But what if it were possible to take Tim's remarks to heart in a more day to day way. Maybe because I'm male, or maybe because I'm me, I find it difficult often times to say nice things to people even when I think them. It's a conundrum I suspect is perhaps shared by others as well.

So why not, why not, why not give those around us encouragement, gratitude, and appreciation for the things they do and say – or just because. Maybe some of the things people say are intended for that purpose. Like "Well done", "Nice job", "I care about you", "Buckle up", "Perfect-thanks", "Way to go", or even "I don't know what I'd do without you".

We all wish we could do as Gandhi advised "*Be the change you wish to see in the world.*" Maybe a good first step is to show how we feel about those around us – and not wait until they can no longer hear it. As a very wise lady once said: "Send me the roses while I'm alive."

BEFORE LAUNCHING....BEFORE LEAVING:

INSPECT watercraft, trailer, and equipment.

REMOVE visible aquatic plants, zebra mussels, other animals, and mud before leaving any water access


DRAIN water from boat, bilge, and livewell by removing drain plug and opening all water draining devices. Regulations require this when leaving any body of water in Michigan.

DISPOSE of unwanted minnows, fish parts and throw in the trash.

SPRAY / WASH recreational equipment with high pressure and / or hot water (120F / 50C or higher)
OR

DRY everything at **least 5 Days** before going to other waters.

Safe Boating

Boy wasn't it a great weekend past? Wonderful weather and good times around the lake. Everything seemed to be pretty good boating wise, even when the Sherriff was out on the water. Our tips for this week!

1. Remember that you have to be 16 years of age and have a safe boating certificate to operate a personal water craft by yourself.
2. With the super nice warm nights remember to make sure that all your lights work!
3. Keep your distance: Remember to stay 100 feet from piers, buoy's, rafts and other boats when passing them. We had a lot of boats coming way too close to the piers by our house last week. If you're pulling tubers or skiers, they must be at least 100 feet from the boat your passing. Jet Ski's must stay at least 150 feet behind another jet ski when traveling together.
4. Improper registration: Remember, if your boat or personal water craft is in the State of Michigan 60 day or more continuously it must be registered in the State.
5. Life jackets: Make sure that you have the right size for everyone onboard your boat and that children 6 years of age

and younger must wear their type I or II life jackets at all times while on board any boat or personal water craft.

Well, that is all for this week, I hope that we have another great weather weekend this week like last and as always *have fun out there and be safe!*

RECIPIES



Beer marinated burgers

Makes 4 burgers

- 1 pound ground beef (80%lean, 20%fat)
- 1 bottle of beer (We used Blue Point Summer Ale)
- 4 slices of cheese like Colby-Jack
- 2 tablespoons of grill seasoning like Grill mates Montreal Steak Seasoning
- 1 small white onion chopped finely or grated
- 4 hamburger buns
- Favorite condiments

Put the ground beef into a mixing bowl. Add the onion, grill seasoning and pour in half the bottle of beer. Mix well. Drink the rest of the beer and let the meat marinate in the fridge for an hour so that the meat firms up and the flavors develop.

Cook on either an outside grill, grill pan, or sauté pan until cooked to your desire of doneness. Add the cheese right before the burgers are cooked to your liking to melt it. Serve burger on buns and top with your favorite condiments.

Our Anniversary and Indian Lake

It started in early June of 1971 we were going to married on the 26th of June and we needed a place to live. My bride and I looked all over our town of South Bend and just didn't find a place that appealed to us, then a friend of ours suggested an apartment on the South side of Indian Lake. I had been on Birch Lake from the time that I had been 6 years old and my future wife had been on Dewey Lake for many years. This sounded great, living on a lake year around, super! I thought! We inquired at the Peterson Lakeview Apartments and sure enough they would indeed have a vacancy at the end of June. Perfect timing with only one problem, we couldn't look at the apartment we were going to rent. Nevertheless we rented it, so after our honeymoon to Florida we moved into our little place on the lake.

Well three and a half years later after much pushing from our parents we bought a house in South Bend, really the house I grew up in and moved away from

the lake. It really was a sad time for both of us as we really didn't want to leave the lake we had grown so fond of. Lucky for us though while up hunting with my father-in-law and brother-in-law we spotted this little cottage on the east side of the lake for sale. (It was owned by the Brewer family.) Just a little sign on a tree (For Sale) When I got home I told my wife about the little cottage and called the number that we on the sign. The owner, who was from Niles agreed to meet with us that very afternoon. We bought the little cottage that very day and enjoyed it for the next 25 years. We bought that lot and had it for almost 9 years before we built our present home on Lakeview Ave. Now it's been 21 years here on Lakeview my wife and I have both retired and enjoy our lake with the greatest neighbors and friends in the world. The changes in the lake, the people and the memories, I really couldn't have wished for a better life. Sunday the 26th is our 45th wedding anniversary and our 45th anniversary of living on Indian Lake! So to end I want to say thanks to the love of my life for really 52 years Bonnie and hope to share our love of this beautiful lake for another 45.

REMEMBERING ED WEST:

Ed West, husband of Linda Collins West and longtime neighbor on Orchard Bluff, left his earthly existence on June 4, 2016. I write this last sentence carefully, as the Ed we all knew and so enjoyed left us in a different way a couple years ago as a result of the progression of Alzheimer's disease. For a great amount of the time he suffered from this dastardly ailment, Ed continued to be his typically joyful self. But in the most recent months and years, we watched him become distant as his memory

left him and his mental processing capabilities declined. Never, though, did he lose his kind heart and nature. As long as his mind allowed him, he demonstrated his love of and commitment to his wife, children, and extended family. He bravely accepted his illness when diagnosed, and offered himself to Northwestern University's research program on Alzheimer's disease. In sum, he was and is a good soul. Ed was an educator...not a teacher, an educator. His instruction of history and social studies was not just the facts of the past and the present, but also the whys. Ed taught for understanding so that his students would better learn the art and habits of making good life decisions. He coached his wrestlers the same way, to analyze and make smart decisions in the quest for victory on the wrestling mat. Ed's hope was that classroom lessons and wrestling experiences would transfer to better lives for those with whom he interacted. Evidence in the form of the respect held for him by his former students and wrestlers shows he was successful in this endeavor.

There was another side to Ed. He was a fisherman. For him, it seemed to be a Zen thing. When at the lake, Ed would greet each day with a cup of coffee and his fishing gear as he headed out onto the lake to chase bass and walleye. So, when the sun rose, he fished. When he had a couple extra hours in the day, he fished. When he had a list of projects that needed to get done, he knocked those off and then he fished. I am confident Ed believed that God does not subtract from a person's allotted time the hours spent fishing. It was his recreational passion and he was good at it. Sadly, an irrational and as yet unexplainable ailment was able to diminish Ed's allotted time. Summer mornings will not be the same without seeing Ed quietly drifting by on the lake, fishing pole in hand while pondering the day to come.

REMEMBERING DON GOESEL:

My father, DON GOESEL, was the consummate family man, a distance runner, outdoorsman, pharmacist, sailor, carver, listener, protector, provider, role model like no other, reader, wanderer, volunteer, unfailing finder of four-leaf clovers, National Guardsman, avid gardener, fan of pro wrestling, lover of fondue, gentleman, coach, husband and father and grandpa extraordinaire ...Bacca... He passed away peacefully April 22, 2016 in Florida. It was Earth Day, fittingly. He was surrounded by his loving family, his wife Lynn holding his hand.

A long-time resident of Tinley Park, IL, Don split his time between Dowagiac, Michigan (30 years on Indian Lake) and Nokomis, Florida after retiring. He fought a brave battle against cancer and lived his life by his terms right to the end.

Don was an exceptional listener who could still captivate with stories of his life's antics growing up in a simpler time. He loved to hang out with his kids and grandkids for whom he had unlimited time and patience, to travel (roadtrips of course, to "better see the country" he loved), tend his always bountiful garden, and generally tinker. He almost single-handedly transformed a little two-bedroom cottage on the lake into a showpiece destination his whole family cherishes to this day—his distinctive handiwork is evident throughout the place, from the hand carved totem and mantelpiece to the beautifully rustic barnwood and cedar interior.

He also began two hobbies later in life: distance running and carving. He wound up running several Chicago marathons and countless other races (well into his seventies!), and loved inspiring others, especially his granddaughters, to share in his passion for the sport. His carvings ranged from exquisitely

detailed figurines destined to become family heirlooms, to several large beautiful totem poles that he donated and mounted in places special to him, notably his hometown of Tinley Park, IL and on the shores of his beloved Indian Lake.

More than anything, Don was devoted to us, his family. He was in his glory hosting family and friends up at the lake house. He leaves behind five children, thirteen grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren—along with three sisters he reunited with as an adult whom he adored, and many nieces, nephews, in-laws, neighbors, friends, customers, and other extended family. He, literally, even made fans of his nurses and caregivers in his final days. He touched every single one of us.

But Don saved his very last breath, somehow delivered with his customarily understated sense of humor, for his beloved wife of 61 years, Lynn. He left all his family with cherished memories and smiling faces. He just wouldn't have had it any other way.

Family and friends attended a memorial for Don in his hometown of Tinley Park, IL. Those wishing to offer an expression of sympathy are


