimmed the trees and all looks great. Many beautiful butterflies are around the Triangle and just add to the beauty already there.

Government Affairs Committee – Chuck Greenwell gave an update on the committee. Chuck began by complimenting not only the committee members but all community and especially those who presented at the hearing on May 24th, for their support.

Two things that were already handled is the Noxious Trees which is credited to Commissioner Wayne Dukes. The Zoning H1534 Defeat on May 24th which was declined with unanimous vote by the County Commissioners. Chuck reminded all that we need to Help Support those that Helped Support Us with the coming election and our attendance to the election.

There was meeting on May27th with the Hernando County Public Works Department which was attended. This was another effort to build support between county and residents.

Many things need to be addressed for the future. One is the Public Safety, mainly concerning traffic on Caliente and Shoal Line. With boat traffic this area is blocked many times making it impossible for those in Eagle Nest to travel back and forth. Would like to see a connection on Shoal Line directly to ramp on Caliente, giving Eagle Nest route out during use to Shoal Line. Problem is property involved is Blue Pelican. We need to bury the hatchet and persuade Blue Pelican to work with us. To be objective on doing things to build our community.

There will be a Town Hall Meeting on June 13th in regards to the ALS Engine. Encourage all to attend. Want the community to hear the facts about services we now have, what we could have, protection for our volunteers, training for our volunteers and a secure place for them to stay here, along with what the cost to all this will be.

This will be in regards to the Burm on East side of Shoal Line. In time of a surge this area would become a pond because of the Burm The Burm needs to come down. We want the County and any representatives here for this meeting.

Also looking at Boardwalks from preserve to the commercial restaurants. Easier for folks to maneuver through the commercial locations.

We cannot expand any further. As heard from Diane in her report there are 96 vacant lots in Hernando Beach. These are both commercial and residential. We want to raise our quality and standard and do a new infill expansion. We can't stop change – that is certain to happen but again we need to Help Those Who Helped Us.

CrimeWatch – David Brann told us that there were 42 patrols which were 180 hours this month. Speaking of the Marine Crime Watch only have \$600 so far for the patrol. Need more donations. There will be a Yard Sale at the Coastal Gifts parking lot on Shoal Line on June 18th 8 AM to 2 PM. Any donations call Pam at 770-310-5130. Next Crime Watch Meeting is Wednesday, June 8th at 7 PM at the VFW. All are invited.

Gladys Moore brought up John Burnett from the Hernando County Engineering Public Works. John held a meeting prior to the HBPOA Meeting that afternoon along

with the Sheriff's department regarding Hurricanes. John mentioned that the important this is preparedness. There are brochures on the table to the right. Remember to prepare now and do it early. Don't want to be preparing when you are pressured.

Know where you are going, where you are parking any extra cars, where you are putting your boats. Think about getting out early. Remember if you wait, you are trying to get out with all the others that waited. Have someone out of the area as your call center to notify them what is going on with you and your family so someone is informed at all times.

Note there is only one pet shelter and you need to provide food and water for your pet while they are there. Remember to have important documents with you when you leave – property deeds, insurance documents, phone numbers, doctor numbers, prescription information, etc.

A CAT 5 will put water over 19. If you go down by 550 there is a pole that you can look at the bands as far as storm surge population. Also Slush Maps on website that can be used as a planning tool.

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
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
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


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WHAT DOES IT CONTAIN?

The TRIM Notice contains important information on several items:

- Identifies which property is being referenced by the key number, parcel number and abbreviated parcel description.
- Provides a list of the taxing authorities which levy taxes on your property.
- Provides Non-Ad Valorem Assessments commonly known as MSBU's (Municipal Service Benefit Unit) or Special Assessments such as Fire/Rescue, Solid Waste, etc.
- Provides a comparison of last year's taxes, proposed taxes if the taxing authorities' budget is approved and proposed taxes if no budget

change is made.

- Provides a schedule of taxing authorities meeting times and places for you to voice your opinion regarding the budget process. Also individual taxing authority phone numbers.
- Provides a comparison of last year's and the current year's Market Value, Assessed Value, Exemptions and Taxable Value as determined by this office.
- Provides a deadline in which to file a formal appeal with the Value Adjustment Board if you disagree with the estimated Market Value. This deadline is established by Florida Statute based on the date of mailing of the TRIM Notice and is highlighted in blue near the bottom of the Notice.

NOTE: Although the Property Appraiser's Office is responsible for mailing this Notice, the Market, Assessed and Taxable Values are the only issues this office can address. If you have questions about the taxes you pay, or have budget questions, you must contact the appropriate taxing authority.

If you receive the Low Income Senior Exemption,

you will no longer be required to return the yellow renewal card each year. The Low Income Senior Exemption will be automatically renewed just like your Homestead Exemption. However, you will need to notify our office if you are no longer eligible for either exemption.

Frequently Asked Questions:

Why are some columns on the Notice of Proposed Taxes blank?

If some columns on your Notice of Proposed Taxes are blank, it means that you have a zero Taxable Value. Consequently, you are not liable for any Ad Valorem property taxes for that particular Taxing District.

However, please note that all Non-Ad Valorem Special Assessments are still applicable.

Where do I find what Exemptions I have?

The 2016 Assessment Reductions/ Exemptions box displays all the Exemptions you have qualified for on your property.

The Department of Revenue has mandated the or-

der in which the Exemptions must be applied to the Assessed Value. Some Exemptions such as the Additional Homestead or Low Income Senior only apply if the property is over a certain Assessed Value and must be deducted after other Exemptions.

What is the difference between the Just, Market, Assessed & Taxable Values?

Market Value is the amount your property could actually sell for on 1/1/2016. The *Assessed Value* can be different than the Market Value for those properties that are protected by "Save Our Homes" which limits the rate the Assessed Value can increase. The *Taxable Value* is the resulting value after all applicable Exemptions have been deducted.

What are Non-Ad Valorem Assessments?

These are commonly known as MSBU's (Municipal Service Benefit Unit) or Special Assessments. They include such items as Fire/ Rescue, Solid Waste, Street Lighting, Road Paving, and CDD's (Community Development District, etc.). They are based on a flat fee rather than the value of the property.

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CRIME WATCH AND MARINE CRIME WATCH

What is Crime Watch? The Hernando Beach Crime Watch and Marine Crime Watch is an independent organization, incorporated March of 1995, with the primary purpose of crime prevention, rather than enforcement. The CW patrols, on both the streets and canals, exist as a visible deterrent to potential criminal activity. Crime Watch is the only organization that regularly serves the entire community with volunteers from all three sections.

Who are the members? Crime Watch are volunteers, with valid Florida driver's licenses, who complete a Hernando County Volunteer Application and submit to a background check by the Sheriff's Office. Marine operators are also required to hold the Florida Safe Boating certification available online or through the Coast Guard Auxiliary. Members are the "eyes and ears" of the Sheriff and have no authority to investigate or involve themselves in any enforcement activities.

What do members do? Hernando Beach Volunteers watch for activities that are inconsistent with regular activities in the neighborhood or on the canals. The Marine Crime Watch is a "friendly reminder" to boaters that cooperation and respect are required for everyone to enjoy their time on the water. The crime watch vehicle and boat demonstrate that Hernando Beach residents support crime prevention in our community.

When do they do it? Crime Watch members volunteer to patrol in the patrol vehicle and/or boat at a

time convenient to their other commitments. The schedule consists of three five hour blocks between 6:00 AM and 9:00 PM. Volunteers may patrol, usually between 1 and 3 hours, any time during their assigned time block. Between 9:00 PM and 6:00 PM the patrol vehicle is available to any member who wants to patrol. Each month the number of patrols and miles covered is reported at the Crime Watch meeting. The average is 45 patrols and approximately 1000 miles.

How is it funded? Crime Watch is 100% funded through community donations. Crime Watch sponsors a monthly luncheon or breakfast with the hosting restaurant donating to the organization. Hernando Beach T-shirts and caps are often given for a \$10.00, or more, donation. Donated funds are used to provide fuel and maintain the patrol vehicle and boat. Financial statements are provided monthly at the Crime Watch meeting.

Please support your neighborhood Crime Watch. Crime Watch welcomes volunteers to help patrol Hernando Beach on our streets and canals. Volunteering requires about 1 ½ hours a week to patrol. Please join us at our monthly meetings on the second Wednesday at 7:00 PM, VFW on Shoal Line Blvd. Our website is www.hbcw.info and our email is HBCW@HBCW.info. HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS

Thursday, June 2nd, 2016 Hurricane Preparedness in One Week

On Thursday June 2nd a meeting was held at the Coast Guard building regarding Hurricane Preparedness. Kevin Ford from the Emergency Management Department of the Hernando County Sheriff's office John Barnett from the Hernando County Transportation Services Stormwaters Section presented.

It has been several years since Hernando Beach had to deal with damages from a hurricane but that does not say that we are in the clear. Both Kevin and John stressed that the important thing as a Florida resident is to be prepared. Normally we get plenty of warning to make the decision to leave or not to leave, but even with that we all need to be prepared to make that decision and not stress out in last minute preparation.

There are so many links and websites to help everyone with maps, checklists, evacuation suggestions, and much, much more. See all the links that I have attached and do yourself a favor and take a look. If you would like brochures or copies of maps you can get these through the website or by contacting the Sheriff's department non-emergency #352-754-4083.

Some suggestions are:

- Determine your risk
 - Know the risk area you are in and work with that (from the links below you can pull up a map showing you what area you are in and what the risk of that area is)
- Develop an Evacuation Plan
 - Again, make a checklist. Develop a plan as to where you will go, what you will do with any extra cars, what to do with your boat, and what about your pets?
- Secure an Insurance check up
 - Make sure your insurance paperwork is up to date. Make sure you have an agent that can help you with stating all proper areas in case a claim needs to be made
- Assemble Disaster Supplies
 - Again follow the links below and develop a checklist. Remember not only to have proper supplies for you and your family but also your pets. Also remember you may not be able to get back into your home even after all is over for several days and possibly weeks. Plan for that future too.
- Complete Your Written Hurricane Plan
 - Complete a written plan. So you have someone not in the area that can act as your call center? Someone you can keep in contact to who will know where you are at all times should you need to be notified.
 - Register on the sheriff's website www.hernandosheriff.org/em with your phone number(s) so that you can get contacted for reverse 911 (which for us is Code Red).
- Important Documents/Cash
 - Make sure you have all the documents you will need – property deeds, insurance documents, phone numbers you will need, doctors numbers, prescription information. Make sure you have a container that is waterproof to hold all of these documents. Also make sure you have cash on hand. If the electricity is out credit cards and debit cards will not work so be prepared

Remember that the roads out are not only for Hernando Beach for all other counties and will be heavily traveled once everyone is warned, so the longer you wait the more difficult it will be to get out. Think ahead and don't delay. Homes, possessions can all be replaced – Humans cannot!

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
