LABOR DAY, Mon 9-2

President Groover Cleveland signed the bill to make Labor Day a national holiday in 1894. Working conditions for labors since the end of the Civil War were horrendous...long hours working for very low wages. The "Pullman Strike" of 1894, in which Federal Troops had to be called in, and 2 people died, brought the workers situation to national attention. The enactment of the Labor Day Holiday was to honor workers and appease the public. Minimum wage laws were not set until 1938, at 25 cents an hour, and raised in 1950 to 75 cents an hour.



Baked Apples

3 T unsalted butter, softened

1/4 cup brown sugar

1/2 t ground cinnamon

1/8 t nutmeg

1/4 c old fashioned rolled oats

4 large apples, washed and cored

2 T raisins, or dried cranberries, or nuts

4 Servings

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Mix the butter, brown sugar, cinnamon, & nutmeg together. Stir in the oats, and raisins etc. Place the cored apples in a pan. Pour warm water into pan, about 1 inch deep. Full apples with the butter mixture. Bake covered with tin foil about 25 minutes, then uncover and bake an additional 20 minutes are until apples are tender. Serve with whipped cream or ice cream.
