March 24, 2019 Third Sunday of Lent Lk 13:1-9

Dear St Pius X and St Anthony Church,

'When disaster strikes', does it mean those people affected are guiltier of sin than the rest of us? Jesus answers emphatically, "By no means!" His examples include two types of disasters. The first one is obviously manmade about a mass-murder conducted by Pilate when he slaughtered some devout Galileans at a religious festival. The second example is more like a natural occurrence when a tower building collapsed due to shifting ground or maybe even by an earthquake. A spontaneous question after such horrible events is "Did the people do it to themselves by sinning and bringing it on?" Jesus is clear on this: "No!" In both verses 3 and 5 Jesus repeats, "By no means!" Do not jump to blaming the victims of natural disasters. Jesus is saying, that the victims "could just as easily have been you under that tower rubble or slaughtered by the tyrant Pilate". Unfortunately, sometimes even ministers who should know better theologically, grandstand after a natural disaster and grab a microphone to broadcast their own condemnations that the fires devastating California are due to the sinful movies of Hollywood, or the hurricanes in New Orleans are due to the nightlife lust and street licentiousness of the bars and strips, with their shows and escapades. Are the selfish (sell-flesh) actions of exploitative movies and street trafficking of human bodies sinful? Yes, but some sins are obviously more public and visible than other sins. Jesus is saying that such broad and punishing condemnations of groups or cities unjustly scoops up a lot of innocent bystanders and condemns them too. So, Jesus advises us to avoid jumping to the conclusion that every event that causes human suffering or death is the justified result of that person's sin. Sometimes, 'things just happen'. Jesus is bringing up the issue of "Why bad things happen to good people?" I imagine everyone has asked this question. We have all probably prayed about it and sought our own solution or answer to the 'why' of human suffering. The first quick (& often wrong) answer is what we see in today's gospel: blaming the victim. We ask, "What did I or you do to bring this on?" This tendency is testified to even back in the Book of Job as his supposed friends come to him, accusing him of causing his own suffering. For example, Bildad says to Job, "you or your house have sinned against God, so have recourse now with God and reverse this tragedy....." (refer to Job 8:4-6 & also Job 18:4-21). Of course, Job's response is honest and filled with faith. He responds with something like, "I know God, I trust God. I don't know why all this bad is happening. But, I thought I knew you as a friend, yet you are not acting very friendly toward me, putting me into worse depression over my calamities by blaming me." Read Job's actual words in Job 19:2-3 where he responds to his harsh accusative 'friends' saying, "How long will you afflict my spirit, grind me down your words? These ten times you have humiliated me." Job keeps strong faith and states his trust a few verses later saying, "As for me, I know that my vindicator lives, and that he will at last stand forth upon the dust.....and from my flesh I will see God" (Job 19-25-26) What I love most about Job is his honesty and straight forwardness in speaking with God. He absolutely reveres God. Yet because Job is in deep relationship to God, he also trusts the Lord to patiently hear him out. Job loves God and knows God loves him. Job does strain under the pressures of daily suffering and trials. But Job knows God is with him through it. Here is a great statement of his deep relationship to God. In Job 13:15, he says, "Though God slay me, I will hope in Him. I will still defend my ways to His face." That is heavy- duty trust. Another Old Testament figure, Jeremiah, is so much like Job (also a man of sorrows deeply in relationship God). Jeremiah says in 12:1, "You would be in the right, O LORD, if I should dispute with you; even so. I must lay out the case against you. Why does the way of the wicked prosper (while the way of the good suffers)?" And of course, this brings us forward to our friend in God, Jesus Himself, who in perfect communion with the Father, can lay out the 'why suffering' question in prayer in Gethsemane's garden. He prays, "Father, if you are willing, take this cup (of suffering) away from me; but, not my will but yours be done" (Luke 22:42). And Jesus sets the example of honest *prayer* when he prays Psalm 22 on the cross. This 22nd psalm that first questions suffering, yet ultimately accepts its place in human living, begins with the words, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me" but ends with verses 24 that says, "You who fear the LORD, give praise!" and verse 31 that says, "And I will live for the LORD". Suffering happens in the world, but for the person of faith, the challenge is how to rise above it. Faith is not being dragged into condemnations, but keeps to the good and returns good for bad. Stars shine even brighter in the dark!
