## ONE DAY AT A TIME

#### **STEP ONE**

"We admitted we were powerless over alcohol- that our lives had become unmanageable."

Step 1 challenges the notion that no matter what, a person has at the very end of the day their free will choice. Humanity's belief that conscious choice is at the foundation of it's existence makes up one of the more solid principles in both belief based and non belief based societies.

The challenge addicts face is the very belief that they can positively actualize their in built free choice, even when it is clear to everyone else that their addiction has taken their free choice away. It is the very loss of their free choice which makes them powerless over their actions, to the point where their lives have become unmanageable.

"Why all this insistence that every AA must hit bottom first? The answer is that few people will sincerely try to practice the AA program unless they have hit bottom," reads a passage from Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions.

The fact that the inner human conditions is one, which can delude one's self into believing that all crises are self manageable and conquerable by one's own will is the overriding principle that needs to be erased by the addict if there is any hope of taking their life back from addiction.

### **FIRST TRADITION**

"Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon A.A. unity."

The main purpose of Tradition 1 is unity.
As the Twelve Steps lay the spiritual path of recovery for individual members, the Twelve Traditions provide the principles that keep the group healthy and grounded. This is best exemplified by Tradition1, which states:

"Each member of AA is but a small part of a great whole. AA must continue to live or most of us will surely die. Hence our common welfare comes first. But individual welfare follows close afterward"

the underlying principle is simple: if the group is drawn into controversy or becomes dominated by individuals, the unity of the group will be jeopardized. This is especially true for the members who feel sidelined or minimized- these individuals are most likely to drift away or leave the program altogether, When people first try to recover from addiction, they often attempt to do so alone. While some people are successful, this approach means that people are less supported and more

likely to feel isolated in their recovery.

He may not see at once that he has barely scratched a limitless lode which will pay dividends only if he mines it for the rest of his life and insists on giving away the entire product.

Hi y'all! My name is Kenny H and I am the District 2 Treatment Chairperson. I'm also now the New Braunfels Group Treatment Chair. As the Chairperson, it is my job to form a subcommittee of volunteers to first identify potential treatment centers that might allow us to bring meetings of Alcoholics Anonymous to their clientele. After we identify these facilities, we reach out to them and coordinate times. frequency, etc for taking meetings to them. We did this at the beginning of 2022, and out of 27 potential locations, we were able to coordinate and initiate regularly scheduled meetings to seven facilities, Some take meetings weekly while at least one takes a meeting a month. Different volunteers take the meetings to the facilities. The primary purpose of the treatment committee is to carry the message to the alcoholic who still suffers. In my experience, these meetings incredibly spiritual and positive. The people in treatment are hungry for sobriety and what we have. The desperation is often palpable. I have left meetings at treatment centers with my heart full of hope and joy. The topics are usually simple and easy... gift of desperation, Step 1, hope in sobriety, etc. If anyone is interested in becoming a part of this or has any questions, feel free to contact me!
