Smoke Rise Community Association Annual Meeting Report

The annual meeting of the SRCA was held on the evening of March 22, 2016 in the Fellowship Hall of Smoke Rise Baptist Church with President Mike Huerkamp presiding. There were approximately 120 association members in attendance. Special guests attending were

Mayor Frank Auman and Council Members Honey van de Kreke and Bill Rosenfeld of District two of our new city of Tucker. DeKalb County School Board Member Jim McMahan, and Mary Ann Thomas represented the new Smoke Rise Country Club management team. During the course of the meeting, each made short presentations and fielded questions.

Mayor Auman disclosed that the Sears property had recently been sold, and that details of development were pending.

President Huerkamp reported that the board had met ten times in 2015 including one meeting each, with the Tucker precinct police leadership and with Emory Morsberger (representing the businesses of the Stone Mountain Community Improvement District).

Major services and initiatives of the SRCA in 2015 were: free document shredding and electronics recycling events; maintenance of landscaping at 15 chimneys (up from 10); installation of a new stack at the Rosser Place and Hugh Howell intersection; expansion of landscaping on the Hugh Howell slope across from Smoke Rise Park; a donation of \$4,545 in computers to the elementary school; illumination of the Mountain Creek sign; and improved parking, refrigeration, shed access and installation of an information kiosk at the community garden. Gratitude was expressed to Jackson Gibbs for his contribution to the garden improvements.

SRCA membership was 747 members in 2015, up 3% from 2014. Income for the year was reported at \$38,164 representing a 28% increase attributed to increased membership, extra donations above the dues amount from many neighbors, and the high use of the community garden. At year-end, the SRCA had a balance of \$53,585. The \$35 dues donation in 2015 was distributed as follows: 51% to green space maintenance, 8% operations, 7% for insurance, 3% for events, and the remainder to reserves.

The saga of SRCA status with the IRS continues from 2014 into 2016. While recognized as a non-profit by the state of GA, SRCA has no known history of ever filing with the IRS. The board has retained the accounting firm of Rugh & Logan, LLC to assist with the submission of proper tax documents.

A Mother's Love is Like a Beautiful Melody that Never Ends by Barbara Bruschi

Spring signifies the resurgence of new life and the eternal cycle of rebirth, making the glorious month of May the perfect setting for a Mother's Day celebration. The origins of Mother's Day can be found in the era of the ancient Greeks and Romans. While the Greeks honored Rhea, the Romans were devout to Cybele, (250B.C) a mother goddess. Later, the early Christians held a festival on the 4th Sunday of Lent to honor Mary, the Mother of Christ.

Today 46 countries all over the world are honoring their mothers on a designated day, which varies from country to country. The UK had a Mothering Sunday (in the 1600s) long before America established this day to celebrate all Mothers. Servants, apprentices and other employees were encouraged to visit their mothers on this day. By the 19th century the custom of celebrating Mother's day had almost died out completely

In 1872, Julia Ward Howe who is the author of the famous "Battle Hymn of the Republic" had the original idea of creating a day to celebrate Mothers Peace Day. Unfortunately, this idea did not last either.

In 1905, Anna Jarvis restarted the movement in the Church of Grafton, West Virginia to pay homage to her own mother. Carnations, a symbol of a mother's pure love, sweetness, purity and patience were distributed throughout the church service. After an intensive effort of lobbying by Jarvis, In 1914, President Woodrow Wilson signed a "Joint Resolution" designating the second







SAFETY ON THE STREET

- Before you leave home decide what you actually need to take with you rather than automatically taking your entire handbag or wallet. For example, if you are going to the grocery store for a few items, you can carry cash, a single check, or credit/debit card, I.D. and keys in a pocket
- Carry your keys and ID separately. If someone gets your keys and ID, they may go to your home or business and access that location with the keys.
- Wear clothing and shoes that are comfortable, low profile and appropriate for the
- Always plan your route and stay alert to your surroundings. Avoid shortcuts. Walk confidently. Scan your surroundings and make eye contact with people.
- If you must make a large cash purchase, plan ahead and take a companion along. There really is safety in numbers. If you do not drive or cannot get a ride, use a taxi rather than a bus to minimize waiting time
- If you use bank machines (ATM's) choose one located in a well-lit, busy spot like inside a grocery store. Put your card and cash away before leaving the machine.
- If you must carry valuables like important papers, jewelry, cash etc., chose to wear clothes with inside pockets or use a small bag with a long thin strap to be worn under your coat or clothes.
- Never leave your purse unattended, even if it is in a shopping cart.
- Carry your purse very close to you, preferable with the strap over your shoulder and the purse to the front of your body. Don't dangle it from your arm.

"There is Nothing Permanent Except Change"

That headline is courtesy of the Greek philosopher, Heraclitus of Ephesus. And, as most everyone in Smoke Rise knows by now, our sanitation services have gone through a few changes.

The DeKalb County Sanitation Division began once-a-week garbage, recycling and yard trimmings collection for all singlefamily residential households in unincorporated DeKalb and the cities of Brookhaven, Dunwoody and Lithonia on July 6,



2015. Phase I, which was completed in fall 2015, included garbage roll cart deliveries to all single-family homes in the Sanitation Division's service area.

Phase II is underway, and focuses on implementing changes to garbage and recycling container requirements and collection procedures, increasing recycling participation, and providing optional garbage and recycling container offerings. The Sanitation Division implemented changes to garbage and recycling container requirements and collection procedures on April 18, 2016.

Now, only county-provided garbage roll carts are approved for garbage collection service. That means, garbage containers from your local home improvement store, or any other store, are not approved for garbage collection service in DeKalb County. If you have more garbage than your county-provided container holds, secure, durable plastic bags are approved for excess garbage. You must place the bag(s) next to your garbage roll cart on your scheduled collection day.

If you find your household frequently has more garbage than your county-provided container holds, then consider signing up for the convenient, curbside single-stream recycling program. You may also consider obtaining a different sized or additional garbage container to better fit your household's needs. (Sizes offered by the county include: 35-, 45-, 65- and 95 gallon containers.)

The requirements for county-issued containers also went into effect for the recycling containers. Recyclable materials must be placed in county-provided blue 18-gallon recycling bins, blue 40-gallon recycling bags, or blue 65-gallon recycling roll carts. Customer-provided recycling containers from a third party are not approved for recycling collection service. To subscribe to the Sanitation Division's FREE residential single-stream recycling program, contact (404) 294-2900 or visit keepdekalbbeautiful. org.

For yard trimmings, you can still use your own container. Do keep in mind however, that yard trimmings must be prepared according to the division's preparation procedures, and should be contained in 20- to 40-gallon containers or biodegradable paper bags. Also, all containers should be covered and have a detachable lid.

These changes implemented during Phase II are helping minimize injuries to field collection service employees and the potential for damage to customer-provided containers. Customers not in compliance will experience a delay in sanitation collection service until their next scheduled collection day, and will be issued a notice advising of the use of an unapproved garbage or recycling container.

The Current Smoke Rise Real Estate Market

The Smoke Rise real estate market is getting stronger. If the trend for 2016 continues at the current pace, we should end up at or ahead of 2015 sales and definitely ahead in terms of dollar volume. The total dollar value of 27 homes sold year-to-date is \$8,212,026, with an average of \$304,149. Last year, at this time 19



homes sold for a total dollar value of \$5,108,670, with an average of \$268,877. (So far this year, the volume of sales in Smoke Rise is 29.6% of the total 2015 volume. It was only 16.8% at the same time in 2015,)

Over the past 5 years there has not been a consistent "best" or "worst" period for the Smoke Rise housing market. While individual homes are not directly comparable, (like apples to apples), homes in Smoke Rise do show a trend of increasing prices.

As of press time, the inventory of homes on the market is lower than previous years with 37 homes available.

Here are a few more numbers:

- 21 homes were sold in the first quarter of 2016 vs. 17 in the first quarter of 2015. The average price was \$297,948.
- The average dollars per square foot was \$93.84 in 2015—with a high of \$139.38 and low of \$36.01 for a home that had burned. In 2016, the average dollars per square foot is \$92.63 (YTD) with a high of \$115.84 and a low of \$60.83. So far no homes with pools have closed in 2016. Homes with a pool usually have a higher average cost per square foot.
- So far in 2016, average days on market* (list to close) for properties sold were 147, while it took an average of 187 days for homes to sell during the same time frame in 2015. The average days on the market for all of 2015 was 147 days.
- The highest priced listing in Smoke Rise is currently \$1,600,000 and the lowest is \$189,900 with the average being \$522,350. This reflects a higher number of upper end properties currently on the market than we have had in the past. This does not mean that they will sell for the asking price. If two homes in current listings that are priced over a million are removed from the statistics, the average list price of homes in Smoke Rise is \$456,303. There are only 8 homes under \$300,000 on the market. It should be noted that more than half of the homes sold in 2016 year-to-date are under \$300,000.

Overall home turnover rates in Smoke Rise show a growing confidence in selling.

While the market is always changing, favorable interest rates and strong economic conditions suggest that 2016 should be a good year in real estate. The data we are seeing shows some growth in dollars but slow growth compared to the markets in North Atlanta. *Note that in some cases relisted homes do not show entire market time.

Beer Belly and Muffin Top: The Shape of Your Future?

Body shape is largely determined by genetics and whether you are male or female. In general, physiologically, women have five to ten percent more fat on their bodies than men do. This is related to the need women have for extra calories during child bearing and breast-feeding. Where normal body fat is distributed is also largely related to sex. Men have little fat on their hips and thighs and more at their waist, while women carry more normal body fat on their hips and thighs. Sometimes genetics overrides this generalization, and some women will have all of their normal fat centered in the abdomen and have very lean hips and thighs. Rarely, men will have normal fat distributed over their thighs and hips.

Both men and women can develop 'beer belly', 'love handles' or 'muffin top'... at any age. These terms have been used recently to describe excess fat around the belly or midsection that overhangs the belt or waistline. Belly fat does not come from eating certain foods or drinking certain beverages, including alcoholic beverages. It comes from taking in too many calories. You cannot get rid of belly fat by eating or not eating certain foods. You also cannot use exercise to 'spot reduce' the fat. Abdominal exercises, like 'core' exercises, Pilates and sit-ups will build up your abdominal wall muscles and improve your posture, but they will not do anything to the fat. Likewise, lipo-suction can remove superficial fat, but will not have any effect on the more dangerous type of fat found around your abdominal organs. This kind of fat, called 'visceral fat' can increase your likelihood of having cardiovascular disease and diabetes.

"Meno-pot' or 'meno-paunch' is a term coined to describe the layer of fat around the belly that many women accumulate after going through menopause. While widely accepted as true, scientific studies are still conflicted about whether the decline in estrogen that occurs with menopause causes fat to be distributed more in the visceral or abdominal region. More precise studies are needed to measure intra abdominal fat (fat around the abdominal organs), not just the fat under the skin to determine whether this is a real phenomenon of menopause. Could this same dynamic be true of men as they go through middle age?

Is there anything wrong with carrying extra weight in your midsection? Well, yes! Abdominal obesity (waist circumference over 40 inches in males, or 35 inches in females) puts you in a high-risk group for cardiovascular disease, diabetes, polycystic ovary disease and several types of cancer. So, getting rid of your 'gut' is good. Having one is bad

The best way to get rid of abdominal fat is to decrease your calorie intake. Note that I did not say 'starve yourself' or go on a diet or two. Smart eating is enough! This includes getting rid of refined foods and all sugary drinks and eating high quality foods that are rich in whole grains, multi-colored vegetables, healthy, unsaturated fats and lean protein. Because alcoholic drinks of any kind are 'empty calories', or calories without any nutritional benefit, cutting down or eliminating these will help too. Might I also suggest cutting down on or eliminating eating out? In addition to smart eating, re-learning your body signals for thirst and hunger will put you on the path to a naturally slim body.

While exercise alone will not eliminate fat or result in weight loss, it will help you maintain any weight you lose by cutting calories. The cardio component will also benefit your heart, blood pressure and bones. Aim for walking about 10,000 steps or more per day or doing a cardio work out of some type for 30 minutes five times a week. Change your exercise routine up a bit every month or two to keep your body from adapting its metabolic burn to the routine. Adding or maintaining muscle mass after age 40 (strength training) is a good addition and will prevent falls, osteoporosis and keep you pain free and active.

So, enjoy this season when the weather makes it more pleasant to get out and exercise. Try new, healthy ways of eating and lose that gut!!



Convenient & Cost Cutting: Smart Sprinkler Controllers



Spring has arrived! Time to get out in the yard and do some planting, trimming, and sprucing up. Not being much of a gardener myself, and having a new property to maintain, I sought professional help from a Smoke Rise neighbor. Lyle Collins, founder and president of Southern Trillium landscape design firm based in Smoke Rise came to my aid.

Passionate, knowledgeable, and articulate, he walked our yard and made some recommendations. Before leaving, he shared with me the mobile phone app that allows him to control the sprinkler systems for his own home and the homes of at least 10 customers for whom he has that responsibility. Being more of a geek than a gardener, I was intrigued by the mobile app and decided to investigate further and devote this column to sharing what I learned about these new, remote control irrigation systems.

My research included interviews with Tucker irrigation firm Mystic Waters, studying articles in PC and Wired magazines, and reading Amazon reviews.

Most reviewers concluded that the Rachio Iro is the preferred product over the other two top contenders Skydrop and Blossom. All of these control systems seamlessly integrate with your home's Wi-Fi, providing total sprinkler control from a



Another feature to look for is the ability to display pictures of the various watering zones rather than just the designations, "Zone 1, Zone 2", which makes it hard to remember what is getting watered. Easy to activate, you simple take a picture of the zone, upload the picture to the app and label it with a Zone number. If you do have problems with the Rachio, help is a toll free phone call away. Technicians are available to remotely access your system, investigate problems and resolve them without having to send someone out. Costs for these systems run \$150 to \$250 and about that same amount to install and program unless you are a Do It Yourselfer.

For Rainbird systems common in our area, they will have an upgrade coming in June that will perform most of the features these other early innovators have established as expectations. But it sounds like the upgrade is about the same cost of these other systems, and you always have to be leery of any first generations system.

Bottom line, these smart irrigation controllers make it easy and affordable to have beautiful, sustainable lawns and landscapes.

Because the Mountain Mums held their April meeting late in the month, (spring break), We thought we would share a few spring gardening tips from the Walter Reeves seasonal gardening calendar followed by our own comments. You can access the calendar on his website: www.walterreeves.com/seasonal-gardening-calendar.

- 1. If you want summer long color in your garden, plant begonias, coleus, geraniums, petunias and vinca. Be sure to check the sun conditions before you plant, and plant 'like with like'.
- 2. Prune leafless limbs from shade trees, sprouts from the base and lower trunk of crepe myrtles and prune azaleas that have just finished blooming.
- 3. Divide and move crowded irises that have just bloomed. Make sure some of the rhizome is exposed to light or you are planting the irises too deep.
- 4. Plant herbs such as rosemary, dill, oregano and basil in full sun.
- 5. Plant tomatoes deep. Add ten sheets of newspaper as mulch to prevent leaf diseases, then cover paper with pine straw.
- 6. Water between 10 pm and 10 am. to avoid evaporation... one inch of water per week for plants and lawn. An exception is container plants, which may need to be watered daily—whenever plants wilt or if soil is dry when you stick your finger in an inch.
- 7. Drill a small hole in the cap of a two-liter soda bottle. Fill the bottle, cap it and stick the cap end into the soil next to your patio or container plants. They will take a slow drink all day.

In May, the Mountain Mums Garden Club will hold their last garden club meeting of the season, until August of 2016. The meeting will be held at the home of Mary Jacobson. The Program will be about bog gardens. Watch the *Smoke Signal* for upcoming events taking place over the summer.

May will be the last meeting this season until we meet again the 2nd Monday in September. For our May meeting we will be taking a field trip to the Arnold-Tedder House Oak Grove in Newnan as part of the Historic House and Garden Tour, sponsored by the Redbud District of the Garden Clubs of Georgia.

Annually, Edith Morton president of Smoke Rise Garden Club places a wreath on the Blue Star marker to remember Armed Forces Day. The marker is located at the Smoke Rise Elementary School. The wreath will be place on Saturday, the 21st of May. The Blue Star Memorial Program honors all men and women that serve in the United States Armed Services. This program began with the planting of 8,000 Dogwood trees by the New Jersey Council of Garden Clubs in 1944 as a living memorial to veterans of World War II. In 1945, the National Council of State Garden Clubs adopted this program and began a Blue Star Highway system that covers thousands of miles across the Continental United States, Alaska and Hawaii. A large metal Blue Star Memorial Highway Marker was placed at appropriate locations along the way. Memorial Markers and By-Way markers were added to the Highway Markers, to be used at locations such as National cemeteries, parks, veteran's facilities and gardens.

Smoke Rise Morning Glories Di-VINE Seminar on Clematis!

The Morning Glories had a wonderful treat for April's meeting with a lecture by Lyndy Broder, the International expert on clematis. Lyndy entertained us with lovely photos of over 400 varieties of clematis from her own property in Stockbridge GA and from gardens around the world. Her three acre garden features all types of clematis. She often allows the vines to intertwine with existing plants like hydrangeas or climb a tree – like the persimmon – or even grow as a ground cover to compliment daylilies or other perennials. The Morning Glories will be going on a field

trip in May to see Lyndy's lovely garden at what might be the peak season for bloom.

Clematis varieties can bloom in every month of the year, even in the winter months. It is found in every continent on earth except for Antarctica and has three main species that are similar to hydrangeas. One group of Clematis only blooms on old wood or vine. The second group blooms both on old and new wood/vine. The third group only blooms on new wood/vine. Timing of pruning will depend on which category the vine falls.

In other club news, President Glenndolyn Hallman reviewed upcoming events for the spring. Marsha Pittard

circulated the hostess signup for the 2016-2017 club year. Carolyn Woodson and Glenndolyn introduced the group to the "Million Pollinator Garden Challenge", encouraging members to register their gardens at www.millionpollinatorgardens.org. Marsha offered our Conservation Tip on the multiple ways we can save energy in our daily lives by recycling, reducing the thermostat, using the sun to warm us in winter and using blinds in the summer. Joy Zaidan reminded the club that

the October Redbud District meeting will be held at the Smoke Rise Country Club and we will be the host club for that event. The keynote speaker will be Walter Reeves. More details will follow for that event and for the Yellow Daisy Standard Flower Show in September at Stone Mountain Park.

HODGE PODGE

Spring is here and summer is just around the corner! I just love to eat outside and for some reason I find myself entertaining more during these months too. I have many cookbooks and cooking magazines and am one of these that tears out recipes from newspaper! magazines. But best of all, I like it when people share their recipes with me. Hopefully these recipes are new to you and you can enjoy them for your summer cookout. All of these have been taste tested by my husband.

Deviled Eggs a la Reesio

This was my dad's recipe and he even shared it in his Xmas cards one year. I have tried lots of egg recipes but I keep coming back to this sentimental one.

- 1 dozen boiled eggs
- 2 T mayonnaise
- 1 T wine vinegar
- 2 T mustard

Juice of ½ lemon

1 tsp parsley

1 tsp minced onion flakes

dash monosodium glutamate (Accent)

dash seasoned salt

dash poultry seasoning

dash salt

dash Worcestershire sauce

dash grated pepper

Peel eggs and cut into halves. Put yolks in bowl and mash with other ingredients. Fill halves and chill until ready to serve. May also add 4 strips well done crumbled bacon and chives to filling.

Dill Dip - My favorite to serve with veggies

1 c. mayonnaise
1 1/2 tsp seasoned salt
1 c sour cream
1 1/2 tsp Worcestershire sauce

1 ½ T minced onion 1 1/2 tsp dill weed

2 T parsley

Mix all together and refrigerate.

Cajun Crackers

I had these in New Orleans one time and just had to have the recipe. I usually serve with cream cheese and hot pepper jelly.

- 1 box unsalted saltines
- 2 packages Ranch dressing mix
- 1 1/3 c canola oil
- 2 T red pepper flakes

Mix all in a large bowl and turn upside down every 15 minutes for 2 hours.

Mandarin Salsa

Too many good salsa recipes but this one is a little different. Serve with chips.

- 5 plum tomatoes, chopped
- 2 T minced fresh cilantro
- 1 large sweet onion, chopped
- 1 t salt
- 2 jalapeno peppers, seeded and chopped
- 1 t minced garlic
- 2 T sugar
- 15 oz can mandarin oranges, drained
- 2 T lime juice

Combine all. Drain. Chill and serve with tortilla chips.

Chinese Rollups

- 1 1/2 shredded coleslaw mix
- 2 t. sesame oil
- 1/2 c water chestnuts, finely chopped
- 4 T plum sauce, divided
- 1/4 c thinly sliced green onions
- 4-6 flout tortillas

Combine coleslaw mix, water chestnuts, onion and oil and 3 T plum sauce. Spread remaining tablespoon plum sauce evenly over tortillas. Spread 1/2 c coleslaw mixture on each tortilla to within 1/4 inch of edges. Roll tortillas up tightly and wrap each in plastic wrap. Chill at least 1 hour. Cut into 1-inch slices. Makes 24
