Maundy Thursday is observed during Holy Week on the Thursday before Easter. Also referred to as "Holy Thursday" or "Great Thursday" in some Christian denominations, Maundy Thursday commemorates the Last Supper when Jesus washed his disciples' feet and shared the Passover meal with his disciples on the night before he was crucified. In contrast to joyful Easter celebrations when Christians worship their resurrected Savior, Maundy Thursday services are typically more solemn occasions, marked by the shadow of Jesus' betrayal.

PASSOVER: Today the Feasts of Passover, Unleavened Bread, and Firstfruits have all been incorporated into the celebration of Passover. Passover is celebrated for 8 days. In addition, the time of eating the bread became a time of spiritual preparation. Sometimes, leaven represents sin in the Bible. This feast also symbolizes a time of renewal and cleansing. PASSOVER celebrates God's liberating care for those who believe in Him. UNLEAVENED BREAD reminds us of the hurried escape from Egypt. FIRSTFRUITS reminds us to dedicate the first portions of the spring harvest to God as a sign of thanksgiving and commitment, for we are to live in recognition of God as our source.


Unleavened Bread and Jesus

Because *matzah* is made without leaven, it can be a picture of Jesus. Since leaven often represents sin in the Scriptures, *matzah* may represent a pure life, a life without sin. Jesus is the only human without sin. In addition, Jesus said that the "bread of God is he who comes down from heaven and gives life to the world" (John 6:23). Jesus also declared, "I am the bread of life. He who comes to me will never go hungry." (John 6:35).

The symbolic links between Jesus and *matzah* can be extended to some characteristics of the bread. Today when *matzah* is made it is pierced—so the dough will not rise with the heat—and striped with marks made by the cookware. (In the past, *Matzah* looked like pita bread.) Many Jewish Christians understand the piercing and the stripes to symbolize the piercing of Jesus on the cross (John 19:34) and his flogging by the Roman soldiers (John 19:1).

Firstfruits and Jesus

After the destruction of the Temple in AD 70, Jewish people rarely celebrated Firstfruits. But it has great significance for followers of Jesus as the day of his resurrection—Easter. Jesus rose on the third day of Passover season, the day of Firstfruits (Luke 24:46-47). Jesus' resurrection gave new meaning to this agricultural holiday. Jesus' resurrection is the promise of the future resurrection of believers (1 Corinthians 15:20-23).



The Power & the Meaning of the Prayer that Jesus Taught His Disciples (#5)

And lead us not into temptation, but deliver from the evil one"

Matthew 6:13

Perhaps better referenced as "The Disciples' Prayer" ... The prayer that Jesus gave to the disciples.

Consider the Lord's Prayer as it is shared with us in Matthew 6:9-13

Two Primary Parts:

- 1. Overarching prayer adoration & affirmation of God
 - a. Hallowed be thy name
 - b. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done
- 2. And then payers for us --- for humanity;

Dear God ... PLEASE

- a. Give us this day our daily bread
- **b. AND** forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us
- c. AND lead us --- not into temptation, but deliver us from evil

Summary: When I consider "Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil" ...

I actually see two prayers ...

- #1 -- Dear God, please LEAD US
- #2 --- Dear God, please DELIVER US ...

MY PARAPHRASE OF THIS PETITION:

DEAR GOD, LEAD US ... We affirm Your Lordship and leadership --- we want to be a follower and we want to be faithful.

LEAD US not into testing, trials or temptations that may derail our obedience to You ... our growth, preparation, and development so that we might be ready for Your calling and Your deployment for responsible service to You and the Kingdom.

DELIVER US from our own indulgent and self-satisfying gratifications ... or by the enticements of the world and of the evil one that seeks to destroy and harm ... to lead contrary to "the King of God" ...

DEAR GOD ... May we make decisions to follow You, obey You, and honor You ... in our lives and service to You and the world ... may we be sanctified and proved mature in our faith life before You and the world. ... for Yours is the Kingdom, the Glory, and the Power forever. Amen.

Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven.


Give us this day our daily bread.

Last Days of Jesus in Jerusalem



Trace Jesus' movements through Jerusalem by writing the numbers next to the appropriate locations.

- 14. At the tomb after He arose (Mark 16:19; John 20:14)
- 15. Mt. of Olives where He ascended into heaven (Acts 1.9-12)

The Impact of Holy Week on Me:

Recalling the life and experience of Jesus during Holy Week gives me a sense of a rock solid foundation of my faith. My faith is not wishful thinking it is founded on the facts of history revealed in God's Word.

I can better understand the disciples – their perplexity of seeing their master and teacher led away and crucified. Their fears, courage, and boldness displayed when they experience their resurrected Lord.

I am convicted that as a disciple of Jesus that I need to be "MORE" for Jesus.

I realize how badly that the religious establishment was at failing to genuinely help Israel to experience communion with God.

I am drawn to a more intimate appreciation of the life, work, and victory of Jesus over sin and death on my account. I am challenged to accept and embrace God's love for me.

How have you been challenged and encouraged in your pilgrimage through the people and events of Holy Week?

Prayer for Palm Sunday (Matt 21:1-11; Psa 118:1-2; Psa 118: 19-29)

Lord God, I give You thanks, for You are good, and Your mercy endless. Here I stand, at the start of Holy Week, this week, in which your church remembers Jesus' passion and death.

I am distracted by many things. Turn my eyes now to the One who comes in Your name. The One who opens the gates of righteousness. The One who answers when we call.

I bless You, Lord, for shining Your light upon me and for sending Your Son to us, in human frailty to walk the road we walk. Open my eyes that I may see Him coming.

And may I praise Him with a pure heart. And may I walk in the way of His suffering. And may I also share in His resurrection. Through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God for ever and ever. Amen.
