THIS DATE IN HISTORY

April 4, 1959	In an address at Gettysburg College in Pennsylvania, President Eisenhower makes a
	commitment to maintain South Vietnam as a free and independent state. He asserts that our
	own national interests demand U.S. support of South Vietnam.
April 15-18, 1964	Former VP Nixon, returning from his 24 day trip through Asia, gives a number of speeches
	in which he criticizes the Johnson administration's handling of the situation in Vietnam
	and calls for extending the war into North Vietnam and Laos.
April 25, 1964	President Johnson announces that General William Westmoreland will replace General
	Paul Hawkins at head of U>S. Military Assistance Command, Vietnam as of June 20.
April 1, 1965	U.S. Air Force begins Operation Steel Tiger to strike targets in the Laotian panhandle to
	interdict troops and supply movement down the Ho Chi Minh Trail.
April 24, 1965	President Johnson issues an executive order designating Vietnam a "combat area" and
	authorizes "hostile fire" pay, retroactive to January 1, 1964.
April 5, 1966	U.S. Navy TF116 (River Patrol Force) begins Operation Game Warden, the interdiction of
	enemy traffic in South Vietnamese inland waterways.
April 6, 1967	The 26th Regiment of the U.S. 5th Marine Division is attached to the 1st Marine Division
	for combat operations in I Corps.
April 5-Oct 12, 1967	Two brigades of the U.S. 4th Infantry Division conduct Operation Francis Marion, a
	follow-on operation to Sam Houston in the western highlands of Pleiku Province. The
	purpose of the operation is to preclude North Vietnamese infiltration through the Ia Drang
	Valley, II Corps.
April 15, 1968-Feb 2	28, 1969 U.S. Marines and soldiers from the 1st Cavalry Division conduct Operation
	Scotland II as a follow-on to Operation Pegasus in I Corps. The objective of the operation

Important VA Number

VA has a new national phone number to call if you get medical care at a non-VA facility in a urgent or emergency situation. That number is 844-724-7840. You have 72 hours to call this number once you are treated so that the VA will pay that medical bill. They will give you an assigned number for your case that starts with 9000 and includes the date. Later, if you receive a medical bill, you tell them this assigned case number so VA will pay the bill.

Vaccine Refusal Rate at 3% Among Veterans, Slightly Higher in Rural Areas

WASHINGTON—About 3% of Veterans have refused coronavirus vaccines when offered them by the Department of Veterans Affairs—an amount lower than the agency anticipated, a VA official said Thursday.

The refusal rate is slightly higher in less populated areas, equating to 4% among veterans in rural places and 5% in areas designated as highly rural. Refusal rates are lower among the populations of Black and Hispanic veterans.

"We were worried we'd see more vaccine hesitancy and disparities across different groups, and we're pleasantly surprised we're not seeing that in large part, at least so far," said Dr. Ernes Moy, executive director of the VA Office of Health Equity. "We are concerned about rural rates—that seems to be the biggest disparity that's out there that we need to address."

In his role, Moy coordinates efforts to reduce disparities in health care among veterans. In the summer, his office began holding focus groups with different demographics of veterans, asking them about their hesitancy to get a coronavirus vaccine.

Based on what they learned during the swine flu pandemic in 2009, veterans of color were more likely to be hesitant about receiving vaccines. For the VA, that was a "major concern," Moy said. During the focus groups, the VA learned Black veterans wanted to hear scientific evidence about the vaccines from their health care providers.

Black veterans also wanted the department to address the "Tuskegee experiment" - a study that has led many Black Americans to mistrust medical systems. The U.S. Public Health Service, working with the Tuskegee Institute in Alabama, recruited hundreds of rural Black men for a study of syphilis in 1932, and them withheld medical treatment from them.

"They said we couldn't just pretend Tuskegee didn't happen. We got the advice that we needed to address it," Moy said. "[With Tuskegee], they were denied the right to make a choice for themselves and not offered treatment. We see this as the exact opposite situation. We're offering a vaccination, this isn't research."

Veterans also advised the VA to make it as easy as possible to sign up for a vaccination and communicate by calling or texting. When VA patients are eligible to receive a vaccine, they get a call from a VA health care provider who schedules their appointments over the phone, Moy said

As of Thursday, the VA has fully vaccinated about 1.9 million people. About 45% of VA patients ages 75 and older had been vaccinated, as well as 42% of patients between 65 and 74, and 25% of patients ages 64 and younger.

Black and Hispanic veterans older than 75 have been vaccinated at a slightly higher rate—50% had been vaccinated as of Thursday.

"We continue to see higher rates of vaccination among Black and Hispanic veterans than among white veterans," Moy said.

The largest disparity in refusal rates is between urban and rural veterans, Moy said. However, the difference is at least in part due to the lack of availability of vaccines in rural places, he said. The VA has found some rural veterans are refusing vaccines because they don't want to make the long drive to a VA facility to receive one.

As vaccines become more widely available, the department expects refusals to drop. So far, it's difficult to compare the refusal rates among VA patients to the larger U.S. population because many other health care systems aren't tracking refusal, Moy said.
