

While at first it seemed to be a creative renewal, we have realized that it is a repeat of past Acmar Community Christmas gatherings.



When holidays are approaching, we think of traditions of the past; of people and places that hold special memories. We often think of a tradition as being something repeated over countless years, but can also be something new that was done and worked well, so you plan to do it again. And when circumstances make a tradition impossible to carry on, or have to pause, it's a good feeling when changing situations make it possible to revive some special traditions.

Throughout the history of the Acmar church, Christmas has been a special time and the traditions there have had to change or adapt to different times. Early on, there were parties sponsored by the mining company where each employee's family received baskets of fruit and goodies based on the number of children in the family, and Santa arrived when he heard them sing "Up on the House Top." Things changed with the closing of the company. Some years, the Advent season consisted only of traditional hymns at Sunday services. In 1989, someone had the idea that we should gather our children on the front steps of the church for a group picture to send out as Christmas cards. This new tradition went on for several years and it was fun to see the children grow from year to year. We would also have a special Sunday service with the children performing a Christmas play each year, and every little girl waiting for her chance to be "Mary". We've had a choir sing beautiful new songs as well as the much loved traditional hymns. But children tend to become young adults and some move away. Then a new generation of children was once again portraying the Christmas story. So someone suggested that our whole congregation should gather on the front steps for new pictures to send out to our church friends and families. (Over the years, we've laughed when we see that those of us with gray hair seem to blend in with the white clapboard walls of the church).

Then Covid-19 seemed to have pressed a "pause" button in the life of the church. There were months of no church services at all and our only connection was with Belinda's sermons which Andy recorded to be posted on the church website. There were no extra events like the ladies' Christmas luncheon, or the Community Christmas party with jingle bells and donated door prizes. Gradually services began with everyone masked, with no singing, no hugging, and no fellowship time after the service. And there were no pictures of the congregation smiling on the front steps.

What a wonderful blessing to find that we are slowly coming out of the Covid pandemic and can renew some of our church traditions! We're singing, hugging, and having our fellowship time again. On Sunday, December 11, our children will enact the Nativity story, and the fun of our Community Christmas follows. And you can see that we're back on the front steps again!
