

Sunday Reflection – Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time (A)

Jesus used ordinary images, such as salt and light, to convey extraordinary truths that transform our minds, hearts, and lives. What does salt and light have to teach us about God and the transforming power of his kingdom? Salt was a valuable commodity in the ancient world. People traded with it, like we trade with valuable goods, such as gold and stock. Salt also served a very useful purpose, especially in warmer climates before the invention of electricity and refrigeration. Salt not only gave rich flavor to food, it also preserved food from going bad and being spoiled. Jesus used the image of salt to describe the transforming effect of God's work in our lives - and how the Holy Spirit

wants to work through us to bring the power and blessing of God's kingdom to others. As salt purifies, preserves, and produces rich flavor for our daily food, we, too, as disciples of Jesus, are "salt" for the world of human society.

What did Jesus mean by the expression "if salt has lost its taste...it is no longer good for anything except to be thrown out and trodden under foot" (Matthew 5:13)? Salt in the ancient world was often put into ovens to intensify the heat. When the salt was burned off and no longer useful it was thrown out on the ground where it would easily get stepped on and swept away (Matthew 5:13). How can we lose our "saltiness?" When we allow the world, sin, and Satan to corrupt us. The Lord wants us to preserve our "saltiness" - through virtuous living and rejection of sin - not only for our own sake but also for the sake of others. Do we allow the fragrance of Christ's love, truth, and holiness to permeate every area of our life, our thoughts, words, actions, and relationships?

The Pepperoni Roll ... State Food of West Virginia



The pepperoni roll was invented by Giuseppe Argiro who came from Italy in 1920 to work in the coal mines in Clarksburg, West Virginia.

When he first traveled to America, Guiseppe left his pregnant wife, Teresa, behind. Within a few years, he had earned enough money to return to Italy and bring his wife and young son back with him to Clarksburg. Guiseppe soon left the mines and moved his growing family to Fairmont, where he started a soda pop bottling business. Then, in 1927, he opened People's Bakery - now the Country Club Bakery - where the pepperoni roll was born.

The inventive Argiro got the idea for the pepperoni roll directly from his experiences in the mines. They made an excellent meal for coal miners because they had protein and fat for energy and they did not require refrigeration, making them easy to tuck into a pack or pail and take to the mines with no other preparation needed.

Cold and Flu Season Continues

The Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston has issued the following recommendations regarding Mass participation in times of illness.

During the cold and flu season, we ask that everyone be mindful of others when attending Mass.

If you are sick and believe you are contagious, stay home. The obligation to attend Mass is not required if you are ill.

If you have cold or flu like symptoms, do not feel that you have to exchange the Sign of Peace with others. Simply wave or nod your head to your neighbors.

While it is normal in our Diocese to receive the Eucharist under both sacred species, refrain from drinking from the chalice if you feel ill. You are still receiving the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of the Lord.
