Update on Amana Church Restore Revive Renew Project Seeking Contractors Now

The Amana Church's Restore Revive Renew project to repair the Amana Church and move the Amana Colonies Food Pantry to the Kinderschule in Middle Amana, has raised over 84 percent of its fund drive goal

As of December 31, \$398,769 was raised or pledged to the fund drive, according to Elly Hoehnle, Amana Church Administrator. That's about 84 percent of the \$472,000 goal.

Right now the church is seeking bids from contractors. Contractors may bid on all or portions of the project. Contractors with relevant experience are asked to contact Tony Berger or Elly Hoehnle at 319-622-6155, the Amana Church office.

The Amana Church has been fortunate to receive two important grants: a grant from the National Fund for Sacred Places, a program of Partners for Sacred Places in collaboration with the National Trust for Historic Preservation. This grant for \$70,000 kick started the fund drive. The church also received a grant from the NE Iowa Community Foundation for the Amana Church Food Pantry, Hoehnle added.

A very generous donation from the Amana Society, Inc. greatly boosted the effort; while Whirlpool Inc., contributed generously to the food pantry fund drive, fund drive co-chairs Jon Childers and Emilie Hoppe have reported. Additionally several local businesses and many local residents have made donations.

"The support from church members and from the entire community has been overwhelming. . . . The fund drive committee and board of trustees are very grateful. We've also received kind donations from friends and relatives living all over the United States and Canada. I think that demonstrates that people feel a connection to Amana, to the church and want to support their community," said Hoppe.

The Amana Church building, a National Historic Landmark, is the largest site for Amana congregational worship and houses the Amana Sunday School. It offers space for community events and family gatherings, funeral luncheons and more. Each year everything from VBS to Maipole dance practice to Boy Scout meetings to Thanksgiving dinners and the cookie walk happen at the church which is the largest, historical meeting house in the Colonies. It is one of the largest, if not the largest meeting house built by a religious communal group in the United States, surpassing even those constructed by the Shakers.

The second part of this project - moving the Amana Colonies Food Pantry from the basement of the Middle Amana Church to the Kinderschule beside the church -addresses what the Amana community is trying to do - serve people.

Moving the Amana Colonies Food Pantry is an important step for the free food delivery program that has almost tripled in size since it opened in 2017. Working with HACAP and receiving donations from local businesses and from individuals, the Amana Colonies Food Pantry gives boxes of food away twice monthly and on an emergency basis.

"Volunteers hand out 800 to 1,200 pounds of food twice a month (that's 40 boxes at 20 to 30 pounds each) from our Middle Amana basement - a blessing for the 35 to 40 families and individuals in need who use the Amana Church Food Pantry - but that means volunteers make hundreds of trips up and down a flight of stairs carrying food. What more could we do if we had the space in our food pantry to do it?" Hoppe explained.

"The food pantry volunteers looked at the space available and asked 'why not use a build
