

Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. Only in this way can the parish issue documents attesting to parish membership and Catholic practice, e.g. a letter to be a Godparent or Sponsor. New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

Parish Council: Meets on the Monday evening after the third Sunday of the month.

TO WHOM DO I NEED TO OFFER MERCY?

When Saint Luke wrote the Acts of the Apostles, many Christians believed that Christ's second coming was imminent. As Luke himself wrote in his Gospel, Jesus told His disciples that "this generation will not pass away



until all these things have taken place," referring to the signs preceding the coming of the Son of Man (Luke 21:32). The early church's belief that judgment day could be coming at any moment led them to focus on making sure that the community was exhibiting the values Jesus taught. If the world was ending, there was no reason to hoard possessions for the long term. Freely give to those in need! Though we have no reason to believe that the end of the world will come in our lifetimes, we know that our own par-

ticular judgment day could come at any time. It will definitely come at the end of our lives. So we would be well advised to follow the same gospel values as did the early church: share what you have, ensure no one is needy, take care of each other.

Besides missing seeing the risen Lord in the flesh, Saint Thomas also missed receiving the Holy Spirit on that first day of the week. Perhaps his doubt and disbelief stemmed from not having the Holy Spirit within him to guide him to the truth. We have each received the Holy Spirit in baptism, so we have an advantage Thomas did not have at



the time. Let us allow the Holy Spirit to guide us to the truth.

We bestow mercy on someone when they have done something wrong,



choosing to refrain from punishing them even when they deserve some penalty. But more than that, the mercy that Jesus taught in the story of the prodigal son, showed to the woman caught in adultery, and offered Peter after he denied Him three times is a mercy that is steeped in empathy, a mercy given to someone who is not able to forgive him—or herself. It is when we feel that we are beyond mercy that we stand most in need of God's divine mercy. It is when we have been wronged by someone who feels that the are beyond mercy that we are

called to imitate our Lord in offering mercy. Not because he or she deserves it. Because without mercy, we are all lost.

TODAY IS DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

Pope John Paul II designated the Second Sunday of Easter as Divine Mercy Sunday, and to ensure that the faithful would observe the day with devotion, he established special graces for participating in prayers and devotions honoring God's Divine Mercy. In his homily at the beatification of Sister Mary Faustina, he reflected on the reading of the Second Sunday of Easter, saying: "The message of the divine mercy is implicitly a message about the value of every human being. Each person is precious in God's eyes. Christ gave His life for each one, to everyone the Father gives His Spirit and offers intimacy.

The Feast of Divine Mercy is both a celebration of God's merciful love and an example for us to follow. God's love for us is never more evident that when He forgives our sins. What a great gift of His Divine Mercy we receive through our priests, in the Sacrament of Reconciliation! We have a duty not only to praise this gift of His Divine Mercy, but also to be agents of mercy in the lives of other people by performing corporal and spiritual works of mercy.

St. Bart's and The New York Blood Center express sincere appreciation to the 87 donors who came down to the 98th Blood Drive on 3/30/2021 to donate 79 pints. Since 1981, St Bart's blood drives have collected 7440 units of blood.

Once again, NYBC can depend on St. Bart's friends and parishioners to understand the need for blood, particularly during critical times of shortage. 69 donors gave a regular donation.

5 donors gave a double red cell donation using the ALYX system. 13 donors were deferred for various reasons. There were 26 new donors and 11 walk-ins. 22 prospective donors had signed up but were not able to attend. Eye Has Not Seen

They say seeing is believing. But if you've ever ordered a pair of pants online, you know that's not always the case. Whatever the photos promise us, what looked like a perfectly nice shade of navy blue on our computer screens comes in the mail as an unusual shade of blue green that only appears in the giant box of Crayola crayons.

The Apostle Thomas, who couldn't bring himself to accept that Jesus had risen from the dead without seeing him, is such an utterly relatable figure in the Gospels. Thomas is still reeling from a loss — not only of his good friend but his Lord, who was taken prisoner and crucified before his eyes. Thomas is guarding himself. He's not believing the hype. He's going to be the only judge of what is real and what is fiction.

Would any of us be any different? We've all had those thoughts. Can we believe it all — Jesus, salvation history, the Eucharist — when we haven't seen it with our own two eyes?

That's when we need to remember that those two eyes were absolutely positive they had ordered a pair of navy blue pants.

It's easy for us to sit back stroking our chins in judgment at Thomas, "you didn't believe the testimony of your friends!" But do we accept the testimony of our friends? The saints, the popes, the Church fathers themselves?

You, Our Lady of New York, know what we need.


We are certain that you will provide, so
