QUILTS for the COMMUNITY 2018 REPORT

The First Friday, Lighthouse and Rainbow Quilters donated a total of 222 quilts in 2018!

- 3 Women's Resource Center
- 16 NICU, All Saints, Racine
- 5 St. Monica's Home, Racine
- 22 Lakeshore Manor at Sienna Center
- 13 Children's Hospital, Milwaukee
- 70 Operation Snuggles includes 61* to Camp Serenity in Tomahawk WI
- Wounded Warrior Quilts includes 14 to Union Grove Veteran's Hospital
- 39 Racine Foster Children
- 8 Other

222 TOTAL GIVEN out in 2018

Southport Quilters from Kenosha gave us 20 quilts to go to Camp Serenity which brought the total to 81. They ask for 80 each year and we will again try to get close to this number.

We have quilts left to give in 2019 to Wounded Warriors in Racine & Milwaukee, Camp Serenity, Children's Hospital and wherever needed.

The estimated total of 222 quilts is over \$77,000!!! This total includes fabric used and time served! Pretty amazing!!

The needs for 2019 are Racine Foster Kids Program, Camp Serenity, Wounded Warriors and local veterans' needs so keep making quilts in sizes 36 x 36 to 60 x 70!

Helpful Hint for Binding your Show Quilt Entries		
	Formula for	
	Continuous Bias	
	From Yardage:	
	Length of Bias X Width of Bais = of square inches needed / width of fabric = amount of fabric in inches / 36 = fabric in yards. Ex: X	
	From a fabric square:	
	Length X Width of Bias = of square inches needed / by square root. Ex: = / _ = (length) (width) (sq root) (fabric in inches) * round up to 1"	
i	How much bias will fabric yield:	
	Length (less 1/2" seam allowance) X Width (less 1/2" seam allowance) / by width of bias = number of inches in bias. Ex:


