WITH OR WITHOUT FAITH!

(Ezek. 2:2-5; Ps. 123: 1-4; 2Cor. 12: 7-10; Mark 6:1-6)

There is an old maxim: "Familiarity breeds contempt!" This past Wednesday was July Fourth! With honor and pride many of us celebrated the Independence Day of our beloved country. We celebrated our freedom from slavery and tyranny. We celebrated our freedom from oppression and intimidation. We celebrated a country that was founded on religious and biblical principles. This is a day when all of us as Americans are proud of our heritage and culture. We celebrate our freedom and common humanity as Americans. We are a country that is proud to pledge allegiance to the flag. "...One Nation, Under God..." We are a nation that is not shy to inscribe on our dollar bills: "In God We Trust." We are described as a nation with the largest number of Christians on earth; but the question is: Are we a Christian nation? Do we have the faith to stand up for what we believe? Is our nation still "One Nation Under God?" Or are we a nation where individual and communal religious liberty is threatened by decisions made by the Supreme Court and policies made by our government?

Familiarity can certainly breed contempt. Our attitude as a nation seems to show that we are too familiar with God; thus, we have taken Him out of our schools system. We claim to be a "Nation Under God," but the policies and decisions we make are often in conflict with His teachings and commands. God is taken out of our daily routine. He is no longer invited into our family and community gatherings. Yes, our individual and national "familiarity with God" has turned many into moral relativists - (anything goes for me!) The danger here is that when you and I have "known God so well" we begin to take Him for granted and ultimately question the "wisdom" of the Founding Fathers of this great nation, as to why God should be made to "rule our lives."

In one of his homilies, published by Our Sunday Visitor's Magazine, *The Priest*, Father Edward F. Steiner, rhetorically put these questions to you and me: "Are we so familiar with God that we no longer take into account what He says to us through the Scriptures? Are we so familiar with the Church that we resent its efforts to guide us in our faith and values? Do we prefer that God stay locked in our (parish) churches and tabernacles and just leave us alone? Have we reduced the notion of "the Church" to simply the place where we worship, (and) no longer accepting "the Church" as a teacher of God's way? ...Do we find ways to make the voice of Christ seem irrelevant to our lives? Do we just want Jesus to make us feel good but no longer want His message (especially those that conflict with our modern day values)?"

The people of Jesus' native town were "too familiar" with Him, thus, they refused to take Him seriously. And for that reason Jesus "...was not able to perform any mighty deed there." Indeed, "He was amazed at their lack of faith." This shows that our lack of faith may adversely affect the love God has for you and me. Our lack of faith demonstrated by our moral relativism can surely deprive us of God's bounteous blessings.

Therefore, like Prophet Ezekiel and Saint Paul, even in the midst of suffering and other challenges, you and I have to welcome the spirit of God and be faithful messengers of God who are sent to the "...(Americans), rebels who have rebelled against Me; they...have revolted against Me to this very day. (And have taken Me away from all the State's Institutions). You and I must sacrifice our time, talents and treasure to help put God back in our nation.
