Sharing God's Bounty

Money and the Great Commission

resus' parting command was: "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." (Matthew 28:19-20). Jesus was very direct and explicit with his mandate. There is no question as to where or with whom we are to share the Gospel. The love that God gives to us is to be shared by us with all people everywhere. He has given us our marching orders, and, in his strength, we can give ourselves fully to his work.

Because God has chosen to use us as his tools to bring salvation to all people, we must use our lives



and gifts to spread the Good News. Paul wrote, "We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us" (2 Corinthians 5:20). One of the tools that God gives us to use in our mission of reaching out to others with the Gospel is our money. According to an old stewardship phrase, "Stewardship without mission is unnecessary and mission without stewardship is impossible." Stewardship and mission are inseparable. The funding of the Great Commission needs to come from believers. The money which God entrusts to us has many purposes, and the funding of mission work is of first importance. Through the giving of our money, we demonstrate our obedience to Jesus' command to reach out to all people. Paul wrote that, through our giving, we "test the sincerity of [our] love by comparing it with the earnestness of others" (2 Corinthians 8:8).

For nonbelievers and those who lack spiritual maturity, the giving of money is done begrudgingly out of a sense of obligation. By the grace of God, our attitude toward giving is a "want to" rather than a "got to" give. We view giving as a privilege and an opportunity to spread the Gospel through our money. Our giving expresses our gratitude for who God is and all that he has done for through his Son. Through faith, we hold onto our money loosely and then are privileged to experience the joy of giving as we give God our first and best. As Christians we understand that God has a claim on all that we have, so we willingly and cheerfully give our money to help all people hear of God's love. Money is an important tool for God's mission. Through our faithful giving, we are able to leverage our witnessing to all people.

Personal Financial Stewardship

Are You Saving Enough for Retirement?

From the wisdom of Solomon, God shows us the wisdom of ants that save their provisions (Proverbs 6:6). With our anemic personal savings rate in this country of approximately 1.5 percent, we may be showing less wisdom than the ants. The Bureau of Labor Statistics reports that, in twenty years, there will be a \$45 billion retirement income shortfall. Four out of five Americans do not have enough retirement savings.

One of our top financial goals should be a comfortable retirement. To live comfortably during retirement, we can project that we will need about 80-90 of our pre-retirement income. This income will come from Social Security, pensions, and private savings. For most people Social Security benefits will provide approximately one-third of their retirement needs. If you subtract your expected social security benefits from our desired annual retirement income, the result will be the annual income gap that will have to be covered by your pension income or savings.

One of the greatest obstacles to a savings program for retirement is procrastination!



We fall into the trap of telling ourselves that retirement is a long way off, so we will start saving next month. The problem is that next month never comes. Procrastination is detrimental, because it eats up the time that money can be put to work for us.

As a general rule of thumb, if we start saving for retirement in our early 20's, we can set aside close to 10 percent of our incomes and have sufficient funds for retirement. As Solomon wrote, "... he who gathers money little by little makes it grow" (Proverbs 13:11). However, if we

wait till we are in our 40's, our saving rate will have to increase to 30 percent or more.

Women ELCA August 2019

As a community of women created in the image of God, called to discipleship in Jesus Christ, and empowered by the Holy Spirit - we commit ourselves to grow in faith, affirm our gifts, support one another in our callings, engage in ministry and action, and promote healing and wholeness in the church, society, and the world.

Biennial Gathering

On June 1, 2019 our Annual Southeastern Pa Synodical Women's Organization Biennial Gathering was held at Trinity Lutheran Church, Lansdale. The theme for the day was "Water of Life" with a focus on helping the people of Flint, MI, suffering from a contaminated water condition since 2014. We raised \$1,582.54 for the churches in Flint, Michigan, and wrote notecards of encouragement to be sent to Salem Lutheran Church to be distributed to these people in need. 30 people attended representing 6 conferences and 12 churches.



Phyllis Boyer, our president began the Gathering with a welcome to all attendees. Cindy Ryan presented the devotions using the topic "I was thirsty, and you gave me something to drink"

Cindy's message included the following thoughts: She talked about "another kind of thirst. One that does not include water, one that we take for granted every day. One that some of us may not even realize exists." "Each of us is thirsty and each of us are able to provide a drink. We need to open our eyes to see where God is leading us. There are days when you may be the one looking to quench your thirst and there are days when you will be quenching someone else's thirst. Life gives us so many opportunities" "Another way to share is to let someone help. You may not think they will do it as good as you, but that does not mean they could not try. And if they do it differently, then so



be it." "Our goal is to love one another as Jesus loves us. Doing that enjoy your water today and every day and never take it for granted for there are those who do not have this blessing - it is up to us to pass it on. Remember when you sip it is a gift from God and serving it to another is your gift to Him."

Pastor Chris Glod from Trinity Lutheran Lansdale also shared a short devotion.

Our main order of business was to elect voting members to represent us at the 2020 Triennial Convention of the Women of the ELCA to be held in Phoenix, AZ in July 2020. The following ladies were elected as voting member delegates: Joyce Adams, Patricia Leberman, Cindy Ryan, and Helen Dungan. The fifth voting member delegate will be the SE PA Synod Women of the ELCA President as of June 6, 2020.

Our featured speaker, Trudy Phillips, spoke about how our water ways run and what affects them. She began with a dramatic demonstration; she had 5-gallon bottles of water; from this she measured out 1 1/4 cups - this represented fresh as opposed to salt water. She then used an eye dropper to show the amount of that water which was drinkable. She explained and demonstrated how water moves downward either above or underground, picking up debris as it travels. This eventually ends in our streams and rivers, then flows into the oceans. She demonstrated this with a blue clothe "stream" which we filled with trash; it overflowed as seen in the picture.

Helen Dungan shared information regarding the water needs in Flint, Michigan. She obtained this information from Pastor Monica Villarreal, of Salem Lutheran Church in Flint Michigan. Salem and



Shiloh Baptist Church are delivering water to 170 vulnerable homes – people with immunity impairments which make them extremely susceptible to infection. The cost of this mission runs about \$5,000 per month and is being paid for by donations. Pastor said the church leaders and members are serving people especially when death occurs - praying for them and responding to their spiritual needs, not just their physical needs.

Our third speaker was Hope Grosse who with Joanne Stanton recently formed the Buxmont Coalition for Safe Water. Both women are originally from the Warminster area and they and their families have suffered serious health issues as a result of the release of chemicals, PFAS (Per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances), into the ground from Willow Grove Naval Base. The chemical is part of firefighting foam which seeped through the ground into the water. She cautioned us that this chemical is not included in normal water tests; and strongly suggested everyone install a reverse osmosis water filter.

The Quilting Group under Augustus' Women/ELCA welcomed a special guest, Heide Boldt Diefenderfer, who attended the workshop on Wednesday July 3, 2019. Heidi displayed her hand-made cloth dolls and showed the detail work that went into each and every doll. What an awesome presentation!!! Thank you so very much, Heide. We were honored to have her attend and in addition, two ladies attended the group for the first time. We are growing!! Fun, fellowship, and refreshments were shared by all.

Most importantly, the new organization, inspired by the long legacies and faith-based histories of Silver Springs and the Village, will continue to promote hope and healing – thanks, in large part, to supporters like you.

This process will be complete once a request to merge is filed with and accepted by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. In addition, a new name and brand identity will be announced soon. Until then, we will continue to operate under our existing name and we will continue to accept contributions in the same ways we have in the past.


