In no time the girl, only 21 yrs old, breathed out loudly as though breathing out her last like she was dying. She then opened her eyes, only to see all these men around her. She wanted to know where she was and why, that is when we told her that she is in the presence of the Lord. We asked the deaconess to take care of her, feed her, and bathe her.

At 3:00 pm she attended the Bible class and went home after that. She has since become one of the best Bible students and has been baptized. She has been so helpful in all things and even her complexion has changed, God makes all things beautiful. Who is like our Lord, all those who come to the Lord Jesus will find rest. Though you are rejected by father, mother, and friends, Jesus will never fail to listen to a crying soul.

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Live Reports From India

November 12:

Dear Family & Friends,

We made it to India after a 4+ hour train ride. The train was better than we expected. We went shopping this afternoon for a few things at the shopping market, followed by the local public market. Much of the food here is hotter than we like, but some of it is tolerable.

We start our evangelism tonight with *ten* villages rather than the eight we had signed up for. A second campaign is already in progress here with ten villages.

It took over an hour to get to our meeting place. I would never want to drive here. It is even worse than some other countries we have been in.

I am very surprised that we have not seen any accidents. Sharing the road, there are big trucks, buses, cars of all kinds, tricycles, motorcycles, bicycles, burros with carts. cows with carts, tractors with carts. people on foot, plus dogs and chickens.

Part of the road last night was very rough and

narrow. We hit one bump pretty hard and I was worried about our projector that was in its' case laying in the back of the SUV-type vehicle.

Finally, we arrived at the outdoor area where we were to hold our meeting. They had constructed a stage with a canopy over it. We immediately started setting up, but couldn't get the projector to turn on and Ed's computer was not coming on either, even with the battery. We wondered if the hard bump we hit had damaged our equipment. Bowing our heads, we prayed and worked on it again.

Ed took the battery out and waited a few seconds then put it back in. A message kept coming up and Ed had to keep clicking it off. Then he figured out how to turn that message off and it seemed to be working at last.

We moved the projector closer to the power source and it finally



came on. However, the plug was very loose, and if it got bumped it would go off again. Moving the projector meant they had to move the sheet that we used as a screen. Finally, we got everything set up and got started. We praise God for protecting our equipment.

The people were singing most of the time we were getting all this done. Then Pastor Bob told a children's story and I gave the health talk. It was 9pm when Ed got up to speak and finished at 10pm. As he started to walk off the platform, one of the boards shifted when he stepped on it, causing one of his legs to go through the floor. He didn't get hurt though, praise God. Then all the people wanted to be blessed and prayed for. It was about 10:20pm when we started for home and 11:30pm when we got to the Hotel.

Pastor Bob Robinson had a kidney transplant in February. He has had type 1 diabetes since age six and is now my age. His kidney was hurting by the time we were bumping along on our way home. He said he was better this morning. Pray for him.

November 22:

They keep us very busy here. Yesterday we left at 10am and did not get back until 11pm. We normally get back anywhere from 11pm to 11:30pm. Yesterday we attended a wedding which was far, far away. Sunday was a baptism with 75 candidates. We have several small baptisms again tomorrow, so again we will leave early. Visiting each of the ten villages that we cover is a challenge. We pray with our people in their homes.

There are others in the village that also want us to pray for them.

We have visited nine of the ten villages, but will need to go back to two of them to finish up. Everyone wants us to lay our hands on them to bless them. Somehow, they need to learn that they can pray themselves for themselves. After the night meetings about half of them come up for prayer. We generally pray for them in small groups of 6-8 individuals at a time.

It takes about an hour and a half to reach the evangelism site and an hour to get back to the hotel. Driving here is like a game of chicken.

November 25:

Last night was our last meeting and it was our biggest crowd. I don't know how many, but after the meeting they served food they had prepared food for 500 people and ran out.

I gave the health talk about the Adventist Advantage on how Adventists live longer and healthier lives than their neighbors because of the Adventist lifestyle. Ed gave the message on Heaven and the New Earth. After his talk, he gave a call and a large number, maybe 50, came forward. It is hard to estimate how many. There were 75 baptized last Sunday. The pastor baptized two more groups (56 & 24) during the week. Praise God!



After the meeting, we showed pictures of the 10+ villages and the baptism.

The people showed their love by presenting us with leis.

We each had at least 10; I lost count.



November 16:

We are here in Kurnool India holding a 10 village evangelism campaign.

One of our villages that we visited yesterday was Sankirenepalli village. The Bible worker there is P Sanjeevarao. The village gave us a royal welcome. We

walked through the village until we came to the church.

There was a large plaque on the wall that said donated by Kittitas Washington SDA Church. We were told that 25 families attend that little church. We visited all 25 families plus interests.

A few months ago during the rainy season they had a flood that flooded out all the possessions of

flooded out all the possessions of that village. People lost everything. Many lives were lost, also.



November 15: We visited the first of the 10 villages of our campaign. They gave us a royal welcome. After the welcome we visited several homes. They all wanted to be blessed. They got us up on this cart pulled by 2 Brahma bulls with 4 village fathers beating drums. They took us all through the village, beating their drums.
