PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Friends.

Remember that trash pick-up is once a week all year long. Please inform your friends who may only visit their properties in the warm months and who may not be aware of this cost savings change. While we have publicized it, there are always a few folks who may not know and set out their trash on the wrong day. Also, do not leave bags of garbage on the street, as wildlife may tear open and scatter your trash causing an unsightly mess. The contractor is not required to pick up or empty anything other than the closed lid waste containers provided to you. You run a risk they will not be picked up when you place materials outside your trash cans. Large items are properly disposed of at the county dump.

We have ordered a large quantity of new sand to refurbish our beaches and prepare for summer. In the coming weeks, you may see our crews working on spreading, combing and preparing our beautiful beaches for recreational use. Please do not leave any trash on our beaches when you visit, and I encourage you to step up and throw away junk others may have left. As I tell my grandson, "I know you didn't do it, but let's pick it up."

The Board received an educational presentation by member Dennis Harbin on the importance of protecting and servicing septic systems, which affects every homeowner. This often neglected item is crucial to allowing your plumbing lines to dispose of waste from your toilets and sink. Only human waste is broken down by the good bacteria in the septic tank and anything else eventually builds up or clogs your system, which must be pumped out when full. Mr. Harbin recommends pumping when the level reaches 1/3 capacity. We also learned about the "distribution box" that must be aligned perfectly with your drain trenches to allow proper flow of the water along the trenches for eventual seeping into the ground. If the distribution box is pushed out of alignment by

soil compacting (driving over your drain field), paving, or other cause, then the water never properly drains through the trenches and your tank may overflow or fill up rapidly.

What happens if you fail to protect your septic system? The state could come after you for violations, as Virginia requires properly operating septic systems. If you have an alternative system because your lot is too small or your drain field is compromised or for other reasons, then the state requires an inspection every year—it's that important. Nobody wants a health and safety issue in their front yard. Your leaky or overflowing raw sewage may contaminate the soil in your yard and your neighbors yard, requiring expensive digging and a possible lawsuit. You will not be able to live in your house because you will not have a working toilet, kitchen sink or laundry pipe to discharge to. Your property value may decrease, along with your neighbor's. For this reason, BRS requires, that at a minimum, you have your system inspected (and pumped if needed) every five years. In our briefing, Mr. Harbin recommended an inspection every three years. Bottom line is that your septic system is critical to maintaining the habitability of your house and your property value.

We learned that the quality of septic system inspections varied greatly among vendors, and some who pump do not inspect because they did not want the liability of getting the inspection wrong. To learn more about protecting your septic system, and see a drawing in this edition of the Shore Line that Mr. Harbin created.

Many folks worked on bringing the importance of properly operating septic systems to the attention of the Board, including Director Donna Frago and past directors Teresa Walker and Jane Sleight. We thank Dennis Harbin for providing us the technical background and educating us on what to do and not do, to protect our septic systems.

We have a wealth of knowledge and talent in our community, and it is wonderful that our members are willing to share their technical expertise for the benefit of us all.

Boat Policy Revisions (First Reading)

SECTION III Policies, Rules and Regulations

- D. Boats:
- 5. Registration:
- (h) The Board of Directors of Blue Ridge Shores requires completion of the Virginia Boating Safety Education Requirement for operation of a boat on Lake Louisa. This requirement will phase in the same manner as the statewide requirement for operation on public waters.

Virginia is requiring that in order to operate a boat on public waters you must have passed a boating safety course or its equivalent examination. While Lake Louisa is exempt from this requirement because it is a private lake, members who own a boat will be required to show proof of compliance to receive their boating registration.

(H)In the interest of safety, the Board of Directors of Blue Ridge Shores requires completion of the Virginia Boating Safety Education Requirements or the equivalent for operation of a boat with ten (10) horsepower or greater on Lake Louisa. The member is required to submit proof of compliance for their file in order to receive their annual boat registration. A member who does not or cannot operate their boat may register the boat if they present proof for their file that a family member has met the Boater Safety Education Requirements, and specify that the family member will operate the boat. All members are required to carry proof of completion of the course while on the lake operating a boat as prescribed in this section. The Association will comply with sections of the State Code on this issue.

The current requirements are:

- 1. Motorboat operators 20 years of age or younger shall meet the requirements by July 1, 2011.
- 2. Motorboat operators 30 years of age or younger shall meet the requirements by July 1, 2012.
- 3. Motorboat operators 40 years of of age or younger shall meet the requirements by July 1, 2013.
- 4. Motorboat operators 45 years of age or younger shall meet the requirements by July 1, 2014.
- 5. Motorboat operators 50 years of age or younger shall meet the requirements by July 1, 2015.
- 6. All motorboat operators, regardless of age, shall meet the requirements by July 1, 2016.





Virginia Boating Safety Class

Section II, Policies, Rules, and Registration; D. Boats requires that all Motorboat Operators complete this class or an equivalent and present proof of Compliance to receive their boating

registration this year, (2017). This policy has been phased in since 2011 and effective July 1, 2016 all operators of motor boats regardless of age, shall meet the requirements. If you have completed this class in another State and have that certificate of completion, it will meet the BRS requirements. An



operator under direct supervision of an individual who has met this requirement is not required to take this class.

The Office cannot issue 2017 registration/decals unless the above requirements are met and a copy of completion is submitted for your file.

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SCHOOL BUS STOP PROBLEMS



The Office continues to receive complaints regarding the school bus stop on South Lakeshore Drive. A few parents are continuing to park on South Lakeshore Drive and Beach Road which is not

permitted and crowding the bus as it enters and departs the area. Parents are parking within the entry and exit areas of the bus stop creating additional safety concerns. A few parents are driving out of the area while the flashing lights are activated and the children are walking to their parents. This is a violation of State Law. This occurs almost every day involving the Elementary School Bus. The Sheriff's Department is working in conjunction with the Association to resolve this problem. WE appreciate the parents that are helping us resolve these problems as well. Safety of the children is the single priority so please help!

Compliance Committee Report

Septic System Inspection

All members are required to have standard septic systems inspected every five years by a certified septic company. Alternative pumping systems must be inspected and or pumped every year. Please submit your certification to the office. This is not only a BRS requirement but a requirement from the Commonwealth of Virginia enforced by all county health departments. The BRS office notifies each member at the beginning of the year when your system is due for inspection. You have until December 31 to comply. Members that do not comply may be fined \$10 per day for 90 days. Our Committee recently took this action on three members and this information may be posted in the Shore Line by name and Street Address. There are no exceptions. This rule is to ensure the health of our lake and the health of our water supply. Thank you for keeping Blue Ridge Shores a healthy community for all.

POSTED SPEED LIMITS

The Association Office receives complaints routinely for people driving throughout the Community and exceeding the posted speed limits. The Louisa County Sheriff's Department has been most helpful in their attempts to resolve this problem. They have jurisdiction to write summons for speeding or reckless driving on Association Roads and the results go into Louisa County General District Court and if found guilty those results will be posted with DMV and appear on your Virginia Driver's License Records.

The Sheriff's Department has assured us of enhanced efforts to resolve these problems and will be placing Deputies in the areas of complaint. Please be considerate of yourself and others as it relates to the potential consequences of traveling too fast within the Community.

Leak Detection Tips

The following are measures you as the homeowner/non-member occupant can undertake in determining whether you have a leak:

- Read the water meter, noting the position of the clock-style hand that records the gallons
- Wait at least 15 minutes without using water.
- Look at the meter again to see if the hand moved. If it did not, there are probably no leaks.
- If the meter hand moved, check all of your faucets for visible leaks.
- Check the toilets for leaks by adding food coloring to the water in the tank. Do not flush. Wait 15 minutes to see if the colored water appears in the toilet bowl. If it does, there is a leak. Repairing toilet leaks is normally inexpensive and easy to do. Replacement part kits are available at most hardware stores.
- If there appear to be no leaks inside your home, then check for underground leaks. Turn off your main valve inside, then open a faucet to verify that the valve is working---the water flow should stop completely. Go back outside to the meter to see if it continues to run with the main valve off. If it does, there is a leak somewhere in your plumbing between the meter and the valve.
- After making repairs, repeat the meter reading procedure to verify that there are no more leaks.

Ridge Utilities, Inc. Cut-Off Valve Policy

The cut-off valves installed in the meter boxes are the property of Ridge Utilities, Inc. Homeowners may use the cut-off valve to assist in limiting the flow of water through the owner's service line and interior home plumbing during times of absence or when repairs are being made. Ridge Utilities, Inc., does not guarantee that:

- A. The cut-off valve will prevent water flow into the owner's service line and/or the interior home plumbing system.
- B. The cut-off valve will turn off and on with sufficient ease to allow use by the homeowner.

Let's Be Proactive and Stop The Spread Of Hydrilla

About 25 years ago, Lake Louisa was invaded by an aquatic grass called Hydrilla. This is a plant originally imported into the U.S. to be used in aquariums and sometimes called "water kudzu" because it grows so fast. Hydrilla became so thick in the lake that many of the coves were unsuitable for swimming or wading and it even became difficult to operate boats in these areas because the hydrilla fouled the propellers so badly. By introducing a type of grass carp that feeds on hydrilla and other underwater vegetation (not the common carp found in most rivers, lakes and ponds) hydrilla has been eliminated from the lake.

While we have not seen any evidence that hydrilla is making a comeback in Lake Louisa, it is definitely making a comeback in Lake Anna and other rivers and lakes in Virginia. We do not want to have a recurrence in our lake. Hydrilla is easily spread by introducing even very small pieces into the water.

Therefore, we are asking that if you use your boat in other lakes or rivers please do the following before putting your boat in our lake.

- 1. Carefully check the boat, motor, propeller, and trailer:
- 2. Remove all plant material;
- 3. Thoroughly rinse off the boat and trailer before launching in Lake Louisa; and
- 4. Do not allow the runoff from this to enter the lake

More information can be found by doing a simple internet search on "hydrilla in Virginia waters". Your cooperation will help protect the health of our lake.

Thomas Jefferson Soil & Water Conservation District's Septic System Assistance Program

The Thomas Jefferson Soil & Water Conservation District is currently offering a cost-share assistance



program for septic pump-outs or replacement of failing systems to the residents of Louisa County. All residents are eligible to receive up to \$150.00 towards the cost of a septic system pump out. Reimbursement rates for repairs or full replacement of septic systems range from 50-75% and are based on financial need. The TJSWCD along

with the Department of Environmental Quality has developed this cost-sharing program in order to address residential pollutants and to increase septic system awareness.

From The Landscape Committee

There are many gardening chores that can be done now to make your growing season easier. So take advantage of the occasional warm days as winter winds down.

Apply pre-emergent herbicides:

Early spring is a great time to get the first application of pre-emergent herbicide down on their landscape and flower beds. Applying a preemergent herbicide can prevent early weed seed from germinating,



which saves you from fighting with weeds all season. You may have to reapply the product mid-season for the next series of summer weeds, but the early application will definitely make life easier.

Clear out all fall debris:

It is also a great time to get out and clear away last season's debris that got overlooked in the fall, or those late dropping leaves that didn't fall until after Thanksgiving and then you just didn't feel like raking. Clearing them away now and cleaning up will give your landscaping a fresh, clean look on the warmer spring days to come. Leaving the debris and leaves invites insects and diseases that will cause problems all season. This is especially true when we have warm winter, such as this one.

Consider insecticide treatments:


This is also a good time to look at preventive insecticide treatments for things such as bag worm and lace bug. Many insect problems from last year will appear again this season if they are not addressed.

Much trimming of ornamental trees can also be done before they come out of dormancy. Sometimes it's much easier to see the branching structure of an ornamental tree during the winter and early spring months. This makes it much easier to correctively prune or prune to enhance the natural shape of the plant.

Always use chemicals as directed! Follow all labeling instructions and directions on any chemical used. This is especially important with all of the new information developing about the negative effects of insecticides on the honey bee population. We all want to protect our lake and wildlife and never like to see any of the chemical products overused.



2017 SPRING WILDFIRE SEASON

The Virginia Department of Forestry has announced their 4PM Burning Law. The law prohibits open burning of any type between the hours of midnight and 4:00 PM. More than 60 % of the average of 1000 wildfires occurs in the spring. When you do burn, it is required you stay with the burn and be prepared to take appropriate measure in the event the wind shifts and blows it out of the area. This Law is in effect until April 30, 2017. Failure to comply or contributing to a wildfire may lead to a Class 3 Misdemeanor Charge and the amount of damage caused by the fire. Please use all precautions and obey this law.

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CHIPPER SERVICES



The Association will offer assistance with your limbs that may have came down or you removed this Summer. On May 2, 2017 the Maintenance Department will provide this service for the South Side of the Lake. Same services will be provided on May 3, 2017 for the North Side of the Lake.

These items need to be placed adjacent to the main street so employees do not have to enter the property and in place by 8:00 AM. The limbs etc, should be no less than four feet in length and no larger than six inches in diameter. **PLEASE NO VINES OR LEAVES.**

Boat Registration & Slip Rentals

As a reminder, the office will need **CURRENT** copies of your Boater Safety Class, *State Registration and Insurance Policy* that shows watercraft liability. If you renewed either of these since your registration last year, please make sure to forward a copy to the office. If you are unsure of your current information, please call the office and we will review your file. The cost to register a motorized boat is 1-49 Horsepower is \$50.00, 50-149 horsepower is \$75.00, and 150 and above is \$100.00. The cost to register a non-motorized boat, (paddle boat, kayak & canoe) is \$25.00 and is a onetime registration. *You must have paid the first half of 2017 assessments to acquire either decal.*

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General Manager's Report

We welcome the warm weather and look forward to serving the continuing needs of the membership during 2017. Boat decals may be purchased @ your convenience once you have paid the first half of the 2017 assessments. Remember that gas powered motorized boat traffic is only in a counter clock wise direction. We will have a part time employee on the Lake enforcing the boat policies and attempting to maintain a safe environment for all. A reminder that all people operating a boat having 10 horsepower or greater. are required to have completed the Boater Safety Class sponsored through the Virginia Game & Inland Fisheries. There is a FREE class being conducted in the Community Center on April 1, 2017 from 10:00 AM -4:00 PM. Contact the office to preregister!

Trash removal services will be provided once per week during 2017.

I urge those that wish to sign up for a partial payment agreement to do that early, in order to avoid higher monthly payments. To date there we have approved eleven. We collected 96 % of the 2016 revenue affiliated with assessments! Our delinquency rate for 2016 was approximately 4.0%. Judgments were awarded on all delinquent accounts and Memorandums of Liens were also filed.

Remember nothing can be placed in the Lake including **leaves** without Board permission.

We have scheduled the return of the roll off dumpsters to assist with your spring cleanup and they will be at the shop area on Saturday, May 6, 2017. A separate article on this is enclosed with this edition. Additionally we will have the first limb pick-up scheduled for May 2 & 3, 2017 and details are included in a separate Article.

When you have building materials delivered, fuel delivery, have your septic system serviced, or any other activity involving heavier type trucks, please remember and remind those involved companies, the gross vehicle weight cannot exceed five tons on the dam/spillway or twenty five tons on the Hickory Creek Bridge. If you see this occurring, please provide a Company Name and address if possible to the office for follow-through!

Ridge Utilities is very pleased to announce that all required 2016 testing of the water was completed with a 100% passing of those requirements. The 2016 Water Quality Report will be distributed as soon as it is completed. Occasionally we have a leak in one of the water mains and when you observe that you do not have water or low pressure, please turn the electrical breaker off to your water heater to prevent damage to the elements.

Should you witness any activity that appears unlawful contact the Sheriff's Department immediately and also make the office aware of the issue including tag numbers, type of vehicle, and if by chance you know the individual(s). Your identity will not be disclosed. The Sheriff's Department is currently assisting by monitoring the speed of vehicles on the roadways and has written some tickets. This also includes stray dogs. Their nonemergency # is 967-1234.
