Ben Franklin and Archbishop Carroll

Acts of kindness sometimes bear fruit that we never would have expected. That was illustrated clearly in the friendship between two "founding fathers" of the United States.

John Carroll, born in Maryland in 1735, came from a Catholic family that had several members playing an instrumental role in early American history. His older brother Daniel Carroll II (1730–1796) signed both the "Articles of Confederation and Perpetual Union" (1778) and the Constitution of the United States (1787). His cousin Charles Carroll (1737–1832) was also an important member of the Revolutionary cause and was the last surviving signer of the Declaration of Independence (1776).

John himself would go on to become the first Catholic bishop of the American hierarchy. He joined the Society of Jesus in 1753 and was ordained a priest in 1769. The following spring, Carroll returned to Maryland, where local laws discriminated against Catholics. There was no public Catholic church in Maryland, so Father Carroll began the life of a missionary in Maryland and Virginia. He built a small chapel on his mother's estate and offered Mass there on Sundays.

According to the website [Ignatian Spirituality](#), Fr. Carroll accompanied an ailing Ben Franklin back to Philadelphia, caring for him in such a kind way that later, when asked by the Vatican to recommend a priest who would become the first bishop of the United States, Franklin offered Carroll's name.

In the meantime, in the wake of the Revolutionary War, Carroll and other priests in the new United States began meeting to ensure that their mission would continue and be as effective as "In response to a petition sent by the Maryland clergy to Rome, 6 November, 1783, for permission for the missionaries here to nominate a superior who should have some of the powers of a bishop, Father Carroll, having been selected, was confirmed by the pope, 6 June, 1784. The pope made him prefect apostolic the following year, and Carroll lobbied Rome for a "method of appointing Church authorities ... that would not make it appear as if they were receiving their appointment from a foreign power." The pope granted his request "that the priests in Maryland be allowed to suggest two or three names from which the pope would chose a Bishop.

Having experienced religious discrimination personally, he also lobbied Congress on the issue of religious liberty. Fr. Carroll is responsible for the First Amendment's provision that "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof," and the Constitution's provision in Article Six, Section 3, which declares that "no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States."

Pius VI appointed Carroll bishop. He would serve as bishop and archbishop of Baltimore for 35 years, until his death in 1815.

Ben Franklin y el arzobispo Carroll

Los actos de bondad a veces dan frutos que nunca hubiéramos esperado. Eso se ilustra claramente en la amistad entre dos "padres fundadores" de los Estados Unidos.

John Carroll, nacido en Maryland en 1735, provenía de una familia católica que tenía varios miembros que desempeñaban un papel instrumental en la historia estadounidense temprana. Su hermano mayor Daniel Carroll II (1730–1796) firmó los "Artículos de la Confederación y Unión Perpetua" (1778) y la Constitución de los Estados Unidos (1787). Su primo Charles Carroll (1737-1832) también fue un miembro importante de la causa revolucionaria y fue el último firmante sobreviviente de la Declaración de Independencia (1776).

John mismo se convertiría en el primer obispo católico de la jerarquía estadounidense. Se unió a la Compañía de Jesús en 1753 y fue ordenado sacerdote en 1769. La primavera siguiente, Carroll regresó a Maryland, donde las leyes locales discriminaban a los católicos. No había una iglesia católica pública en Maryland, por lo que el padre Carroll comenzó la vida de un misionero en Maryland y Virginia. Construyó una pequeña capilla en la finca de su madre y ofreció misa allí los domingos.

Según el sitio web Espiritualidad ignaciana, el p. Carroll acompañó a un enfermo Ben Franklin de regreso a Filadelfia, cuidándolo de tal manera que más tarde, cuando el Vaticano le pidió que recomendara un sacerdote que se convertiría en el primer obispo de los Estados Unidos, Franklin le ofreció el nombre de Carroll.

Mientras tanto, a raíz de la Guerra Revolucionaria, Carroll y otros sacerdotes en los nuevos Estados Unidos comenzaron a reunirse para asegurarse de que su misión continuaría y sería tan efectiva como "En respuesta a una petición enviada por el clero de Maryland a Roma, el 6 de noviembre de 1783, el permiso para que los misioneros aquí nominaran a un superior que debería tener algunos de los poderes de un obispo, el Padre Carroll, después de haber sido seleccionado, fue confirmado por el papa, 6 de junio de 1784. El papa lo convirtió en prefecto apostólico al año siguiente, y Carroll presionó a Roma por un "método para nombrar autoridades de la Iglesia ... que no pareciera que estaban recibiendo su nombramiento de una potencia extranjera". El Papa accedió a su pedido "que se permitiera a los sacerdotes en Maryland sugerir dos o tres nombres de los cuales el Papa

Habiendo experimentado personalmente la discriminación religiosa, también presionó al Congreso sobre el tema de la libertad religiosa. El p. Carroll es responsable de la disposición de la Primera Enmienda de que "el Congreso no promulgará ninguna ley que respete el establecimiento de una religión o prohíba el libre ejercicio de la misma", y la disposición de la Constitución en el Artículo Seis, Sección 3, que declara que "nunca se realizará ninguna prueba religiosa requerido como calificación para cualquier oficina o fideicomiso público en los Estados Unidos".

Pío VI nombró obispo a Carroll. Serviría como obispo y arzobispo de Baltimore durante 35 años, hasta su muerte en 1815.

What does the Catechism say about...

What does "Decalogue" mean?

Decalogue means "ten words" (*Exodus 34:28*). These words sum up the Law given by God to the people of Israel in the context of the Covenant mediated by Moses. This Decalogue, in presenting the commandments of the love of God (the first three) and of one's neighbor (the other seven), traces for the chosen people and for every person in particular the path to a life freed from the slavery of sin.

What is the bond between the Decalogue and the Covenant?

The Decalogue must be understood in the light of the Covenant in which God revealed himself and made known his will. In observing the commandments, the people manifested their belonging to God and they answered his initiative of love with thanksgiving.

What importance does the Church give to the Decalogue?

The Church, in fidelity to Scripture and to the example of Christ, acknowledges the primordial importance and significance of the Decalogue. Christians are obliged to keep it.
